BLACKOUT SCHEDULED

School, police, and block authorities yesterday pledged their complete cooperation in the statewide practice blackout scheduled for Monday. Alarm sirens will be sounded from military police guard towers.

A committee of internal security officers yesterday met with Lt. John 2. Karpen, commanding officer of the military police, to map out the exact procedure to be followed. Complete blackout instructions will be carried in Saturday's edition of the PIONEER.

PART TIME PAY FÓR STUDENTS

Effective since Dec. 1, any regularly enrolled student who holds a center job is considered a part time worker and as such is not entitled to full wages, James G. Lindley, project director, announced yesterday. Exceptions will be made upon mutual agreement by the employer, chief of employment, and the superintendent of education.

Other rules state that no regularly enrolled student shall work for pay in excess of four hours on school days; no student shall work for pay between 8:45 a.m. and 3:45 p.m. on school days unless on signed permission from his principal.

No child under 14 years of age shall be hired for pay on the projectine student, aged 15 or 16, shall work unless on approval by his principal.

This new policy was adopted to eliminate dissatisfaction among full time workers and because it was felt that regular attendance is necessary to maintain suitable class and pupil schedules.

DRAFT REGISTRATION TO START FRIDAY

All nise 18- and 19-year-old men in the Granada relocation center will register under President Roosevelt's sixth selective service proclamation beginning Friday at the office of Walter J. Knodel in the south administration building.

Evacuees who are working outside the center are to register with selective service officials of the particular county in which they may happen to be during the registration period.

Excerpts from the presidential proclamation:

"(a) Those who were born on or after July 1, 1924, but not after Aug. 31, 1924, shall be registered on any day during the week commencing Friday, Dec. 11, 1942, and ending Thursday, Dec. 17, 1942;

"(b) Those who were born on or after Sept. 1, 1924, but not after Oct. 31,1924, shall be registered on any day during the week commencing Friday, Dec. 18, 1942, and ending Thursday,

Dec. 24, 1942;

"(c) Those who were born on or after Nov. 1, 1924, but not after Dec. 31, 1924, shall be registered on any day during the period commencing Saturday, Dec. 26, 1942, and ending Thursday, Dec. 31, 1942;

"(d) During the conti-

"(d) During the continuance of the present war,
those who were born on or
after Jan. 1, 1925, shall
be registered on the day
they attain the 18th anniversary of the day of their
birth: provided, that if
such anniversary falls on
a Sunday or a legal heliday, their registration
shall take place on the day
following that is not a
Sunday or a legal heliday.

"Every male citizen of the United States is required to and shall during the time or on the day fixed herein for his registration present himself for registration before a duly designated registration official or selective service local bourd having jurisdiction in the area in which he may happen to be during that time if such male citizen has not heretofore been registered under the Selective Training and Service act of 1940, as amended, and the regulations prescribed there under."

OF, BY, AND FOR CO-OPS: RON

This is the first in a series of articles by E. H. Runcorn, esqistant community enterprisedirector, designed to acquaint residents with the occuparative movement and principles.

The economic problem before the world in the eight- the new and more officient eenth century was produc-tion. Economic goods were scarce, and nearly overyone lived without many of the nocessities of life. The domestic system of production under which each worker owned a few tools and did his work in his own shop or home prevailed. The product of his labor

belonged to him to use or sell.

The invention of machines such as the spinning jenny in 1764 and the steam engine a decade later was a direct attack upon the problem of production. Some oraftsmen gracped the opportunity, became owners of tools, and thus retained their ownership of the finished products which they now were able to merket at a profit. Others less fortunate by this process lost their ownemship and became wage earners without ade-quate purchasing power.

Machinery paved the way for mass production methods which coupled with efficient business management have solved the problem of production in this century. Wo arc in a world of abundance; yet we have millions without ownership and without chough of the goods which are turned out in ' prolific quantities.

The problem we face then is one of distribution. Unless a satisfactory system of distribution is set in operation, the world may revert to an age of tribalism, of blood feuds for survival between groups. We know this must not be. but what system of distribution shall we choose? '

Frank M. Yamaguchi realized an eight months' ambition to contribute to war production when he left this week for work in the Curtiss-Wright corporation of Buffalo, N. Y. An undying interest in aircraft building and a long employment record paved the way for the Curtiss-Wright offer.

Mechanically and electrically minded from early boyhood, . Frank showed an unusual interest in radio at the age of 10, and it was in a radio shop that he was first employed oftor graduating from Pasadena JC in 1931.

As time passed, a desire to fly and construct airplanes replaced his first love in electricity. Determined to make real his new ambition, he studied at the Curtiss-Wright Institute of Aeronautics in 1933-

Three years of omployment at various aircraft plants followed until ho was hired in 1937 by Douglas Aircraft company, incorporated, Santa Monica, Cal. He was Douglas' first nisei employee and was the center of much attention. Life magazine ran pictures last year featuring him at work and at home.

His knowledge of his field is all inclusive. He has been a licensed mechanic for four years and a licensed pilot for twice that long.

Modest and retiring, he is waiting for the day when he can fly a plane of his own. Until that day comes, he plans to help turn out war planes until there is no longer any necessity for them.

NON-CITIZENS ARE

"Why have non-citizens been denied the privilege of holding elective offices in WRA centers?"

Since this question has come up; in so many centers, the Heart Lountain Sentinel made contacts and received the following replies from John H. Provinse, chief of the community management division in washington:

"In the first place, the citizenship status and privilege of evacuees who were born in the United States need to be given special recognition." Province explained further that since citizens as well as noncitizens were evacuated. the nised have been wordering whether they have lost their citizenship or not.

"It is our intention, therefore, to help make up for this fact, as much as possible, by giving special recognition to the citizenship status of the nisei."

Provinse also stated that the nisei will be given preference in obtaining release for outside work and in other respects. "In general," he declared, "the nisei are much more Americenized than the issei. This has nothing to do with question of loyalty the to the United States but is simply a product of the fact that the nisei are, to a greater extent, products of American institutions."


SCOUT TROOPS IN VOLUNTEER WORK

A nisei staff sergeant, graduate of the language school now on combat duty, in a letter has this to say about his impressions:

"Lots of hardships, yet a chance to have the experience of a lifetime, the chance to serve our country...a chance to meet people...that are more than just acquaintances, because you have been through so much together.

"I have a good chance of not coming out of it (the war) alive and I tell you that I don't mind dying but I won't stand for anyone undoing all the work that you, our classmates, and all of us are doing."

ENLISTMENTS BEING TAKEN HERE DAILY


American citizens between 18 and 40 years of age, who are physically fit and have any knowledge of the Japanese language, were called to volunteer for the Military Intelligence Service Language school, Savage, Minn., by Lt. Roy M. Hireno and his staff who arrived here today.

Nisei men will sooner or later be subject to the dreft, and they now have a chance to serve where they will be most useful and where the advancement is rapid, Lt. Hirano stated.


Enlistment is voluntary and there is no espionage connected with the work, it was emphasized. After six months of intensive training in the Japanese language, the enlistee will be appointed a corporal or higher in rank.

If superior aptitude is shown, appointment as staff sergeant or technical sergeant will be granted and the enlistee will be retained as an instructor.

Interested persons are to apply at the enloyment office in the south administration building between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday will be the last day to enlist, it was stated.
