

MONDAY'S 22 INDEFINITES SET NEW DAILY RECORD

The urge to hit the open road reached a new high Monday when 22 evacuees received their "walking papers," commonly known as indefinite leaves, stated Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor.

This sets a new record for number of indefinites

issued in a single day. During the period between Jan. 31 to Feb. 7 inclusive, a total of 93 indefinite leaves have been granted and if this present pace continues the month of February will be the highest on record, disclosed Vecchio.

The recent relocation team of Boston's Roger F. Clapp and Peoria's Milton C. Geuther, who visited this center for two weeks, were anything but a team or friends on a subject of resettlement when it came to one very interesting incident.

Clapp lays claim to being the first relocation officer to persuade a quadrupled "evacuee" take out an "indefinite" leave and resettle in staid ol' Boston. While Geuther tried his best to convince this special "evacuee" on route to New England area to take advantage of better relocation opportunities in the Peoria area. But it seems Clapp thoroughly sold this party on Boston and nothing Geuther said had any effect so the Peorian had to be satisfied by grabbing off several fleas off this relocatee's back and give them a fresh start in Peoria. Knodel, local representative of Selective Service, board no. 35 at Lamar, Colo.

ARMY-NAVY QUALIFYING TEST SET FOR MARCH 15

Japanese-American youths, who are high school graduates and between the ages of 17 and 22 years, will be eligible to take the third Army Specialized Training and Navy College program V-12 on March 15 at the local high school, an-

nounced Miss Grace Lewis, vocational advisor, Monday.

Interested persons must register by this Friday at the high school office. Those passing the test will be eligible to train in any college at government expense for special training to provide technicians and specialists for the armed forces. ASFP trainees may be placed in the following branches of service: aeronautical, medical, foreign language, military intelligence, veterinary or communication.

Two-hour test is divided into three sections: (1) knowledge of meaning and use of words; (2) scientific matters of general information, and (3) mathematics.

Taking this test does not constitute enlistment, although after becoming a trainee he will be in army uniform and receive army pay.

CONSTRUCTION OF OFFICE UNDERWAY

The material used for this 20' x 100' structure was obtained from the Manco CCC camp.

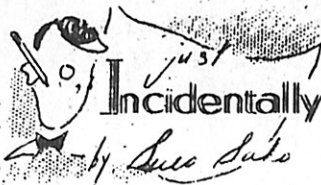
"MARCH OF DIMES" CAMPAIGN REPORT SHOWS \$212.25

Monday's financial report on "March of Dimes" campaign sponsored by various center organizations totaled \$212.25, according to W. Ray Johnson, chief of community management. Leading the entire center by a wide margin is the community activities division with \$81.09; the secondary and elementary schools contributed \$36 and \$31.63 respectively.

Following his reclassification notice, Fujiwara was notified to take his physical examination tomorrow morning (Feb. 10), 6:50 a.m. at his Long Beach induction station. Because of the complications involved due to distance he has filled out a special application, requesting a transfer.

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GRANADA PIONEER

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One of the most deliberate and discriminating recent editorials against Americans of Japanese ancestry, charged that Japanese Americans showed only "superficial loyalty" in volunteering for Uncle Sam's armed forces. To have their loyalty questioned, solely because of racial ancestry, and to be held responsible for the inhuman treatment accorded to the Bataan prisoners, is a heartbreaking blow to Joe Nisei.

Yet, a big consolation was achieved when Life magazine, published the picture of Pfc. Yoshinao "Turtle" Omiya, a nisei war hero, who fought valiantly for America and her ideals until he had both of his eyes blown out in the Italian war theater. It brings home sharply to the American public that Americans of Japanese descent are shouldering their share of responsibility in the war.

To those who tab our loyalty as "superficial" and strike at opportune moments at a minority group -- we only ask that they judge us by our actions and accomplishments -- and not by their own beliefs. Remember, soon many nisei doughboys, drafted on the same basis as all fellow Americans, will be obliged to pass barbed-wire fences in order to visit members of their families when on furloughs. We must not forget that the Americans of Japanese origin who have returned to the normal American way of living and those still remaining in relocation centers are taking part in the Fourth War Loan Drive, are subject to the draft, are enlisting in the Women's Army Corps, are donating money and blood to the Red Cross, are participating in salvage campaigns, and are playing a vital role in the Nation's war-production program.

Nisei in America are doing all this and more so they may shout with their fellow citizens, "We help-

Is This Democracy?

At last Governor Vivian has yielded to the demands of an aggressive bloc of legislators by summoning a special legislative session to place on the November ballot a constitutional amendment to prevent ownership of land in Colorado by a certain class of enemy aliens.

To all Japanese Americans the outcome of this session will be of the utmost importance as the proposed measure is aimed directly and only at our parents' rights as aliens.

The proposed bill strictly applies to our parents as they are prohibited from becoming citizens of the United States. This is an "out-and-out evidence" of racial discrimination.

Released figures show only 23 Japanese have bought land in Adams County in the past two years instead of the reputed claims of more than 3,000 purchases. This goes to prove once again that war brings many tragedies to both innocent and guilty. But in this specific case, the impending tragedy is results of the manipulation of war-time psychology in the service of race prejudice and greed.

If and when a constitutional measure banning the Japanese aliens from buying property is placed before the Colorado voters--they must think clearly. Remember, the "principles of Democracy will go down first of all on the rocks of racial prejudice and discrimination."

If the principles of Democracy are to be violated, your sons, brothers, sweethearts, fathers and husbands are fighting in vain. If not, Colorado voters must not ignore the fact that the law-abiding Japanese aliens whom some individuals attempt to discriminate against have Joe Niseis fighting for the same principles as the Johnny Doughboys. In fact, Joe Nisei is Johnny Doughboy.

of pre-induction physical examination through the center Selective Service division. When this is granted Fujiwara will take his physical at Denver, which is the armed services induction station designated by the Selective Service for this area.

Knodel stated that all California registrants receiving their pre-induction notice should report to the project Selective Service office to file application for "transfer for delivery."

Registrants failing to report for pre-induction physical examination when directed will be declared draft delinquent and subject to fine and imprisonment under the provisions of section 11 of the Selective Service Training and Service Act of 1940, Knodel warned.

Nisei War Hero Sgt. Kuroki Pleads For American Respect

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 4-- Sgt. Ben Kuroki, Japanese American who twice has won the Distinguished Flying Cross, today told the Commonwealth Club that despite

his army uniform and his medals, he was unsure whether or not he was safe on the streets of his own country.

"After the widespread publicity given the atrocity stories," Kuroki said, "I find prejudice once again directed against me, and neither my uniform nor the medals which are visible proof of what I have been through, have been able to stop it."

Kuroki said when he joined the army, his fellow soldiers in gunnery school shunned him and his brother. After his training he was sent to England, where he became a Liberator bomber gunner. He also won the Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters.

"Under fire, a man's ancestry--what he did before the war or even his present rank--don't matter at all," he said. "You're fighting as a team... You're fighting for each other's lives and for your country--you're living and proving democracy."

PLEASE GIVE US HOPE, ASKS CARSON NISEI DOUGHBOY

DENVER, Feb. 5--In the hushed chamber of the Colorado house of representatives today a Japanese-American army sergeant from Camp Carson pleaded with members of the legislature to refrain from enactment of laws that would prohibit Japanese aliens from

owning property.

Other Japanese-American soldiers from Camp Carson--two of whom had served for six months in the Aleutian islands--were present as Sgt. Jimmy Gozawa said that democracy should be a thing above race or color or creed.

Gozawa was inducted in San Francisco where he operated a flower shop. Mrs. Gozawa lives in Colorado Springs.

He appeared unheralded, at a meeting called by the constitutional amendments committee of the house to discuss several proposed amendments to the Colorado constitution which would prohibit Japanese aliens from buying or owning property.

He pleaded in behalf of both Japanese-American citizens and those who may not become citizens.

"I am an American by birth and it means a great deal to me," he said.

"It is almost impossible for you to understand this titanic struggle, sitting here comfortably.

"There are thousands of people who are suffering and dying--not because they are black or white, Japanese or something else--but because they are believers in democracy.

"We are going overseas. We are going to be hungry. We are going to be scared. Many of us are going to be crippled.

"We are not asking for special privileges. We are only asking for a chance to show that we do believe in democracy, that it is dear to us.

"Please give us hope that our loved ones here will be taken care of."

NISEI POTPOURRI

NOW that the American citizens of Japanese ancestry are to be reclassified by Selective Service they are wondering what the future holds for them. And whether they shall eventually get a wider latitude in the choice of branch of service they may wish to enter. At present nisei are slated to be assigned for service with the 100th Battalion or the 442nd Combat Team.

It is now well established that the 100th Battalion and the 442nd Combat Team have proven beyond doubt nisei loyalty and bravery under fire. For no less authority than the War Department has attested to that fact time and again. And we cannot deny the valuable service rendered by the aforementioned divisions.

BUT the present-day trend of thought seems to follow that since nisei fighting quality is firmly established, it is time that they should be given an opportunity to show their calibre in other branches of the armed service. To prove their mettle among Caucasian Americans--who shall have, after the war, much to say about the Four Freedoms. This new school of thought states that brilliant nisei minds should be utilized elsewhere to better advantage. It is time, they say, to allow the nisei to enjoy full selective-service privileges and place each individual nisei on the basis of merit and ability.

Of course, the separate unit partisans maintain that their method will prove conclusively that any success attained and credited to the nisei had no "strings attached." Their stand cannot be denied and it was the only way at the inception of separate unit system. But today things have changed tremendously thanks to the nisei's manifold efforts under fire. And it is time to prove that the nisei can fight under fire in any branch under any circumstance if

12 JAPANESE-AMERICAN WOMEN DONATE BLOOD IN DENVER

DENVER, Feb. 4--A dozen Japanese-American women and several men appeared at the American Red Cross Blood Donor Center, 117 15th St., today to offer their blood to the American armed forces as an expression of indignation against the inhuman treatment of American war prisoners by Japanese troops in the Philippines.

The group was in addition to 35 nisei men who registered at the center last week.

Dr. Howard Suenaga, a sansei, or third-generation Japanese-American who was instrumental in inducing

many of his race to register at the blood donor center, declared that the oriental superstition against the donation of blood--a superstition founded on the belief that the loss of blood means the draining away of the life substance--was gradually being dissipated.

"Those of Japanese ancestry who see others of their race contribute blood to the blood donor center without ill effect are encouraged to do likewise," said Dr. Suenaga, a physician and surgeon formerly of Guadalupe, Calif.

"Now that the ice has been broken I feel that Japanese-Americans here will donate regularly to the American Red Cross blood bank. It is good for them to feel that they are doing something for the war effort, and of course the blood donation helps our armed forces. It is a fine thing all around."

Allyce Hirabayashi, attractive nisei who was among the volunteers, said, "I'm delighted at the chance to do something for my country. I only wish I had more blood to give." Miss Hirabayashi, an evacuee from the War Relocation Center at Poston, Ariz., formerly lived in Salinas, Calif.

"I'm glad to be able to give blood to American soldiers," commented Ayako Yoshii, a former Los Angeles, Calif., resident who came to Denver from the Granada Relocation Center.

FISCHER ARRIVES TO ASSUME DUTIES

REFUNDS MAILED TO RELOCATEES

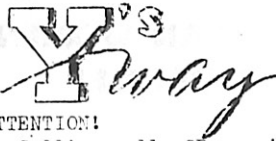
Patronage saving refunds and interests, covering the first fiscal year, are now being sent to relocated shareholders, according to E. H. Runcorn, enterprise supervisor.

NISEI MAY NOT ENTER WDC AREAS WITHOUT PROPER PERMIT

SAN FRANCISCO--Any person of Japanese ancestry who enters the prohibited areas of the Western Defense Command without proper permit will be either prosecuted or forcibly removed, Lieutenant General Delos C. Emmons, Commanding General, Western Defense Command, announced today following the forcible removal of Masanobu Hata in Southern California.

Hata, 27-year-old Japanese American recently re-

leased from a War Relocation Project, entered the evacuated areas on Jan. 24, 1944, without a permit, went to his former residence at Lomita, suburban community of Los Angeles, obtained his automobile which had been stored for him by a friend, and was apprehended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation near Flythe, Calif., en route to his destination at St. Louis.

Hata was one of the 110,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the coastal areas in 1942 under Public Proclamations issued by Lieut. General J. L. DeWitt, then Commanding General.

"Today's action of the military in evicting Masanobu Hata is strictly in accord with the terms of the Public Proclamations heretofore issued governing the exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from specified areas," said the Commanding General.

"It will serve as notice to any and all of the remainder of the 110,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the Pacific Coast that they must not return without the special permits authorized by the original Proclamations. Similar action or rigid prosecution will follow any attempts of other evacuees to enter the area."

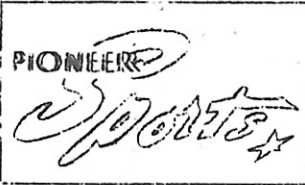

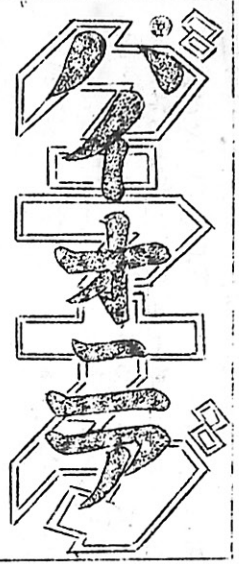
