

tor and the staff of the WRA into this department. The authority was established nearly two years ago as a result of the Army's evacuation of West coast residents of Japanese ancestry. Since that time, the authority has worked closely with this department. Five relocation centers are situated on the Interior department land, one center was directly administrated by this department until Jan. 1, 1944. As a consequonce, I know something of the problems with which the MRA has been confronted and have come to appreciate the effectiveness with which these problems have been dealt.

"TRA has been confronted with the difficult task of caring for a minority group of enemy ancestry in time of war. To handle this problem with proper remard for the national security and in accord with sound principles of American democracy, the authority has developed a three-fold program: (1) Maintenance of all evacuee who require support in properly administered relocation centers; (2). Segreration of evacuees whose sympathies

NISEI MAY REQUEST FOR FARM DEFERMENT

WASHINGTON - - With tho reinstitution of nisei draft, it is possible that evacuees going into farming may be deferred, a wire from Moyer Weinger, new acting chief of the personnel management section in Washington, states.

Evacuoss currently ongaged in farming must request reclassification for deforment from the local board, just as any other farmer. If deferment is not granted, it is suggested that the Department of Agriculture County Ler Board, which acts in an advisory capacity to local boards, be contected. This Board occasionally initiates appeals in such c sos, Woinger says.

It has not been specified that the evacuee asking reclassification be engaged in farming for cortain length of time, and dr. Weinger has been informed by the Chairman of the Department of Agriculture War Boards, that new farmers are eligible to apply, provided they are already enin farm producgagod tion.

However, he adds, since Local Board Release No.164 status that the registrant must be regularly engaged inagricultural occupation, it is apparently left to the local board, which ususally requests the advice of the County Wer Board in each case. Aere statement of intention to farm is not sufficient, and the production of at loast le war units are generally required for deferment with slight variations in cortain localities.

Although the wire states that war units are available for the production of cattle, poultry, shoop, souts, field crops, fruits and vegetables .further details on the definition of a "war unit" have not been obtainable.

"The WRA was oreated by the President almost two years ago to perform a necessary wartimo task, aimed at preserving our American democratic principles and at the same time protecting the national security. The program which we have de-veloped to me t the needs of 110,000 American residents, two-thirds of them citizens by right of birth, has had the endorsement of the Congress as well as the executive branch of the government. Our primary objective is to see that it is carried out in the most effective manner. We welcome the resources and facilities which will be available in the Department of the Interior to help us do our job and do it better.

"I know that Secretary -Iokes and I can depend upon the continued loyalty of the war staff and a continuation of the good relations between residents of the centers and the staff which have enjoyed in the

SAN Francisco Chronicle's distinguished writer--Chester Rowell -- recently wrote: One is tempted to wonder what has become of the Constitution of the United States. Its text. to be sure, is to be found in plenty of books, and there are whole libraries of comments and decisions on it, But it seems to have vanished from the consciousness of even those who, for quite other purposes, cite it most vehemently.

And to that statement there aren't very many nisei who wouldn't SAY "Amen."

True, Mr. Rowell made his statement as a prologue to a subject far apart from what the present day nisei has in his mind but the basic principle for which he made his declaration is one and the same. The nisei's immediate issue is one of cluality and justice, which are conclusively his under the Constitution. But he is denied these sovereign rights because a certain group of intolerant. people and its similarly -- thinking representatives have bowed to a persecution complex. Because the text of the Constitution has "vanished from the consciousness of even those who, for quite other purposes, cite it most vehemently."

LIFE in these United States hasn't been a happy lot for the misei, especially in times of crisis. His constitutional rights have been curved and it has not been so "self-evident: that all men are created equal: that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights: that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Now, this incompatible situation is primarily the fault of the people who have two versions of the Constitution--one for the majority and one for the minority.

There have been various causes given for this strained relation but the basic fighting for.

cause in the majority of instances has been one of economics, while the influx of nisei and his people into concentrated areas has also added fuel to discrimination. But people must understand that evacuation has changed all this.

BECAUSE in matters of discrimination and intolerance it is the people who set the tempo, the nisei's fight for his rights will be a hard, uphill battle. It will take courage, wisdom, faith and sacrifice. It will take leadership with vision, sympathy and understanding. But the rights under the Constitution are certainly worth

WASHINGTON -- A House show Committee for a rule preto punish disloyal Japanese any amendments or substitutes after Rep. Phillips (R.) Calif., warned many western legislators "don't think the proposed bill goes far encush" and asserted the question of revoking citizenship of hostile nisei "requires full discussion."

Phillips said the recommended legislation "will not touch those who already have sworn allegiance to Japan."

In requestion a "gag rule" Lickstein and other members of his committee maintained the legislation suggested by the Attorney Ceneral "goes as far as we can" without violating the constitution.

The recommended measure, providing for loss of eitizenship only after new, voluntary statements of allegiance to another country, will "lay the groundwork for the exchance and deportation" of some Japanese Americans, Dickstein predicted.

Phillips said he doubted whether many nisei who previously refused to swear allegiance to the United States would make the required statement renouncing their citizenship.

lon Myer, head of the War Relocation Authority, said last night that "certain super-democratic organizations and individuals, and to some extent the press" are responsible for opposition to the Government's program for relocation of Japanese Americans from camps to communities throughout the country.

Myer spoke at a conference on"the Bill of Rights in war"held under the auspices of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"There are certain superpatriotic organizations and extent the press, who are opposed to the job we're trying to do -- a job based on sound principles. It is an organized and persistent opposition, "Ayer said.

He added that "strange as it may seen, our major problem is not securing community acceptance of evacues but to secure acceptance on the part of the evacuee to enter community life. They are not sure that they can go out into the community with their families and earn their living free from discrimination."

"In carrying out my responsibilities under the order, I intend to keep in mind the need of recognition of the rights of United States citizens regardless of ancestry; the internal security of the United tions which are involved,

and particularly the effect of this program on the treatment of war prisoners and civilians in Japanese hands.

"The Department of Interior will, I am sure, be able to make an effective contribution to the relocation program. I should be reluctant, however, to assume the responsibilities involved in bringing the WRA into the Department of Interior if I did not know the ability and devotion of the staff of the WRA and were not assured that Dillon . 
