Nisei men who have received through the mails notice to appear for a pre-induction Army physical examination on Feb. 22 should register their names with Chief Internal Security Officer Harlow Tomlinson not later than Monday noon, Feb. 21, announces Walter

J. Knodel, local Selective Service representative.

Chief Tomlinson will arrange transportation from Amache to Lamar. The Selective Service System pays all traveling expenses, including meals and lodging, from Lamar to Denver and return, Knodel explains.

According to Lindley the repatriates who left are: Tadao Fujii, Takashi Hori, Harry Ioka, Hiroshi Nakaguchi, Tom Sakurai, and Mr. and Mrs. Kiyomi Yokoyama and their children, Shizuko, Akiko, Tomoye, Hifumi, Hisako, and Hiroko.

This group was escorted by Willis Hanson, assistant relocation program officer. Hanson is expected to visit the relocation centers in Arizona on his return trip to Amache.

SOLDIER DISCHARGE ALLOWANCE AVAILABLE

Mustering-out pay for honorably discharged servicemen, which was recently enacted, is now available by filling out necessary application papers, stated Walter J. Knodel, center selective service officer, Thursday. Local honorably discharged ex-soldiers are urged to contact Knodel immediately to obtain information regarding their rightful claims to the government.

WRA STAFF BOND DRIVE NEARS GOAL

With 102 per cent of its quota, the "Army" team now leads in the WRA Fourth War Loan Drive, according to the Feb. 15 report. The "Navy" team has 94 per cent of its quota.

The staff has purchased a total of \$13,944.24 in war bonds and stamps--98 per cent of its quota. Project Director James G. Lindley states that with the payroll-allotment bonds for the last half of February, the staff is well over its quota. A final report will be made Feb. 29.

The White House statement said that WRA still has "the responsibility for the maintenance and relocation of persons of Japanese descent evacuated from the Pacific Coast early in 1942."

The President declared that the transfer was designed to simplify administration and bring the authority under supervision of a cabinet officer. The agency of which Dillon S. Myer is director, was moved in its entirety to the jurisdiction of the Interior Department in accordance with the President's frequently announced belief that the number of independent agencies should, when practicable, be reduced.

According to reports, President Roosevelt stated that he "considered the program of the WRA sound in principle, and the work already accomplished by the agency highly satisfactory."

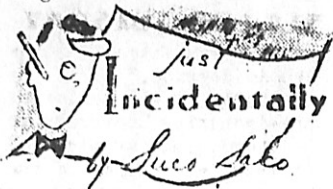
2-DAY VACATION FOR LOCAL SCHOOLS

Nearly every day, we read, talk and hear about why the West coast people do not want the Americans with Japanese faces to return. As each day passes, the profiteers, politicians and war-hysterical people are putting more and more pressure to enact discriminatory measures. One of the most significant reasons is that they, the nisei leaders, know that with the nisei draft in action again, they are waging a losing battle.

Yet, to the majority of the nisei, the many news stories are discouraging because they tend to overshadow the part that nisei and their law-abiding alien parents are playing.

We read the feats of the 100th Battalion in Italy and nisei doughboys fighting in the European war theater and the southwest Pacific. Many are killed in action and others crippled for life. They are making great sacrifices, as are all American soldiers, so they may enjoy the rewards that go with victory.

Yet, nisei doughboys will question about the rewards that go with supreme sacrifices because they know how some are attempting to stir up hatred against them and their families. In fact, one magazine article related a nisei soldier's plight that I hope the future Joe nisei will not have to face.

It said, "Our private was less fortunate. He will never see again; the blast destroyed his eyes. Perhaps it is just as well; for if he could read the hysterical nonsense poured out against his race in newspapers by some of our demagogues, he might be embittered to think that he had given his eyesight that they might be free--to insult him. He is not a white American; he is not a black American. He is an American called Yoshinaka Omiya, and not the less American because descended from ancestors who happen

ARTS COUNCIL DENOUNCES DEPRAVED ACT OF JAPANESE FACISTS

NEW YORK, Feb. 13--The Arts Council of Japanese Americans for Democracy, 240 Fifth Avenue, through its chairman, Yasuo Kuniyoshi, issued yesterday a public denunciation of "the brutal and depraved act of the Japanese facists against every human decency".

The council, composed of anti-fascist Japanese-American artists, said it is "keenly aware that the atrocities committed against our soldiers by the Japanese imperialists, like every other fascist crime, must be avenged."

"Every leader of the

fascist-imperialist clique," the statement continued, "must be held accountable, for it is they who have perpetrated these crimes, not only against Americans, but also against the people of Japan."

The council also denounced the "Peace Now" movement saying it would sabotage democracy's fight by attempting to succor the enemy, to save fascism by working for a negotiated peace. Any step short of unconditional surrender, the council said, "is contrary to our principle as anti-fascists."

FRESNO--Prompt action in setting up procedure for the seizure of stored Japanese-owned farm machinery was requested in a letter sent by District Attorney Jas. M. Thuesen to W. J. Cecil, state director of agriculture.

The letter will supply Cecil with full details regarding the "Sorry, but no sale" correspondence in which Ed. F. Loescher, prominent Fresno district farmer, unsuccessfully sought to buy two of the 11 pieces of Japanese-owned farm machinery found stored three miles south-east of Biola.

Thuesen declared the implements are necessary farm equipment of types not now purchasable.

SECRETARY OF INTERIOR ICKES ACCEPTS WRA TRANSFER

Secretary of Interior Ickes made the following statement upon President Roosevelt's announcement Wednesday night concerning the transfer of the WRA to the Department of Interior.

"The President has directed that the WRA be transferred to the Department of Interior. I am glad to welcome the direc-

tor and the staff of the WRA into this department. The authority was established nearly two years ago as a result of the Army's evacuation of West coast residents of Japanese ancestry. Since that time, the authority has worked closely with this department. Five relocation centers are situated on the Interior department land, one center was directly administered by this department until Jan. 1, 1944. As a consequence, I know something of the problems with which the WRA has been confronted and have come to appreciate the effectiveness with which these problems have been dealt.

"WRA has been confronted with the difficult task of caring for a minority group of enemy ancestry in time of war. To handle this problem with proper regard for the national security and in accord with sound principles of American democracy, the authority has developed a three-fold program: (1) Maintenance of all evacuee who require support in properly administered relocation centers; (2) Segregation of evacuees whose sympathies

DILLON MYER COMMENTS ON WRA TRANSFER TO ICKES

WRA Director Dillon Myer made the following comments on the transfer of the WRA to the Department of the Interior:

"The WRA was created by the President almost two years ago to perform a necessary wartime task, aimed at preserving our American democratic principles and at the same time protecting the national security. The program which we have developed to meet the needs of 110,000 American residents, two-thirds of them citizens by right of birth, has had the endorsement of the Congress as well as the executive branch of the government. Our primary objective is to see that it is carried out in the most effective manner. We welcome the resources and facilities which will be available in the Department of the Interior to help us do our job and do it better.

"I know that Secretary Ickes and I can depend upon the continued loyalty of the war staff and a continuation of the good re-

NISEI MAY REQUEST FOR FARM DEFERMENT

WASHINGTON--With the reinstatement of nisei draft, it is possible that evacuees going into farming may be deferred, a wire from Moyer Weinger, now acting chief of the personnel management section in Washington, states.

Evacuees currently engaged in farming must re-

quest reclassification for deferment from the local board, just as any other farmer. If deferment is not granted, it is suggested that the Department of Agriculture County War Board, which acts in an advisory capacity to local boards, be contacted. This Board occasionally initiates appeals in such cases, Mr. Weinger says.

It has not been specified that the evacuee asking reclassification be engaged in farming for a certain length of time, and Mr. Weinger has been informed by the Chairman of the Department of Agriculture War Boards, that new farmers are eligible to apply, provided they are already engaged in farm production.

However, he adds, since Local Board Release No. 164 states that the registrant must be regularly engaged in agricultural occupation, it is apparently left to the local board, which usually requests the advice of the County War Board in each case. Where statement of intention to farm is not sufficient, and the production of at least 18 war units are generally required for deferment with slight variations in certain localities.

Although the wire states that war units are available for the production of cattle, poultry, sheep, goats, field crops, fruits and vegetables, further details on the definition of a "war unit" have not been obtainable.

DISSEI POTPOURRI

THE CONSTITUTION

SAN Francisco Chronicle's distinguished writer--Chester Rowell--recently wrote: One is tempted to wonder what has become of the Constitution of the United States. Its text, to be sure, is to be found in plenty of books, and there are whole libraries of comments and decisions on it. But it seems to have vanished from the consciousness of even those who, for quite other purposes, cite it most vehemently.

And to that statement there aren't very many nisei who wouldn't say "Amen."

True, Mr. Rowell made his statement as a prologue to a subject far apart from what the present day nisei has in his mind but the basic principle for which he made his declaration is one and the same. The nisei's immediate issue is one of equality and justice, which are conclusively his under the Constitution. But he is denied these sovereign rights because a certain group of intolerant people and its similarly--thinking representatives have bowed to a persecution complex. Because the text of the Constitution has "vanished from the consciousness of even those who, for quite other purposes, cite it most vehemently."

LIFE in these United States hasn't been a happy lot for the nisei, especially in times of crisis. His constitutional rights have been curved and it has not been so "self-evident" that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights: that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Now, this incompatible situation is primarily the fault of the people who have two versions of the Constitution--one for the majority and one for the minority.

There have been various causes given for this strained relation but the basic

BIDDLE URGES "OPEN RULE" ON DISLOYAL NISEI BILL

WASHINGTON--A House showdown on various proposals to punish disloyal Japanese Americans was guaranteed last Thursday when the House Rules Committee granted an "open rule" instead of a "gag rule" on a bill urged by Atty. Gen. Biddle permitting any citizen to renounce his constitutional rights with Federal permission.

The rules group denied the appeal of Chairman Dickstein of the Immigration

Committee for a rule preventing consideration of any amendments or substitutes after Rep. Phillips (R.) Calif., warned many western legislators "don't think the proposed bill goes far enough" and asserted the question of revoking citizenship of hostile nisei "requires full discussion."

Phillips said the recommended legislation "will not touch those who already have sworn allegiance to Japan."

In requesting a "gag rule" Dickstein and other members of his committee maintained the legislation suggested by the Attorney General "goes as far as we can" without violating the constitution.

The recommended measure, providing for loss of citizenship only after new, voluntary statements of allegiance to another country, will "lay the groundwork for the exchange and deportation" of some Japanese Americans, Dickstein predicted.

Phillips said he doubted whether many nisei who previously refused to swear allegiance to the United States would make the required statement renouncing their citizenship.

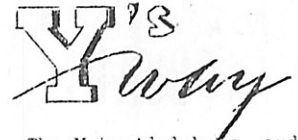
cause in the majority of instances has been one of economics, while the influx of nisei and his people into concentrated areas has also added fuel to discrimination. But people must understand that evacuation has changed all this.

BECAUSE in matters of discrimination and intolerance it is the people who set the tempo, the nisei's fight for his rights will be a hard, uphill battle. It will take courage, wisdom, faith and sacrifice. It will take leadership with vision, sympathy and understanding. But the rights under the Constitution are certainly worth fighting for.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13--Dillon Myer, head of the War Relocation Authority, said last night that "certain super-democratic organizations and individuals, and to some extent the press" are responsible for opposition to the Government's program for relocation of Japanese Americans from camps to communities throughout the country.

Myer spoke at a conference on "the Bill of Rights in war" held under the auspices of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"There are certain super-patriotic organizations and

to not lie with the United States into a special segregation center, and (3) Relocation of loyal evacuees as rapidly as possible in normal, productive American life. This program will be continued and I hope will be made even more effective in the Department of Interior.

"In carrying out my responsibilities under the order, I intend to keep in mind the need of recognition of the rights of United States citizens regardless of ancestry; the internal security of the United States during war time and the international implications which are involved,

and to some extent the press, who are opposed to the job we're trying to do—a job based on sound principles. It is an organized and persistent opposition," Myer said.

He added that "strange as it may seem, our major problem is not securing community acceptance of evacuees but to secure acceptance on the part of the evacuee to enter community life. They are not sure that they can go out into the community with their families and earn their living free from discrimination."

and particularly the effect of this program on the treatment of war prisoners and civilians in Japanese hands.

"The Department of Interior will, I am sure, be able to make an effective contribution to the relocation program. I should be reluctant, however, to assume the responsibilities involved in bringing the WRA into the Department of Interior if I did not know the ability and devotion of the staff of the WRA and were not assured that Dillon Myer and the organization he has built up and directed were coming under my direction as unit."

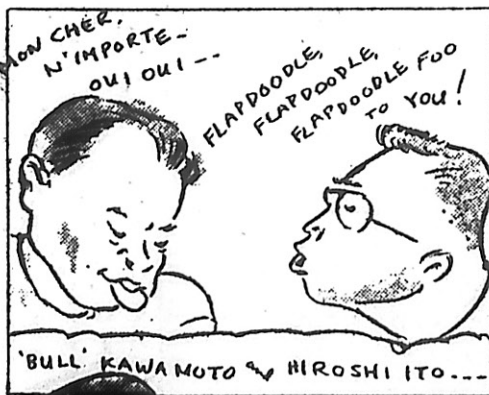

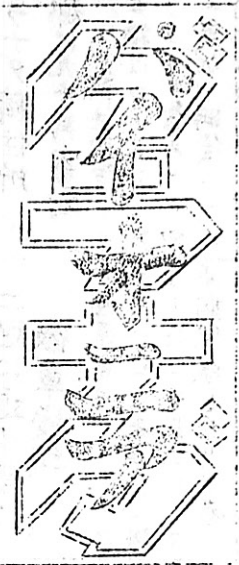
