NISEI ARMED SERVICE POLICY CLARIFIED BY WAR DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON--Replying to a petition addressed to Secretary of War Henry L.Stimson by a group of mothers at the Minidoka relocation center, Lt. Col. Harrison A. Gerhardt, executive to the assistant secretary of war, explained the policy of the War Department in the segregation of Japanese Americans in a single unit.

"The present assignment of Japanese-American induc-

tees is very often interpreted as a segregation policy on the part of the War Department, " he said. "This is because the reason for the use of Japanese Americans in a single unit is not clearly understood. There is an urgent present and future need for replacements for the 100th battalion and 442nd combat team. In order to fill this need, it is necessary to assign inductees for training for these units.

Halliday, who just returned from a recent Denver trip, mentioned a number of significant and insignificant items that he noticed or heard. And there was one tip-off on a new trend that may gather momentum as time elapses which will vitally concern those who are hesitant in relocating.

seems to be a There noticeable indication that many employed Denverites are now "job stopping," which fact has caught the eyes of competent persons connected with the employment bureaus in the Mile High City area. Another outstanding factor in this slight movement is that these job hunters are no longer classing high wages or salaries as number one requirement on any offer. In addition, many workers offered better jobs with high pay in other states and areas are showing an increasing tendency to ignore them; others employed in war industries are constantly on the "beat" for another bread-and butter or meal ticket.

What does all this mean? It may be that the rank and file of the American public is expecting the global struggle to. end shortly; on the other hand, it may be that far-sighted individuals are seeking permanent positions and are not going to be"caught with their pants down" when the men on the fighti ng fronts begin to return.

Regardless of what this new trend may be, it brings another immediate and growing problem that evacuees within the relocation centers will encounter as each day passes. It means that Caucasians who rushed into the war factories and plants are flocking elsewhere to more secure jobs -- jobs with but with more less pay,

Some American Japanese are braving the wrath expressed toward their race on the streets of Clinton, Ia., wrote J. W. McCormick, staff writer of the Clinton Herald, recently. They are doing their best to prove the falsity of the snap judgement that "a Jap is a Jap!

Among the seven nisei ere there is Hasegawa Shirokichi, wrote McCormick, who is a US veteran of World War I, born in Hawaiian Islands and later moved with his parents to the United States. Shirokichi attended American schools and worked on American farms and in American industries up and down the west coast prior to evacuation. Now after a short interruption, he has returned to work for an American firm, the Clinton Bridge Works. Since his name is combersome for the American tongue, Shirokichi has changed his name to "Ben."

Shirokichi and five other nisei w uths are employed at Clinton Bridge Works as welders. Several of the boys told staff writer &cCormick, "Tell the people of Clinton we are doing everything we know how to help win this war for the United States. We are 100 per /cent for America and are giving 10 per cent for

war bonds."

And the only nisei girl in Clinton is 18 year old Sally Okura who has joined a French family at the invitation of their daughter, a 'pen-pal' of Sally's for several years. The "mailorder" friendship began long

before Pearl Harbor continued unabated during Sally's internment.

She is now working at the Burpee Seed company packing seed orders American victory gardens, truck farms and lend-lease shipments.

CENTER LABOR SHORTAGE ACUTE, 130 JOBS OPEN

HOSPITAL 000 IN IE WW SS

The center hospital is facing an increasing danger as the residents continue their tremendous demand for medical and surgical attention, states Dr. William Carstarphen, chief medical officer, this week. It pointed out before that luxury hospital service cannot be furnished with our present depleated staff, and if there is no marked decrease, it. will result in a continued loss of hospital personnel.

In this connection, warns Dr. Carstarphen, attention is called to the glaring fact that center population has dropped 8 per cent from last year's census, and yet, the work for the hospital has increased nearly 80 per cent in the past several months. On the several months. other hand, there has been ar alarming decrease of hospital workers and persormel.

Our function here is to serve the public legitimately, but if the center residents continue to overload our medical staff with elective work and personal favors, it will result in serious consequences, added Dr. Carstarphen. And if there is no let-down, residents themselves will be forced to help combat this problem.

Therefore, advises Dr. Carstarphen, the residents must realize the services are entirely free and furnished by government funds. There are no charges made for medical, laboratory and X-ray services as well as for the drugs or pharmaceuticals prescribed by the doctors. This includes special nursing care and any attention given to extra-ordinary cases such as special diets.

Free services of this type will naturally be abused by some thoughtless people, but I am sure the majority will show its appreciation and co-operation by not purposely abusing the regulations, Dr. Carstarphen concluded.

continued from page 1 that retaliatory measures which might be taken against Japanese Americans captured in the Pacific area are beyond the normal hazards of battle, it has been decided that this group will not be used in this area except for a special assignment. Because of this decision and to avoid an uneconomical and laborious screen in g process of all units, it has been deemed advisable to train this group as a single unit." Col. Harrison expressed the appreciation of the War Department for the fine spirit with which the group has greeted 'the reinstitution of selective service. He said. "I am sure that sons of these mothers will serve loyally and faithfully in whatever capacity they may be called upon to serve,"

MUSEI ACCEPTED and the Meyerbergs, the Jensons and the De Labriers are learning how to fight side by side for Uncle Sam. And the experience which each brings from his individual background is a valuable part of Army life.

For instance, there is Harry Hayashi, the son of parents born in Japan, who received his degree in chem istry from the University of Colorado, and had just completed basic training at Camp Grant, Ill., when war was declared and the relocation order went out Harry from Washington. didn't sit around griping about his lot in a relocation camp. "I got a job as a laboratory technician in the camp hospital, " he recalls, "and I really en-joyed the work."

After three months, Harry was permitted to return to active duty as one of Uncle Sam's soldiers. He was transferred to Fitzsimmons General Hospital in Denver, where he was given an opportunity to do research work with serums, in the serology department. Subsequently, he was accepted for training in the ASTP. "I wanted to study medicine," he mentioned, "but since the medical quota was filled, my second choice was engineering. Now I believe that I will try to get into sanitation engine-

ering after the war."


