INDEFINITE LEAVES ON SIX-MONTH TRIAL BASIS NOW AVAILABLE FOR RELOCATEES

Residents of relocation centers will be eligible to go out on indefinite leave for a trial period of from four to six months and may secure permission to return to the center at the end of that period if they find it necessary, according to new regulations of the War Relocation Authority received today by Project Director James G. Lindley.

Explaining the new regulations, Leland Barrows, Acting Director of WRA in Wash-

ington, said:

"The adoption of this program permitting indefinite leave on a trial basis is an effort on the part of WRA to meet the needs of those evacuees who have been uncertain of their ability to make a success of relocation, and those who have hesi-

IEVACUIEE PIERSONAL PROPERTY

WRA TO MEET FULL SHIPPING COSTS TO REIOCATION

All personal properties of evacuees may now be shipped to relocation points at government expense even though shipment to the

center was also made by WRA expense, according to revised instructions received by Ralph J. Mitchell, property officer. The weight limit is also removed on household and personal effects.

Shipment of commercial property of an evacuee's trade, business or profession, including farm machinery and equipment, sufficient only for a familysize venture and not more than 5000 pounds in weight to the point of the evacuee owner's relocation, will be paid by the WRA. This procedure may be followed only when the relocation officer of the community certifies that the use of such equipment is essential to the evacuee's successful relocation and that they cannot be replaced at the time. Such shipment must also receive the approval of the project director.

FIRST INDUCTEES PLACED ON RESERVE

Twenty Amacheans, who left Monday for induction at Fort Logan, were returned 'to the center and placed on the inactive list Tuesday by the army until larger group is formed, according to Walter Knodel, Selective Service officer. The boys will remain on the reserve list until called the commanding general of the Seventh Service Command.

With more than thirty signatures of the representative applicants, the establishing of the Federal Credit's Union in Amache awaits only the granting of the charter, announces E. H. Runcorn, supervisor of enterprises. The local

chapter will have safety feature which are practically uniform with the 10,000 credit unions in the United States.

The Amache Federal Credit Union, when established, will be open to every center resident.

CENTER-WIDE CENSUS TAKEN TOMORROW

All residents are required to remain in their apartments tomorrow morning immediately after breakfast as a census of the center will be taken beginning at 8 o'clock, announced Henry F. Halliday, assistant project director, Thursday afternoon.

Aside from these persons on duty-policemen, water pump operators, hospital personnel, including the boilermen and firemen--no person will be allowed to leave his apartment until the entire cen-

sus has been completed, stated Halliday. Mess hall employees must remain in their apartments until they have been registered by the census takers.

Heads of the family should recheck their family and alien registration numbers so that correct numbers can be given the census takers.

The sounding of messhall gongs under the direction of the internal security section will signify the completion of the census, concluded Halliday.



After all the undesirable and desirable publicity we receive, one would unhesitatingly believe that the rank and file of the American people should have a clear picture about the Americans of Japanese descent and their law-abiding parents who have relocated or those still remaining within the relocation centers' confines. To the contrary, the majority of the American public are somewhat confused and do not know what to believe and what not to believe.

This fact has many a time been proven to me when I questioned a number of local administrators who have traveled and have had contact with persons from various walks of life. The average John Q. Public reads the glaring headlines blasting us and a few days later his eyes are attracted to a news item telling a story of a nisei girl enlisting the WACs. This type in of cycle of news has the average person "coming and going.'

I remember one Caucasian fellow who knew and understood the evacuees within the centers and when his friends heard he was wellthey informed about us questioned him. This "nice Joe" received his greatest shock when he asked his inquirers exactly what they thought about us. His friends bluntly told him, "We read about them in the papers, but we don't believe them -so now you tell us since you know them."

And I got a terrific kick . when this same "Joe" related the time he happened to sit opposite two men connected with the antinisei pressure groups. He unintentionally became involved with the couple over the loyalty of nisei. The two men poured out a tale of our distrust and hate for America.

After swallowing all they had to say, this "nice Joe" suddenly popped the question, "Did any of you ever have a Japanese AmeriGRANADA PIOMEER



-continued from page 1they were unable to make a satisfactory adjustment on the outside."

"They will now be able take employment on a trial basis and to find out for themselves what conditions are like on the outside, with the provision that they may secure permission' to return to the center at the end of four months if they find it necessary. Applicants must show that indefinite leave for the trial period is a definite step toward permanent relocation."

Individuals and families to whom this new type leave is granted must accept cortain responsibilities and meet cortain conditions. They must have a specific offer of employment or a community invitation, and meet the requirements for regular indefinite leave.

The new type leave will be issued only to applicants whose destination is a state east of the Mississippi River or in the states of Minnesota, Iowa or Missouri.

Applicants must agree not to change employment nor to travel outside a prescribed travel district without approval of the Relocation Officer in that district. Applicants must be at least 21 years of age the early stages of this month and the block managers and council body living up to their word, "shelled"out the difference of \$20.92 to the slaughter workers from their own pocket. 't present, all slaughterhouse workers are receiving "C" rating but the little things that are being done by farm representatives and block managers to assure residents of a plentiful supply of moat and vegetable should be greatly appreciated by all.

Ho may, however, decide to convert to indefinite leave and apply for an assistance grant and receive such a grant on the same basis as persons going out on regular indefinite leave. Application for such a grant may be made at the center or at any time after departure, but within 30 days of the final date of the trial period. Receipt of such an assistance grant will automatically convert the trial poriod leave to regular indefinite leave.

Persons going out trial period indefinite leave will not be permitted in evacueo gotting trial. to visit the center during the period except in the case of emergencies such as death or serious illness in the family.

Holders of this loave may secure permission to return to the center at the end of the four-month trial period but not more than six months after the issuance date of the leave. After six months the trial period leave will convert to regular indefinite leave.

Center residents may obtain further information on this new type leave from Walter J. Knodel, relocation program officer.
