### FISCHER REVEALS LATEST FACTS ON EVACUEE PROPERTY

Evaluees who own properties in either souther n or northern California and are contemplating on selling them should take advantage of the present high prices,

the advice given this week by Paul J. Fischer, local evacuee property officer, who just returned from a California trip.

During the three weeks he spent there, Fischer consulted with WRA officials in Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles offices besides inspecting and appraising evacues-owned real estate in those areas.

Wartime "boom" has made the prices of all products rise in those regions sky high; in fact, some products have no ceiling prices, reported Fischer. These high prices for products have forced values to real estate ri se -continued on page 5-

## COUNCIL'S 11-POINT REQUEST NOW UNDER CONSIDERATION

The Amache Community Council received a letter, dated Mar. 31, from WRA Director Dillon S. Myer this week concerning their Feb. 22, 11-point request for restoration of nisei rights. It reads as follows:

ledgement.Please be assured that the points you raise are receiving the consideration of responsible of-ficials of the government. Their validity generally is sound, but each of the items you mention must be to weighed in relation many other factors in the wartime situation, and the opinions of many officials with responsibilities for various phases of the war effort must be given con-sideration. Hence, action along the lines you suggest, however justifiable, probably cannot be immediate."

We've published success stories of nisei relocatees who defied community sentiment and racial prejudice and succeeded in attaining the goal they desired. There is the tale of Patrick Noda, former Amachean, who climbed a wall of racial prejudice to become a high school principal in an Iowa community; the story of how Miss Yuriko Amemiya saw her dreams of appearing in New York dance recitals become a reality last month. And now comes the encouraging news that Miss Yuki Kato, a former Rohwer resident, a relocator to St. Louis, Mo., receiving the distinction of being the first Japanese American to be employed in an union headquarters office anywhere in America since evacuation.

Miss Kato was appointed stenographer in the offices of the United Retail, Wholesale and Department Store Employees Association, CIO union affiliate, St. Louis last week.

Such an honor did not come the easy way or quickly, for Miss Kato left Rohwer center in May of '42 and was attending a St. Louis business college. A great deal of her spare time was devoted to gaining new friends and mapping out her future slowly.

WRA officials in St. Louis are elated over the accomplishment, but happier yet is Miss Kato who is in a position to "knock down" those tough barriers for own people in that field. And we should be proud that we now have another ambassador "to carry

the ball" for our side.
Nisei relocators like
Misses Amemiya and Kato and Mr. Noda will be able to strengthen their position and ours as time passes. But all will be in vain if we just continue to stay within relocation centers accepting aid from nisei like Amemiyas, Katos and Nodas.

Obviouslý, we have a great task ahead of us, if we are all going to live peaceably together during and after the war.

job will not be helped by our failure to make distinctions between the loyal American citizens of Japanese descent in this country and the sub-human Japs who mutilated, murdered, and starved American prisoners of war in the Phillippines.

Men who have fought the Japs in the Pacific definitely regard them as obscene, sub-human savages with deceptive veneer of "civilization." But, as Tarawa-survivor Sgt. Shaffer, who recently visited Fitchburg, says, they are sub-human because they have been rigidly "thought-controlled" and conditioned by a monstrous medieval feudalism.
