Tomorrew is Mother's Day. Tomorrow everyone in America is going to pay tribute to his mother. In Amache as well as throughout the entire nation, many mothers will shed happy tears as little tokens of remembrance are received from their "little boys" in the service. Others on the home front, the children and grownups, will muster every effort to make this day a special one for their "mom."

Many of us have strayed away or drifted apart from our parents due to abnormal way of living in the relocation center. Others have lost their sense of obligation, respect and love for them. Some merely go thru the motions of showing their deepest feeling on this special day. They have reached the peak where their "mom"is no longer a sacred person.

Once a Caucasian asked me what sort of a person my mother is. It was not easy to express my feelings and describe mother in mere words. But here is the way

I replied:

"My mom is typical of all issei mothers. She works hard; possesses a fanatical determination to provide us with the opportunities, education and luxuries denied her. In doing this, she slaves, fights, sacrifices, cries and sweats so much it seems inhumanly impossible.

"Many times, her hopes and desires, some wild and others sensible, are dashed, and causes her numerous bitter disappointments and heartaches. Yet in face of all, she suffers, I see by the bright glint in her eyes and the tantalizing smile that a burning desire to do 'a little bit more' for us always exists.

"She tries hard to learn to read and write English to save us embarrassment; she attempts to dress to please us; she scolds us when we are at fault; sho seems to worry unnecessarily if we stay out late at nights, and hor occasional stubbornness causes us a GRANADA PIONEER

### TRIO WHO AIDED NAZIS FACING TREASON TRIAL

"Three former residents Wallace, Florence Otani and Billie Tanigoshi--now await federal court trial on a grand jury indictment charging 'treason and conspiracy to commit treason, according to May 10 issue of the Rocky Mountain news.

"The charges as carried in the indictments specifically allege that these young Oriental women helped two German prisoners of war-veterans of Rommel's Africa Corps -- to escapo from the army prison camp at Trini-

"Snapshots that formed part of the investigation showed these young women in warm and cooperative embrace with the Nazi non-

"Given the opportunity to work outside the prison under the terms of the Geneva Convention, the

Nazi non-coms were employed Amache -- Mrs. Tsuruko at the Winger farm on Oct. 17, whon they mot the three Japanese-American women and, according to the charges discussed the plan for escape to Mexico and indulged in the incidental

The Nazis; of course, are charged with no orime. That's one of the rights of war--to escape from a prison camp, if you can.

"But the indictments against the three women, according to U.S. District Attorney Thomas J. Morrissey, contain two counts. The first, charging treason, carries a maximum penalty of death and a minimum penalty of a \$10,000 fine or five years' imprisonment.

"The second, charging conspiracy to commit treeson, carries a maximum penalty of a \$10,000 fine or five years' imprisonment.

MENTAL BALANCE

THERE are many ingredients that go to make a happy, useful life, and one of them is a well mastered mental equilibrium -- the thing that leads to an unfettered way of living. But this thing called mental balance is much easier said than acquired.

After these many months of confined living within the crowded barrack quarters. our mental balance has been subjected to many trying times and is pretty much frazzled. Only those having the inner quality of all-round equilibrium have been able to steer a halfway decent, happy-medium course of center life. Most of us become maladjusted and find everything we see and do as being wrong--with unpleasant result. This is due to the damut of forced evacuation from home with comforts to a relocation center with discomforts -both apparent and imagined. All this has left a series of sour tastes in our mouth and we look upon everything with natural dislike and distrust.

This radical change from our former made of comparatively free living to one of crowded, privacy-less life also has changed our outlook on life. We have transcended from proud and peaceful people to devil may-care, chip-on-the-shoulder rugged individualists. A nd we have, in the process, allowed the immediate small issues surrounding our daily life to cloud our attention on a more important future welfare issues -- in that we have lapsed into mental laxity to our detriment.

TRUE, we have a right to the bitterness that walls in our minds because our heartaches have been many and undeserved. But there are reasons to believe that we have allowed this bitterness to creep unnecessarily into every issue of our center life and, thus, have tended to lose faith in the few good things. Especially in things beneficial to our welfare.

### HERSHEY RULES BLANKET DEFERMENTS, 30 AND UP

WASHINGTON, May 11 -- "An indefinite period" blanket draft deferment was ordered Thursday night for all men 30 and over in essential industry, while "necessary" men of 26 through 29 ware assured civilian status "for the time being." Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director, expressed hope that "for the time being" would mean six months.

Because the trend of casualties and strategic developments cannot be foreseen, said Bershey, a more definite prediction cannot be voiced. Movever, it seemed likely that men over 29 will not be called this

year, and possibly not for the duration.

If a board cannot meet. its draft calls without dipping into the necessary men of 26-29 or into the 30-and-up groupin essential said: industry, Hershey "The board should let the calls ride." But there will be no easing the rigid requirements in effect now IN DRAFT CASE for occupational deferments for registrants 18 through

#### MAYOR DOESN'T WANT HIM, BUT HE'S 1-A WITH ARMY

It's hard to write stories which try to tell people that Japanese Americans are no different from them, you repeat your allf so often, wrote Natalie Davis, PM Daily writer, this week. But just for the record I'll say once more that it's a shame that Mayor La Guardía, who wants to kick all relocated Japanese Americans out of New York City, can't meet a man like John Iwatus.

Iwatus is an architect-draftsman, wrote Davis, who is working for a firm here. Like a lot of other 30year-old citizens, he has passed his pre-induction physical, and is waiting to see whether he'll be called up.

One of his brothers, Peter, is a lieutenant in the Engineering Corps. David, the youngest of the three, is a sophomore at Food Trades high school.

John observed, "that he doesn't have any trouble getting along with them."

I couldn't help but wonder how the citizens of Brooklyn who have objected to the establishment of a Japanese-American hostel in their midst, or how Mayor La Guardia would feel if they were labeled Caucasian every time they referred to, as John is labeled Japanese, Davis wrote. At any rate, John Iwatus is Japanese, and not a Caucasian American so he was evacuated from San Francisco, Calif.

John, who talks quietly and seriously, "was very surprised at the Mayor's reaction to us. I think antagonism to us comes. from ignorance about us, don't you? After all, very few know about us."

"I guess this is a racist question," he said. "And my people have suffered so much in the relocation centers that they'll be less able to face the outside world when they get out.
"One reason I'm so anx-

ious to get into the Army is my belief that our future depends on the part we play in the war on the Axis. So far, as you know, that has been @remendous."

#### WMC OFFICIAL SEEKS TO REDUCE RACIAL BIAS

DENVER, Colo., May 9--Lawrence A. Oxley, senior technical representative of the War Manpower Commission Placement Bureau in Washington, stated in his address to the WMC personnel that:

"It is our purpose to make sure that no Negro, Spanish-American, Japanese American, Jew or other worker is lost to America's production line or profes sional effort because of any inability on the part of US Employment Service personnel properly to match worker and job or to represent the minority worker fairly to the employer.

He added, "There is a 'minority group" problem only so long as we choose to isolate it."

Mr. Oxley, an army lieutenant in the last war, is a Negro and has been in government work

for eight years.
