CO-OPS: OF, BY, AND FOR YOU OPEN AND VOLUNTARY MEMBERSHIP

The riginal mochdate Cooperative Figures conducted their consumer cooperative according to the rules and methods which are known today as Rochdate primary and secondary principles. The first of these, which is one of the cornerstones of the cooperative of open and voluntary membership.

The Pioneers had learned from previous unsuccessful experiments that it was disastrous to limit membership to a perticular exclusive group. Robert Owen had tried this with his factory workers, and he failed completely.

The sole restriction on

this principle is that adfpreservation of the organization must be considered at all times. Any prospective member who does not accept the cooperative philosophy and who might try to do injury to the society may rightfully be denied membership after a fair hearing before the members.

All humen beings are consumers; therefore, a true consumer cooperative welcomes all people regardless of their sex, their race, their nationality, their creed, or their sociel, economic, or political status. Even children, being very eager and consistent little consumers, should be encouraged to

save and join their community occuperatives, though the general practice is that they are not voting members until they reach the $a_0 \epsilon$ of 18.

The principle of open and voluntary membership is also known as the principle of universality. By adhering to the idea of open and voluntary joining and withdrawing, the Rochdele Pionners began building on the broadest possible fountation. Nearly a century of growth has shown that the rore cooperatived develop, the more they cut across all barriers and thus reduce the conflicts in our world-wide community.
