Smashing the previous daily record by 14, the local relocation office Monday issued 36 indefinite leaves to soar into a new single-day high, according to beaming Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor, Thursday. Suddenly, one of youngsters cuts loose with a yell and dashes over to large bulletin board bearing the inscriptions of countless names. The little lad waves frantically at his companion while pointing his finger at one name.

As his playmate reaches his side, the excited youngater declares breathlessly "Gee, Joe, see that name. Sure, that one in the middle, it's my big brother's name. He's in the Army now. That's why they put his name there."

That scene of a proud Amache youngster sure sounds like a "pipe dream," But hold on a minute, listen to

the rest of the story.
For the past several weeks, it has been reliably reported that a monument dedicated to all Amache Joe Nisei may be erected shortly. In addition, a public display board bearing the names of Amacheans in their Country's service is being designed.

The suggested location for the soldiers' poster at the front entrance of the Co-op building is a wise choice. The site for permanent monument might be selected near the entrance of the center gates. Some discussion has also been had of erecting a billboard bearing the names of the Joe Nisei in the armed forces on the highway near the turn-off to the center. ## NISEI WORLD WAR I VET BEATEN AT TULE LAKE

An American veters of the first World War of Japanesq ancestry, now interned at the Tule lake segregation center, was in the center hospital with "several fracturned bones," and his alleged assailant was convicted by camp authorities and sent to jail less than twelve hours after an altercation between the tyo, according to the May 28 issue of the San Francisco Chronicle.

Kaoru Nagatimi, 50, a native of Hawaii, who gained American citizenship through his service in the last war, was the victim, but authorities said his condition was not critical: In the Klamath Falls fail for 90 days was Tatsuo Yokoyama, 33, who was convicted vesterday after a hearing before Ray R. US District Judge J. Foster Symes denied yesterday a motion to dismiss a federal indictment against three Japanese-American women, charging they committed treason in assisting two Nazi war prisoners to excape from a camp at Trinidad, according to the May 30 issue of the Rocky Mountain News.

Judge Symes also denied an informal request by Defense Attorney Kenneth W. Robinson that one of the women be released to care for two children at the Amache conten-

## KIDO ATTACKS RACE BAITERS ON DUAL CITIZENSHIP ISSUE

Stating that dual citizenship has been utilized and distorted by the Pacific coast race baiters to cast a cloud of suspicion over the loyalty of citizens of Japanese parentage, Saburo Kido, National JACL prexy, thus answered a recent letter to the Rocky 'ountain News editor objecting to dual citizenship.

Kido's letter went on to say that the impression that only Japanese MARDI GRAS"HOP Americans are afflicted . with this problem is an entirely mistaken conception. Russia, Turkey, France, Switzerland, Italy, the Netherlands, Bulgaria, Greece and Persia have

dual citizenship problems. Since Dec. 1, 1942, the citizens league chief stated, the principle based on descent was waived by the Japanese government to children , born of Japanese nationals in the United States where the rule of citizenship based upon place of birth dominates. In other words, for nearly 20 years, American-born persons of Japanese parentage are not born Japanese nationals; they are not automatically dual citizens.

He also averred that the JACL has consistently advocated the cancellation . of all dual citizenships. even going so far as to send a representative to Washington in 1941 urging the passage of single-loyalty bill.

"There is a definite need of clarification of the problem of dual citizenship and it is not a mat-ter which is peculiar to those of Japanese parentage," concluded Kido.

-continued from page 1hour week, for inexperienced help, and \$8.00 per week for experienced help. This 7:00 p.m. -- 9H 'ess hall money will be paid to the Co-op.

"The inexperienced worker will receive from the Co-opatotal of \$19.75 per month of which \$16 is regular wage and \$3,75 is for clothing allotment. Co-op retains \$2.40 for patronage refunds to be paid to Co-op members and \$1.85 for overhead expenses. The employer pays to the Co-op \$24 per month of four weeks for the service.

"Experienced workers will receive from the Co-op per month a total of \$22.75, of. which \$19 is regular wage and \$3.75 is for clothing allotment. The Co-op re-tains \$3.20 for patronage refunds to be paid to Co-op members and \$6.05 for overhead expenses. No experienced maids are employed or available at present.

"Child care at nights will cost the employer fifty cents for duty until 12:00pm. and then twenty-five cents per hour for each hour or fraction thereof of additional duty after 12:00 p.m. Payments will be made to the Co-op which will retain 10 per cent of this amount for patronage refunds and give the balance to the worker."

OUR good friend Mario Vecchio, local relocation advisor, whose carbon copy advice to evacuees to go out-but quick-has been falling on deaf ears all during the "first and second" winter just past, suddenly found himself doing land-office business. And the present influx of seasonal leaves on WFA-approved contracts is running the relocation office girls ragged.

During the last few days of May, that office couldn't be more crowded and the waiting line couldn't be much longer if Tommie Mayahara was giving away a \$100 bond with every leave.

They couldn't grab their seasonal or indefinite leaves out of her hands any quicker if they were getting one-way tickets to Heaven.

Mr. Vecchio gives three reasons for this sudden rush through the gate: 1) Closing of school, so children may accompany parents. 2) Ease in housing situation, so first-goers could send for rest of the families. 3) Clearer understanding of Selective Service situation.

This columnist is in no position to argue with friend Vecchio's reasonings because there are basis for such a viewpoint. It does bring up a very interesting sidelight on the evacues' desire to leave a relocation center to start life anew.

Irrospective of the time element, there is a strong feeling that many who have relocated are those who have no ties, except perhaps sentiment, with their former homes -such as, real estate and personal property. They may have realized that sentiment alone will not buy bread and not butter these days but anything that'll take its place. They may take its place. 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
