# RULES STUDENTS MAY AGAMST HIRING OF NISEL

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 16--Governor O'Conor announced lay that the Board of Public Works had decided today that against employment of Japanese in any State hospitals or child care institutions.

The decision of the board, which is composed of elective State officials, followed, a disclosure earlier in the week by State Employment Commissioner Walter D. Owens that he was investigating the possibility of
