And one of his rabid interests has been athletic teams composed of nisei athletes. He has sponsored and sent a baseball team to the Rohwer and Jerome relocation centers this year and last season.

Mr. Finch inquired to Lt. Colonel Watts and Dillon Myers as to the possibility of sending a squad of horse-hiders to another center. Favorable replies were received from both sources. And after some investigation, Mr. Finch came to the conclusion that Amache was the closest point. So there lie the 'maybes'.

Our reply is that we are in favor of playing the nisei in khaki. But naturally, there are numerous obstacles to be cleared before such an interesting, worthwhile game can be scheduled. The problems are transportation, financial matters and proper date.

At present with the center-wide carnival on tap, July 2, 3 and 4, a series or a single tilt on those dates or on one of those days would certainly give an "added punch and color" to the 3-day gala affair.

All this is rather premature and indefinite, but communications are being made.

Regardless whether the bottom drops out of this 'hat', it is indeed gratifying to know that a noted Hattiesburg sportsman has shown the great interest in the nisei yanks. And if this proposed tilt becomes a reality the local horse-

PUEBLO NISEI GIRL TAKES HER LIFE BY POISON

PUEBLO, June 19--A 16-year-old Japanese girl of Pueblo took her life by drinking poison Sunday afternoon because she was apparently despondent of the prospect of having her marriage with a Chinese soldier annulled. Detectives Tom Matthews and Harvey Neilson reported.

She is Kimi Takaki, of 1926 E. Routt, a high school student. The girl's parents told Police Officers Harold Sell and Mike Chorak that they knew nothing of the marriage until recently.

She drank the poison about 4:50 p.m. Sunday at her home and died at Corwin hospital at 5:45 p.m.

According to the parents' story to police, the girl first became acquainted with the soldier, stationed at the La Junta air base, about three months ago. They were unaware that any marriage was contemplated, they told police.

5,500 Jeronites Are To Be Transferred By July 1

Transfer of 5,500 residents of the Jerome relocation center, Ark., to four other relocation centers will be completed by July 1, it was announced at WRA headquarters on June 15. The movement was started on June 6.

Twenty-five hundred evacuees from Jerome will become residents of the Rohwer relocation center which is only 35 miles away. Two thousand will go to Gila River project in Arizona. Heart Mountain, Wyo., and Amache will each gain 500 new residents. These four were chosen for the Jerome transfers because of their location and available housing space.

This is the first closing of a WRA center. Eight relocation centers and the Tule Lake segregation center remain in operation. Dillon S. Myer, director of the WRA, said recently that WRA has no immediate plan to close any more centers. ... I KNOW SHE IS SO FAR AWAY

Last month a nisei doughboy wounded in action at Salerno and Cassino fronts, stood impatiently waiting for a bus in Knoxville, Tenn., when a Caucasian approached him and inquired, "May I ask what nationality you are?"

"I'm a Japanese-American soldier," the American with the Japanese face proudly replied. "Hold on, I didn't know there was any Japanese fighting for America," the startled inquirer cried.

And what battle-dog yank who received shrapnel wounds in his back and wears a half dozen ribbons--one a Purple Heart--dropped into the faced PICNIC office last Saturday. Yes, our hero is none other than Private First Class Thomas Higa, whose heroic deeds have been publicized in the New York Herald-Tribune, Philadelphia Inquirer and the Knoxville News-Sentinel. In fact, on his way to Amache, he received a request from the Denver Post for an interview.

"Oh, I'm only five feet, one and one-half inch, a real small guy, but in a way I'm lucky to be so small, or else I would not be here today," Higa revealed. "Why wouldn't you be here today?" we shot back.

"Because when we (the 100th Infantry Battalion) were marching down a soggy road near Cassino, the fog suddenly lifted. And there in front less than a hundred

yards away, lying in ambush was a large German detachment! Then, fighting broke out--hand-to-hand fighting and even bayoneting. One Nazi bullet clanged right off of my helmet. If I had been a few inches taller, it would have been another story," Higa declared.

Higa revealed that he was 27 years old, and a native of Hawaii. His folks are operating a vegetable farm on the Islands. Uncle Sam drafted him before Pearl Harbor, and now he is on a convalescent furlough.

"This is my first visit to a relocation center, and I always wonder what it was like," the diminutive Joe Nisei stated.

"I fear so much of discrimination against minority groups, but let me tell you something. In the battlefields of Italy, name and color don't mean anything; it's the uniform," said Higa.

"American people have been real nice to me since I returned to the mainland," Higa said with a lump in his throat. He related many incidents, and one still remained in his thoughts which occurred on Mother's Day.

A Caucasian mother invited him to her home for the week-end. Higa said he can't forget these words uttered by his host, 'I want to take your mother's place today as I know she is so far away.'

MARYLAND STATE BOARD RULES AGAINST HIRING OF NISEI

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 16--Governor O'Connor announced today that the Board of Public Works had decided against employment of Japanese in any State hospitals or child care institutions.

The decision of the board, which is composed of elective State officials, followed a disclosure earlier in the week by State Employment Commissioner Walter D. Owens that he was investigating the possibility of using Japanese from relocation centers to relieve a critical labor shortage in State institutions.

O'Connor said that the board, after consideration, decided that it would be "unwise" to employ Japanese in State establishments for the care of the ill and where children were under State supervision.

No further reason was given.

Owens had said he had

inquired of the War Relocation Authority about the possibility of obtaining Japanese of proven loyalty for long-vacant jobs as hospital and ward attendants, cooks, waiters and similar posts.

At that time, however, Owens wrote the WRA that, "I do not yet know whether it will be possible or advisable to employ Japanese in these positions, but State institutions are desperately in need of help and we could assure those employed of fair and decent treatment.

"The number we would ask for would be dependent upon how many the institutions could use without upsetting their organization. However, I should say it probably would be around 50 or 60."

"BLANKET" DISAPPROVAL

The Governor said the board took the action without any great discussion or deliberation and he added that the State's policy in the future would follow the form of "no Japanese under State employ."

O'Connor further stated that though the question of hiring Japanese for farm labor had not arisen among board members, the action relating to State institutions indicated a "blanket" disapproval of using Japanese for any type of work anywhere in Maryland.

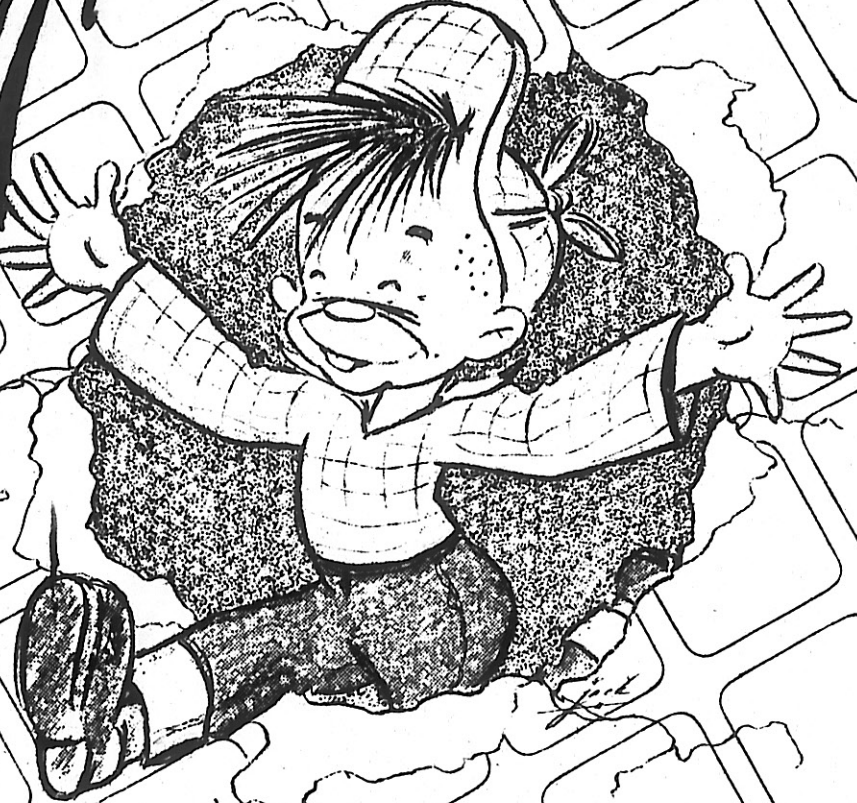
