

# THREE NISEI YANKS FIGHTING WITH THE 5TH ARMY CAPTURE FOUR GERMAN PRISONERS

Sergeant Victor Akimoto, a former Amachean, along with Staff Sergeants Toshio Murakami and Thomas T. Nikaido, both of Hawaii, distinguished themselves recently by capturing without use of any weapon four German soldiers while fighting with the Fifth Army in Italy.

After many hours of pur-

suing retreating Germans in the hot sun, the weary trio was headed for a refreshing bath in a stream when they unexpectedly came upon the four Krauts 10 yards ahead and to the left in a clump of bushes.

The hesitant nisei threesome were without arms but the Germans proved more

frightened for they too were minus their weapons and had their arms in the air. Promptly taking advantage, the three Joe Nisei triumphantly marched the four prisoners back to the company command, when the Germans indicated they had no arms by slapping their trouser pockets.

## MEN NEEDED FOR WATER SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION

This is the second urgent call for ten to 12 men wanted on the construction of the proposed center-wide irrigation system.

## CITIZENSHIP RENOUNCING BILL SIGNED BY PRESIDENT

The President on July 1 signed a bill simplifying the method by which the US citizens may voluntarily renounce their citizenship.

According to Project Director James G. Lindley, this law does not compel any American citizen to renounce his citizenship nor does it make it possible to deprive any person of citizenship against his will. However, it does provide a means for an American citizen to renounce his citizenship if such is not contrary to the interests of national defense. Thus, persons subject to the Selective Service act cannot use the law as a device for evading draft.

The new law, effective only while the United States is at war, will not become fully operative until the Justice Department publication of the necessary regulations.

## MAY NAME ALIENS BENEFICIARIES

Alien Japanese may be named as beneficiaries of insurance purchased by nisei US servicemen; evacuation into relocation center or internment for duration notwithstanding.

Obtaining of special license by the beneficiary from the Treasury Department is not necessary to receive direct payment, provided he is entitled to the benefits of general license 68-A.

## 26 TULE LAKE JAPANESE ALIENS REMOVED TO INTERNMENT CAMPS

During last three months, 26 Japanese aliens have been transferred from Tule Lake segregation center to enemy alien internment camps under the Justice Department jurisdiction, announced Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes, recently.

The aliens were men who

were arrested for playing active part in last November's disturbance and have since been confined in a fenced-off stockade at the center. At the time of the disturbance all aliens and 229 citizens, suspected of complicity, were placed in the stockade.

He says: "Who are members of a race that we are supposedly fighting." In that, Mr. Liggett is wrong again. We are not fighting a race of people; we are fighting the Japanese Imperial Government. If Patriot Liggett would check the rolls of the American Army today, he would find that members of that "race" have done some wonderful fighting for us in the European theater; he will discover among the heroes who wear the Purple Heart and other decorations many, many boys who are descendants of Japanese ancestors. These many war heroes certainly deserve the same type of American consideration that Mr. Liggett would want for his children.

## Renouncing Citizenship

There has been a good deal of misunderstanding about Public Law No. 405, passed recently by Congress and signed on Monday by the President. The law makes it possible for citizens of the United States voluntarily to renounce their citizenship--provided the Attorney General finds that such action is not contrary to the interest of the national defense. Americans residing in foreign countries have always been able to do this. Now Americans residing in the United States can do it, too, if they so desire.

But the law emphatically does not--as has been mistakenly supposed--take citizenship away from anyone. Nor does it empower the Government to deprive any person of his citizenship. It was designed primarily to enable persons of Japanese ancestry who happen to be American citizens by virtue of birth in this country to give up their citizenship and declare themselves subject of Japan. If they choose to do this--and in all probability a number of them will--then they may be treated as enemy aliens and interned accordingly. But none of them will be compelled to renounce his citizenship. And none will have his citizenship taken away on grounds of his racial origin or his disloyalty to the United States.

It would be an unparalleled breach of American principles to revoke the rights of citizenship because of an individual's ancestry or because of his beliefs. To do so would make citizenship nothing more than a temporary franchise dependent upon good behavior--that is, behavior in conformity with majority opinion. Minority elements in the population would be rendered helpless. Indeed, no American could feel secure. We could pursue such a course only at the sacrifice of the most essential of our freedoms.

Former Amachean, Masao Satow of YMCA national council in Milwaukee, Wis., recently wrote to the Milwaukee Journal commending its stand on what is right and decent and American as expressed in its June 14 editorial, "Mistreating Fellow Americans."

Stated Satow, "--we have learned that democracy requires energetic encouragement and eternal vigilance, lest we who believe in it forfeit it by our indifference.

"Democracy is not a commodity which once achieved we have forever. It is a process involving continuous effort.

"We have faith in Democracy. But people must be enlightened as to the facts. Some of the most rabid racists have sons fighting in the south Pacific. But they do not know that their sons are safer because many of our Japanese-American boys are out there with them in the intelligence service."

## EVACUEE RETURN TO WEST COAST NEAR OPINES WRITER

The West coast is awakening to the realization that reopening of the doors for the return of evacuees is inevitable, perhaps even before the war ends, Lawrence E. Davies stated in the July 9 New York Times.

Speeches and resolutions dealing with the question of 112,000 persons of Japanese ancestry, who were evacuated from the West coast two years ago, stress the phrase "constitutional rights" more and more, added Davies.

Of course, this does not mean that many persons, who favor an economic and social boycott of those of Japanese blood, will accept with clamor the prospect of evacuee resettlement in the West coast states. But even the most vociferous speakers find difficulty in mustering words to brush aside the mito arrangements of the Purple "carts won by nisei in Italy.

# CHICAGO HOSTEL REVEALS INTERESTING ANALYSIS

Analysis compiled by Henry Ishizuka for Brethern Relocation hostellers of Chicago, Ill., for one-year period (March 1, 1943 to March, 1, 1944) reveals some interesting facts.

It seems that male are more relocation minded, outnumbering the females by 64-36 percentage mark, while single people far outnumber married people by 82-18 percentage margin.

Average stay in a hostel is about 10 days, while number of days between arrival and work is little under 9 days. Average beginning wage for male is \$31.33, and \$24.44 for female; average rent paid is \$4.70 a week.

### PORTRAIT OF PATRIOT

BILL, as he was no doubt known to his pals back home, must have been just an ordinary guy--but "great!" An adventuresome sort of a fella who made up his mind early in life as to what he wanted to be.

He was born and reared within a stone's throw from Moffat Field, Sunnyvale, Calif., where soldiers trained long before Pearl Harbor. While Bill was still in his knee pants, he was associating with servicemen--in fact, one of them even played marbles with him.

Young Bill was fascinated by this friendly soldier's uniform and the shining medal he wore--right then this nisei youngster must have made up his mind to become a soldier when he grew up.

SCENE changes. Bill was old enough now to go out in the world so he left the family farm and hiked over to Texas where he got a job. Then war broke out, and Bill voluntarily enlisted at Camp Bowie, Texas. And running the gamut of various training camps, Bill finally landed in Camp Edwards, Mass., from where he was shipped overseas to north Africa and thence to Italy--to make the supreme sacrifice.

THAT is the story of 23-year-old Staff Sergeant Bill Iwao Yamaji of Mountain View, Calif., who was reported by the War Department as "killed in action on 15 June 1944 in Italy."

No doubt many of us, like myself, have not had the pleasure of meeting Sergeant Yamaji. For that, we have missed something terribly close to our hearts--an unselfish giver of life to his country.

This is indeed a portrait of a nisei patriot.

## LACK OF WORKERS MAY FORCE CENTER COAL SHORTAGE

This winter, more than ever before, the critical coal shortage will affect almost every community in the country, particularly in the eastern states where supply will be curtailed. However, states Alton O. Mead, procurement officer, Amache is very fortunate

in obtaining sufficient coal contracts for this winter.

But, according to Ralph J. Mitchell, property and warehouse officer, the center is confronted with the grave situation of unloading the coal as it arrives. At present, the incoming supply cannot be handled properly by the small crew now engaged; an addition of 15 men is urgent. All coal for center consumption must be delivered before the end of this year, and the cars must be unloaded on schedule or the Army Quartermaster may divert the supply to other channels.

Coal is conveyed into truck by a mechanical device, but men are needed to "feed" the machine. Rate of pay is \$19 a month, gloves and coveralls furnished. Interested persons are requested to see Walter N. Moors, personnel officer, immediately.

appeal, a WRA statement disclosed yesterday.

The first session of the board of appeals to hear cases, where application for leave clearance has been denied by the director of the WRA, will be held at the Tule Lake camp on July 29. Chief Justice James H. Wolfe of the Supreme Court for the State of Utah and Bruce Bartley, Seattle attorney, will constitute the board.

Only persons who previously have been denied clearance and are now residents of the camp may appear before the board for a review of their cases and be represented by counsel, the statement said.

A fact-finding committee, composed of administrative employees, reviewed the cases of persons rounded up and made recommendations to the project director. Aliens whose records made them eligible for internment were gradually transferred to Justice Department camps, and citizens who had records as chronic troublemakers were retained. Others were released after confinement ranging from two to eight months.

There are no aliens in the stockade at present, although 25 citizens of Japanese ancestry, who are not eligible for transfer to internment camps, still remain.

He was born in Hayward, Calif., and the family later moved to Mountain View, Calif., where they operated a berry farm. He received his grade and high school education in Mountain View schools.

Surviving him are two elder sisters, Mrs. Kazuko Nakahara of Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Alice Haruko Miyao of Little Rock Ark., both wives of servicemen, two younger brothers, Tom in Chicago, Ill., who recently passed pre-induction physical examination, and Frank in this center; and three younger sisters, Grace Sumiko in Cleveland, Ohio, Frances and Arlene in this center.

The Yacajis voluntarily moved to Yuba City, Calif., then evacuated to Arboza (Marysville, Calif.) assembly center, thence to Tule Lake relocation center, Jerome relocation center and just recently to this center--five moves in all.
