## EMERGENCY VISITS ONLY TOTULE LAKE

Emergency situations only will be considered, stated National Director Dillon S. Myer in recent press release, in granting future visits to the Tule Lake Segregation center. This restriction became necessary due to special situation at Tule Lake, which creates difficult administrative problems when other evacuees visit the center.

Death or serious illness in the immediate family will be deemed sufficient cause for granting visiting permits. Other reasons will not be recognized except in special cases, while servicemen will be shown special considerations.

Pfc. Ichikawa volunteered for service from this center in June, 1943, and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., before going overseas with famed 442nd Infantry.

## RESIDENTS AID FARM OUTPUT

# **NISEI POTPOURRI**

## **A POSER**

A 19-year-old Ralph Lazo Mexican-American youth of Los Angeles, passed himself off as a Japanese American and spent two years in the Manzanar relocation center. Young Lazo registered as a nisei in May, 1942, and allowed himself to be evacuated to Manzanar, so that he could be with his Japanese-American friends.

This is indeed a strange story of a very strange case. But more interesting than strange is the questions this fiction-like incident brings up on Japanese assimilability. If a Mexican American can pass as a nisei, can a nisei pass as a Mexican American? And if so, then is a nisei assimilable in the same sense a Mexican American is assimilable? Or is a Mexican American unassimilable because he can pass as a nisei, who is not (according to our Caucasian oritics) assimilable? Or would you much rather answer which came first, the chicken or the egg?

## **ON DISCIPLINE**

MAYOR La Guardia recently stated over the radio that children are not getting enough training in good manners. Perhaps Mr. La Guardia meant the children of New York, but he couldn't have expressed himself more truthfully if he was the Mayor of Amache.

Of course, it's nothing new for an older group to judge the up-and-coming generation as a "bunch of no-accounts." And yet, there's inescapable evidence that there is something wrong with our center's inculcation of good manners. Our present system of discipline is producing too many noisy, rabble-rousing, ill-mannered, disrespectful clans of youngsters—who must some day grow up to be American citizens.

There is no set standard for good manners because it changes with time and place. But it's safe to say majority of urchins in here haven't the slightest

## **MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL FILED IN TREASON CASE**

Defense Attorney Kenneth Robinson filed a motion in the US District Court in Denver asking for a new trial for the Shitara sisters who were convicted of conspiracy to commit treason for siding two German war prisoners to escape.

The three sisters, formerly of Inglewood, Calif., prior to evacuation to Granada relocation center, are Mrs. Tsuruko Wallace, Mrs. Florence Shive Otani and Mrs. Billie Shitara Tanigoshi.

The motion contends the government did not prove conclusively that the object of the conspiracy with which the sisters were charged, was treason. If

I want to be assured that when they read in their history books of the attack on Pearl Harbor, they need not be ashamed. They will have the right to be proud of their citizenship."

## **MEXICAN YOUTH POSES AS NISEI FOR TWO YEARS**

For two years Mexican-American Ralph Lazo lived happily with his friends at Manzanar relocation camp, (Calif.), for persons of Japanese ancestry. Last week he was discovered. About to be inducted into the Army, officials asked the 19-year-old boy why he had registered a fake nationality.

"My Japanese-American friends at high school were ordered to evacuate the West Coast," Lazo explained. "So I decided to go along with them. Who can say I haven't got Japanese blood in me? Who knows what kind of blood runs in my veins?"

H. R. Smith of the local post office announced yesterday that small packages of intrinsic value may be registered for overseas mailing. Such mail must comply with the following postal regulation:

(These registered articles must be sealed and bear the first-class rate of postage and be prepared adequately for overseas shipment in parcels weighing not more than eight ounces, and the mailing (a not registration) thereof must be specifically requested by the addressee.) Employer will furnish transportation and meals both ways. Wages will be 50 cents an hour, 10 hours a day, six days a week; plus room and board. Good housing and furnishings.

## MEDINA COMPANY OFFERS GROUP RELOCATION JOB

The H. W. Madison company, makers of pickles and mayonnaises, wants 30 workers -- men or women. The company is located in Medina, Ohio, about 30 miles from Cleveland.

If the company can obtain 15 families, at least one man and one woman will be hired from each family. Other employable persons in each family will be considered for placement. Ordinarily this concern employs as many as 400 people, at present there are about 150 employees.

Men will receive 70 cents an hour after 8-week break-in period, during which they receive 65 cents an hour. Women will be paid 52 cents an hour after 8-week break-in period, during which the pay is 47½ cents an hour. Men will work 50 hours a week minimum, with time and half over 40 hours; while women will work 48 minimum hours, with time and half over 40 hours.

The attitude of the union and the workers is said to be favorable towards evacuee acceptance, and persons of Japanese ancestry will not be replaced by other workers when war ends.

of woodwork for one unit of credit.

3. Vocational Agriculture class--two units of credit for three periods daily and any necessary additional time. Students taking this course for school credit will be paid only for work done outside of required classroom and applied work.

4. Auto Mechanics class--one unit of credit for two periods daily. Exploratory Mechanics class--one-half unit of credit for a single period.

5. Mechanical Drawing class--one unit of credit for a single period. Students will be required to do some outside preparation.

6. Students who have been doing passing work may register for one one-half credit course, in addition to usual academic load.

Students who wish to enroll in any of the above courses must register at the high school office on either Monday or Tuesday, Aug. 21-22. The office will be open until 5:30 p.m. on those days.

Schedules will not be changed after this date, Principal Walter stated.

Since homemaking and woodwork classes will meet for one period daily, instead of the customary two periods, and since those carrying the usual academic load may also register, increased enrollments are anticipated. Boys may also register for homemaking.

Forty per cent of our pupils come from farm homes, therefore enrollment in vocational agriculture should be much larger, added Walther.
