## OUTCOME OF LA CASE MAY SET PRECEDENT

Dr. George A. Ochikubo of Topaz relocation center left Salt Lake City last Friday for Los Angeles, where the injunction suit in his behalf, which will be a test case for the right to nisei to return to the Pacific coast, will be heard in the Federal court.

Maj. Gen. Charles H. Bonesteel is expected to be one of the chief witnesses under an order to show cause why Dr. Ochikubo should not be permitted to return to the West Coast.

Accompanying Dr. Ochikubo was Attorney Saburo Kido, national JACL prexy, who is serving as one of the counsellors. Both were given special permits by the Western Defense Command to travel to Los Angeles without escorts.

The outcome of this case will be watched closely as it will set a precedent for those having no military connections or cases of mixed marriages. Dr. Ochikubo's case will disclose

## FILE ALIEN LAND ACTIONS

Three escheat actions were filed recently in the Santa Ana, Calif., superior court by the district attorney's office against the families of Shosuke and Taka Nitta, and several other individuals, including their children, alleged to own lands in Orange county in violation of the alien land law. A total of 55 acres is involved.

The State contends that alien-born Mr. and Mrs. Nitta acquired the land through other parties and then transferred title to their sons—Hitoshi in Poston and Minoru in Cleveland—when they became of age. The court is asked to declare the titles invalid on grounds that they were perpetrated to evade the alien land law.

## LIKE A LETTER FROM HOME

THEY SAY there's nothing like a "letter from home." Well, the other day I came across an item in a California newspaper--THE SACRAMENTO UNION--that was the next best thing. Because the writer, Lieut. Marshall Haines, and the recipient, Vernon MacCann of the AUBURN JOURNAL, both were good friends of mine, and perhaps still are--judging from their actions.

This item was all the more interesting because Placer county, my home district, happens to be one of the well known "anti" sections of California.

I will quote the item in its entirety, so that you, too, may feel thankful that there are people like Lieutenant Haines.

PLACER COUNTY--Lieut. Marshall Haines, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Haines of Auburn, writes from Italy that he is "proud to say I have fought in the front lines for over six months alongside a Japanese-American unit." "The liaison officers from my battalion say that this Japanese-American infantry outfit is the best damn infantry they have ever worked with."

The letter written to Vernon MacCann of the Auburn Journal further stated:

"See where there is a lot of controversy about the Japanese returning to California. Also that proper respect has not been shown the Japanese-American soldier. Things like that sure go against the grain with me.

"The Japanese division I am with is no newcomer to the game of war, as it was the first division to sail after war was declared. It now has 31 months overseas and has more time in the front lines than any other division in the Army."

Haines tells in the letter of one of his experiences with the Japanese unit.

"We had been sitting and living in foxholes at Anzio some 63 days. Then

the last issue of the "IO-MEER". Its cry for more workers is just as loud, if not louder, as any section in the center and rightly so, considering the nature of its need.

Following is its tale of woe:

All operations and projects in this section are functioning on greatly curtailed basis. Pump operators, plumbers and electricians most-needed. The garbage disposal crews operating with half the necessary number of men, resulting in many complaints. Maintenance crews under properly functioning quota, carpenter shop has no employees, ditto all construction crews. Only three men on irrigation crew, should have 20. Hospital boiler house has no workers where 10 are urgently needed. Janitorial service requires more workers as colder weather approaches. Operations of this section is one of the hardest hit on the center.

According to information released by Mrs. C. Brewer, home service correspondent of the American Red Cross

in San Francisco, V-mail letters to fighting men in the armed services overseas may be written in Japanese.

The San Francisco Red Cross headquarters wrote the national headquarters on the subject of writing V-mail letters in Japanese, and the following reply was received:

"We cleared the matter of V-mail letters written in Japanese with the Post Office and were advised that no complications would result if individuals in the United States wished to use this method of communication to servicemen."

to what extent the Army is willing to relax its exclusion covered his crime in regards to nisei civilians requesting permits to return to the evacuated areas, stated the national JACL headquarters. It is hoped that this case will be tried in court so it will not be handled on an individual basis, thus making it unnecessary to file other cases to test the validity to nisei rights in general.

Indications are for the Western Defense Command to set up a procedure to grant permits on individual basis, thereby eliminating the necessity of a test case.

**ADVANCES ON SOLDIER CARE**

The most remarkable advances in the care of the wounded men in the World War II, compared to the first world war, is "the relative absence of serious contamination of wounds," stated Col. Elliot C. Cutler, chief consultant in surgery in the European theater of operations.

Colonel Cutler said the relative absence of contamination is "due to the use of sulfa-drugs and penicillin," and the men's "excellent physical condition."

"One of the differences in this war and the last is that the surgeon has been pushed forward. We are taking the surgeon to the soldier as against bringing the soldier to the surgeon," the Colonel added.
