

# OBJECTIVE IS COOPERATION

The objective of the center administration and the evacuees under the present-day critical situation should be the joint cooperation in meeting the various

ramifications that may arise from any immediate problem. With that keynote, Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, yesterday afternoon delivered an

indirect broadside against any idea the evacuees may have in shirking their duty in maintaining an orderly center.

Slender, bespectacled head of the much criticized WRA was introduced by Project Director Lindley and spoke for 30 minutes to about 350 evacuees and appointed personnel members in the high school auditorium.

Time for final adjustment is close at hand, he stated, as the lifting of the West Coast exclusion order may be expected in the not too distant future. Perhaps "not tomorrow, nor next month, nor next several months," but surely plans for such a return would be in order for those so inclined. And when the ban is lifted, the return to the Coast will be on the same basis as relocating to any other area in the country, Myer added.

Granada center will not be closed as "rumored," he continued. No plans have been made to close any of the centers, only the arising of urgent and unlooked for necessity would change the present program.

Director Myer was high in his praise of the 100th Infantry and the 442nd Combat Team, and said it was their unstinted bravery and loyalty shown on Uncle Sam's every battlefield that was breaking the resistance of the West Coast race haters.

Amache nisei are reminded by the California state officials in charge of voting that all who plan to vote in the Nov. 7 general election must be registered 60 days prior to the election date. No one will be allowed to vote unless he has previously registered.

### COMBAT FIRE HAZARDS

Calling fire fighting a science and fire prevention a matter of common sense, Rumley pointed to the ascending curve of country's fire losses in the last few years, and urged the residents to rout the fire hazards during the Fire Prevention Week and continue to rout them throughout the year.

Here is a list of "Do's" and "Don'ts" compiled by Chief Rumley that combat the fire hazards that dangerous-

ly hover over our center, ready to strike quickly and unmercilessly when our guards are down:

DO clean and repair defective and dirty heating plants, including flues and chimneys.

DO repair frayed electric cords, don't run them under rugs, and always disconnect appliances after using them.

DON'T be careless with matches and smoking. Keep matches in metal containers and out of children's reach. Never smoke in bed; be sure to put out cigarettes and cigars--don't let them smoulder.

# NISEI POTPOURRI

## "ANTI-JAP CLUB"

TODAY'S COLUMN will be devoted to the second of the two leaflets I spoke about in the last issue, which came from Long Beach, Calif., and signed "Anti-Jap Club." Like all propaganda leaflets, the statements contained within are basically "mountain out of mole-hill" type of literature, which a little thought will enable anyone to see the obvious and vicious misstatements wholly intended to fan the flame of bigotry and racial intolerance.

For instance, it says in part: "...here in our midst, I have spoken to hundreds of average citizens, and the unanimous consensus of opinion is against allowing Japs to become, or remain American citizens. The American people definitely want to revoke the American citizenship of all Japanese..."

If that is the unanimous consensus of opinion, mind you, it says unanimous, of hundreds of average citizens, then my respect for the thinking power of the average citizen has been severely shaken. But I do not believe "the average citizen" has slid down the scale of fair play so far as to hold such an opinion. I'm still "from Missouri."

Then it says, "...we must remember that our country, in the words of Lincoln, should be governed, 'Of the People, For the People, and By the People.' In this instance, the American people urgently desire to REVOKE the American citizenship of the treacherous Japs..."

As far as Lincoln's historic statement goes, I am heartily in accord. But I can't figure out why, if this nation is to be governed--"Of the People, For the People, and By the People," "hundreds of average citizens" should tell 120 million people just who should have their citizenship revoked. Another thing I can't fathom is just who are the "treacherous Japs"

## EDITORIAL

# NISEI HEROES

Newspapers which have reached us from the Territory of Hawaii abound in accounts of heroic services performed by American soldiers of Japanese descent on duty in the Pacific. We have heard something of the gallantry of these Nisei in Italy. For example, the 1300 men who comprise the 100th Infantry Battalion--all of them of Japanese ancestry--have earned 1000 Purple Hearts, 11 Distinguished Service Crosses, 44 Silver Stars, 31 Bronze Stars and three Legion of Merit decorations. But there has been virtually complete silence from the War Department concerning the valor of the Nisei in the Far East. We believe their story should be told--not merely in Hawaii, whence many of them entered the Army, but here in the continental United States, where some Americans have still to learn that devotion to democracy is not an inherited characteristic.

Nisei soldiers have played a vital and dramatic role in our succession of victories over the Japanese in the coral islands and steaming jungles of the Pacific theater of operations. Their knowledge of the Japanese language has been invaluable. And this has been principally because they were so often willing to incur terrible risks to make it effective. One of them allowed himself to be lowered by a rope into one of those huge caves on Saipan which the Japanese had utilized as centers of resistance; then by a combination of wit and bluff and bravery he contrived to obtain the release of all the civilians whom the Japs had herded there. In Burma, according to men who have been their comrades there, the Nisei proved themselves particularly intrepid and helpful, venturing into the enemy lines and throwing them into confusion by speaking their language. They have done no such deeds for the Navy or Marine Corps, to be sure; these branches of the service have never

holding American citizenship.

It further states: "Those soft-hearted (and soft-headed) humanitarians who want to immediately release all Japs among the American people, where they can really 'go to town' with sabotage; are the same ilk who used to gush over our 'misunderstood' gangsters..."

That is a peculiar and odorous comparison--the "misunderstood" gangsters and the relocation center evacuees. First are people who have known criminal prison records. Second are people whose only "criminal record" is their Japanese faces. There hasn't been a single known case of sa-

botage by the alien Japanese or the Japanese Americans, yet we are accused of being able to "go to town" with sabotage--that, guys and gals, is a rank insult.

IT is hardly plausible that clear thinking, fair-minded American citizens will be duped by such crack-pot-ish rantings. Yet, we must be ever vigilant and watchful of our rights as American citizens, because in the razzle-dazzle of war-hysteria even the most untruthful statements can germinate in the minds of the people who are either indifferent or ignorant of the question.

So, on your guards, fellow nisei!

## DISTURBANCE BY NEGRO TROOPS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14--Henry Stimson, Sec retary of War, admitted there had been a "disturbance" at Camp Claiborne, La., and "the matter is now in the process of investigation and punishment." His statement was in reply to a news conference question regarding a published article which called upon him to say whether several thousand Negro troops had mutinied at the camp last month.

He gave no further detail except to say that the number of troops was "nothing like" the figures mentioned in the article.

## 35 MINIDOKANS CONVICTED OF DRAFT EVASION

Thirty-five nisei from Minidoka relocation center were convicted on charges of failing to report for selective service induction by Boise, Ida., a Federal Court jury of three women and nine men, who deliberated only five minutes in arriving at its decision.

Hitoshi Gene Akutsu, 18, of Seattle, Wash., conducting his own defense, regarded himself solely as a citizen of Japan, because he has been confined behind barbed wire and "held under duress" since the Pearl Harbor incident.

known as "Application for Absent Voter's Ballot." This form must be executed and returned to the Registrar of Voters or to the County Clerk of the county of the voter's residence between Sept. 8 and Nov. 2, 1944. Applications returned more than 60 days or less than 5 days prior to the election, except by members of the armed forces, will not be accepted.

Voters whose residence is in Los Angeles or San Francisco should write to the Registrar of Voters at their respective residence for the application, while all others should write to the County Clerk of the county of their residence. In executing the Application for Absent Voter's Ballot, the voter must give his home address as well as the address to which he wishes the ballot sent. Instructions will be sent with the ballot and should be carefully followed.

seen fit to permit their enlistment.

The War Department's expressed reason for its silence about such exploits is that the men's families, if still in Japan, might suffer reprisals from the Japanese. It seems to us a curious explanation. In many cases, the families of these men are not in the hands of the enemy at all but in the hands of an agency of the United States Government. They are "detained" in "relocation centers" because the War Department lacks sufficient faith in American democracy to permit them to return to their homes. And in other cases, the caution strikes us as excessive; it is not applied to men whose families may be subject to Nazi reprisals in Lithuania or Czechoslovakia or Norway. The Nisei have made a magnificent record in this war. Their fellow Americans ought to hear about it--if only to assure their families better treatment here at home.

# PRESENT SILVER STAR TO FORMER DINUBA NISEI

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY,--Sgt. Noboru Tagioka, formerly of Dinuba, Calif., a wire chief of the 442nd Battalion headquarters company, was presented the Silver Star for gallantry in action. The presentation was made while convalescing recently in an army base hospital in Italy.

Sergeant Tagioka kept communication lines between the battalion and regimental headquarters open on the Fifth Army front during a heavy concentration of fire.

The Sergeant's citation stated that when the "telephone lines connecting the battalion CP, the regimental CP and the front lines were knocked out," Tagioka, "on his own initiative, took his repair kit and made his way...in the midst of terrific barrages. Tracing the lines in full view of the enemy, he located the damaged lines and repaired it."

And "he continued to patrol the lines for more than an hour, making repairs as the lines were blown apart by shells. It was... while repairing a line that Tagioka was wounded seriously by shrapnel."

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Kango Tagioka of Poston relocation center, he entered the Army on Oct. 21, 1941, at Sacramento, Calif.,
