## FARM HARVEST

## CONTINUES WITH SKELETON CREW

Seasonal work leaves really cut into the farm division's pool of essential workers this month when its key men left the center.

However, following the farm motto--"We do the best"--the present skeleton crew has been doing its daily work capably in harvesting seasonal vegetables.

Here is the score: 700 sacks of onions, A. Nakano, supervisor; 828 sacks of potatoes, K. Matsumoto, supervisor; 300 crates of daikon, K. Daikai, supervisor; and winter squash harvest on full swing, H. Fuchigami, supervisor. First deliveries were out yesterday under K. Kumagai's supervision, and will be delivered to the mess halls soon.

All this thanks to the splendid cooperation of the community-minded evacuee residents, stated Nobuo Sakamoto, general farm supervisor.

And way out yonder on the XY ranch, 2000 tons of corn and sorghum were silaged for livestock feeding under the supervision of Y. Asai and T. Uyeda.

Farm division is making another urgent appeal for more workers, male and female, for the canning of tomatoes and other seasonal vegetables crops. It takes

11,000 gallons of tomatoes to feed the evacuees during the winter. With timely help from the various block residents through the cooperation of the block managers, the project cannery was able to start operation, but more hands are needed immediately to keep going at normal speed during the canning season.

## RELOCATES 3,000; JOB THIRD DONE, MYER

DENVER--One-fourth of the persons of Japanese descent who were evacuated from the West Coast will not return "home" was the prediction made by Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, last Sunday.

That should not alarm the people of this region, stated Myer, because the number concerned "will be such a drop in the bucket...that any fears of business competition are groundless." Fewer than 20,000 persons involved will be scattered all over the country. And there won't be a mass settlement of persons of Japanese descent in Colorado and anywhere else, Myer added.

## Crusade On Fires

### PROCLAMATION

Fire uncontrolled is a menace to our individual and national safety.

Fire may destroy valuable property and sometimes it causes loss of life. You or I, our friends and our loved ones might be victims.

Any loss of human life, any loss of useful materials hinder and impede our war efforts.

Nothing less than united vigilance and effort of all the people will suffice to break the grip of this menace.

Now, therefore, I, James G. Lindley, Project Director of the Amache Relocation Center, do hereby designate the week beginning Oct. 8, 1944, as Fire Prevention Week and I earnestly request the people of the project to give special heed to the importance of taking active measures during the week and throughout the year to conserve our human and material resources from the destructive toll of fires. I solicit the cooperation of all the divisions and section heads as well as the residents of the project with a view of promoting realization of the dangers of fire and knowledge of the method of controlling it.

On the question of lifting the West Coast exclusion order before the war is over, the WRA director said that was "entirely up to the Army."

Director Myer conferred with the project directors at their 3-day conference in the Cosmopolitan hotel here. He is scheduled to leave for Los Angeles, from where he will start a speaking and inspection tour up the Pacific coast.

"We're relocating about 450 persons a week. A total of more than 31,000 have been relocated...the job is more than a third done," he continued.

"Our big problem has been, not getting communities to accept people (evacuees)... but to convince people in the centers, especially older ones, that they will be accepted without resentment.

"Oh, we've had a few incidents, but nearly all Americans realize the saying, 'A Jap is a Jap' is not necessarily true," Myer concluded.

## LACK OF FAITH

LACK of information and lack of understanding of the question were given as reasons for the failure of the evacuees to give center-wide approval to the proposed manpower commission. To those add--lack of faith. There may have been two reasons for this--passive and active. Let me explain.

First from the inability of some councilmen to explain the proposal in such a manner that faith in this commission would be readily deserved and forthcoming. Thus, a passive resistance on the part of block residents to give their approval freely rules their minds.

Second from the inability of some block residents to honestly harbor the desire to place trust in their block representatives. Perhaps they feel rightly that any approval they may give to any proposal with administration connection of any sort carry one-way obligation--for the evacuees. On that score they are not to be censured. They may also feel the recommendations emanating from this manpower commission will not only place responsibility but the actual "muscle work" on them. I think the past record--volunteer system--bears them out.

IF the resident's approval is to be elicited, they must be clearly assured that the administration will do its just share in alleviating the crisis--not only the present one but others that may arise--not by suggestions alone but by "lending a hand."

On the other hand, the evacuees must realize that whatever the outcome, the council will do its best to represent the people and their rights. It could not function as a community council otherwise. They must also realize that the manpower commission is a body to study the labor problem and make recommendations ONLY--it will not be given any arbitrary pow-

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## REGULATORY SUPERVISION

Early last week the NEW CANADIAN (Kaslo, BC.) reported that "Regulatory supervision of persons of Japanese race in Canada is likely to be continued even after the end of the war, in order to effect a geographical distribution of this minority group across Canada." This indication was attributed to Arthur MacNamura, Canadian department of labor minister and director of national selective service.

Late last week in the local high school auditorium Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, told the evacuees that if and when the West Coast exclusion order is lifted, the return to Pacific coast will be handled on the same basis as relocation to any other area in the country. He further stated the WRA was against group relocation; that resettlement to any state or city must be a "step by step" process. Don't do any wishful thinking on that, Myer continued, not even to the Coast.

In other words, the evacuees may expect certain degree of "regulatory supervision," if reading between the lines is of any indication. We certainly cannot look for a mass anvil chorus on "California, Here I Come."

We agree that return to California is not advisable at first. BUT we are against any type of long range "regulatory supervision" of our movements that may "ball and chain" our normal right to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Above all, we wish to reserve the right to return, and in the words of a Californian, Dr. William Takahashi of University of Rochester, "to prove our loyalty and our right to citizenship among the people who have been suspicious of us." We firmly believe that we owe it to our fellow nisei servicemen, who are fighting and dying so that we may "live in peace, security, and dignity," to prove those points beyond reasonable doubt.

## AIDS 156 RELOCATEES

During the first three months of operation, the Greater New York hostel was host to 156 evacuees who

er. None of us can say how well this plan will work out. But surely we'll never know just by weighing orally its pros and cons--only by actual practice can we evaluate its worth. ## NISEI HERO MEETS OLD "FRIEND" IN DENVER

In Denver last week two old "friends" met in the old Courthouse Square. They first saw each other on Waiananalo Beach near Honolulu, Dec. 7, 1941, and it certainly wasn't love at first sight.

One was an inanimate thing of black metal, shaped like an oversize cigar. The Navy calls it a two-man Japanese submarine.

Other was five feet one inch soldier with Pacific and Mediterranean ribbons and bronze stars, and a Purple Heart spread across his khaki-covered chest. The Army calls him Private First Class Thomas Higa.

4. Residents requested to recheck their family and alien registration numbers to assure correct information.

Announcement of the completion of census taking will be made by the sounding of siren on the fire chief's car in each block.

Nothing much to add to information already given by Director Dillon S. Myer to the evacuees here last week. That was the gist of Project Director James G. Lindley's report of the project directors' conference held earlier this week in Denver. He said most of the discussion hinged on the liquidation of relocation centers after the West Coast exclusion order is lifted, but nothing definite has been set because the ban lifting is up to the Army, and the military authorities are prone to "keeping mum."

In one instance an evacuee reported the loss or theft of about \$1000 worth of jewelry. In many cases, evacuees, particularly young people, arrive in New York city with large amount of money in their billfolds--as much as \$250. Traveling with several thousand dollars worth of jewelry in their baggage or on their person is not uncommon.

With travel at an all time high, resulting in congested conditions, relocation officers advise relocatees to carry only necessary amount of money, and either establish a checking account or convert the balance into traveler's checks.

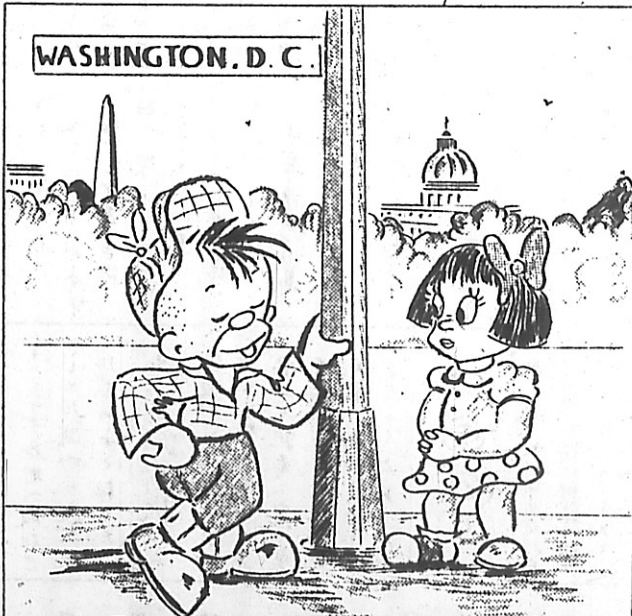
