SGT MATSUMOTO VISITS FAMILY

Coming home after 25 months of overseas duty as an aerial gunner, Sgt. Johnny Matsumoto is here visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank S. Matsumoto of 11F-8C. Veteran of 50 missions over the enemy lines in Italy, including some hot targets against Cassino, Corsica and the Anzio beachhead during the early days of "under-belly" Axis invasion, Sergeant Matsumoto is on his well-earned and deserved furlough. He has been with the Twelfth A.A.F.'s A-20 Boston group.

Being the only nisei aerial gunner in the Mediterranean area, Sergeant Matsumoto became quite a personage, and his devil-may-care flying comrades took quite a shine to him. He said at first he wanted to get into one of those heavy four-motor bombers, but when he went through the gyrations of a zooming A-20--he was plenty satisfied where he was.

Johnny is a native Californian, born in 1920 in a small town called Penn-grove. Later his family moved to Sebastopol, where they were apple dryers. He volunteered for the Army and was accepted on Dec. 1, 1941, and became an aerial gunner short time later.

SEES THE 100TH

He has a married sister, Emma Ishikawa; a nephew, Michael Jr., and a younger brother, Mickey, all in this center. His brother-in-law, T/4 Michael Ishikawa of the US Army is somewhere in the South Pacific.

He stated the first Joe Nisei he saw overseas were the 100th Infantry boys in Italy, among which were some of his friends. And they're doing a good job. Sergeant Matsumoto, tall and handsome, and every bit a true Nisei American stated, "I am proud and feel it an honor to be the first nisei aerial gunner in the Mediterranean theater of operations, and it certainly feels grand to be flying high in the sky."

COURT RULES AGAINST OCHIKUBO'S RETURN

LOS ANGELES--Dr. George Ochikubo's petition for an injunction to restrain the Western Defense Command from preventing his return was denied by US Judge Pearson M. Hall's court last week. Ruling came at the end of a day of arguments by A. L. Wirin, Dr. Ochikubo's attorney, and US Attorney Charles H. Carr.

The petition charged that the Army had threatened to use force, if the nisei doctor returned without its approval.

Carr, representing the military authorities, denied that any threats of force had ever been made and pointed out that Dr. Ochikubo's case had come before the Army Board of Inquiry, which contended his return would be a potential danger to national military security.



KELLEY ABOUT-FACES ON NISEI STUDENT BAN

LOS ANGELES--Saying "When I'm wrong I'll admit it, and I was wrong," George L. Kelley, stormy self-appointed chairman of his own Pasadena "Ban the Japanese committee," did a sudden about-face and applied for membership in the Committee for American Principles and Fair Play.

FORGOTTEN FELLAS

RELOCATION CENTERS' unfortunate children of destiny--our little sisters and brothers. They who must become stable men and women to carry on in the peace time future, the glory and heroism and loyalty bequeathed to them by their Joe Nisei brothers on today's far flung American battlefronts.

It is for the little brothers for whom we are most concerned. Where are they going? What will they grow up to be--laundry room laments? Answers to these questions will in a large measure depend on their parents--the very people who seem so unconcerned. And to us older nisei who have a deep sense of obligation to the boys "over there" to see that the coming generation will grow up to be good Americans.

Now, why do they congregate in a place that is so unhealthy to body and soul? Mainly because our barracks are crowded dwellings and not homes. When a folla brings his pals home to play, well, they at times play too noisily and too vociferously, as kids are wont to do. Sooner or later, usually sooner, either dad or mom gives them what is commonly called "holy heck." They run the gamut of homes and finally end up in the laundry room.

This condition will grow worse with the coming of winter when rain and snow drive them indoors. They want and need recreation, but how--especially in blocks where recreation halls are converted for other purpose.

WHAT to do?

In blocks where recreation halls are not available, how about converting one of the large barrack units into a recreation room? Of course, with enough guidance to see that it is not turned into a rough-house. With games to play, with books to read, with things to occupy the boys' time wholesomely.

However, since entering camp, conditions have somewhat changed in that the residence is definitely consolidated; in that the meetings for the most part do not interfere with work, and in that an interpreter is present for those having difficulty understanding the English language.

Parents are not merely asked to be members, but to take an active part in the local PTA activities; for furthering their children's interest and betterment.

We believe this organization is worthy of every parent's time and effort.--AA

CAGE SIGN-UPS NOW OPEN

Team sign-ups for the center basketball leagues in both the boys and girls divisions are now open and will remain open until Oct. 22 at the CA office, 3F recreation, announced the CA athletic department Monday. ELIMINATE HAZARDS OF FIRE TODAY

Farm, industrial and residential fires took increasingly higher toll of lives and property in 1943 over previous year.

Last year property loss reached over \$370,000,000, an increase of nearly \$60,000,000 over 1942. In 476 cities with an average population of 20,000, fire loss totaled almost \$130,000,000—for an average loss of \$2.37 for each inhabitant. In 1942 it was \$1.81.

When the causes of those fires are analyzed, the really tragic part of the story is revealed. Most of these preventable fires are due to carelessness with matches and with smoking, dirty and defective heating plants, inflammable cleaning fluids, accumulation of paper, rags, mattresses and like, defective electrical appliances, and use of wood and paper containers for ashes.

Purpose of the Fire Prevention week is to focus attention on these hazards and eliminate them. To reduce the devastating toll of fire, to protect our lives and our homes--by ridding our homes and our community of these hazards.

CHICAGO HAS NISEI ATTORNEY

CHICAGO--Thomas Masuda, believed to be the first relocatee admitted to the practice of law in Illinois, has opened his own office in the Metropolitan building. He was admitted on Sept. 18 without examination on the strength of his excellent West Coast record.

Graduate of the University of Washington law school and a member of the American Bar association, as well as Seattle and Washington State Bar associations, he practiced law in Seattle prior to evacuation. Hits Pressure Groups

HAWAIIAN NISEI ARE LOYAL, SAYS PASTOR

DENVER--Extremely proud of their fellow citizens of Japanese ancestry are the Americans of all origins in the Hawaiian Islands, according to Rev. Galen Weaver of Honolulu's The Church of the Crossroads. The Japanese Americans make up 34 per cent of Hawaii's population.

Reverend Weaver is here to campaign against Amendment No. 3, which will de-

prive the aliens ineligible to citizenship the right to own property in Colorado. He will speak in behalf of the Colorado Committee for Fair Play.

Many of the false stories and rumors regarding the role played by nisei (Hawaii) at Dec. 7, 1941, no doubt started from war hysteria, quined the Reverend, but it is time all Americans know them for what they are. He emphatically stated, "...there was no espionage or sabotage by Japanese residents, citizens or aliens, before, during or after the attack."

"We had 161,000 (of Japanese extraction) in 1941," he continued. "Of this number 73 per cent were citizens."

"They were utilized to rebuild devastated military establishments, to grow food and otherwise aid the war. The island treatment of this group is in sharp contrast to the California treatment and to the tragic evacuation."

The Honolulu pastor stated the land measure will increase racial misunderstanding and discrimination, and will worsen our standing in the entire Orient. It will be interpreted as hypocrisy, a repudiation of our professed racial unity and racial tolerance.
