# MISEI WITH MERRILL'S

There are ample proofs trickling in that GI Japanese Americans are in there pitching in the Far Eastern theater of operations. Latest news coming in to public attention is the 14 Joe Nisei serving with Brig. Gen. Frank Merrill (Merrill's Marauders) in Burma.

Among the group is Sgt. Henry Gosho, formerly of Seattle, Wash., who says, "I am proud to say that 14 of us were one of the first elements of Merrill's Marauders to leave the States. We were...readily accepted and the importance of dur work was recognized.

My baptism of fire came at Walawbeun (Burma) when our platform was flanked on all sides by Japs. We were caught in a cross-fire of machine guns and all I got in this four hour battle was a bullet hole in my pant lege!"

# ASK SUPREME COURT TO HET COAST BAN

WASHINGTON--US Supreme Court was petitioned this week by the attorneys-general of California, Oregon and Washington to lift the West Coast civilian exclusion

sion order against persons of Japanese ancestry, as soon as possible.

Joint petition was filed by the attorneys as friends of the court in the Fred Korematsu case and stated the high tribunal has emphasized in previous decisions that racial discrimninations are prohibited, except in most unu sual

circumstances.

"It was reasonable for military commanders to meet the danger threatened (after Pearl Harbor) from identified disloyal members of the group by excluding the group as a whole, "said the petition, but now "the restrictions...must be removed as soon as the military authority determines and the national security permits."

## MAWOR OUSTIER Of Napaniesie

LOS ANGELES-- Research
Jury of this city disclosed
that the proposal to ban
Japanese subjects from the
United States after the war
by constitutional amendment has the backing of
public opinion in Los Angeles county.

Approval of postwar deportation of Japanese nationals has grown in the last six months, the jury announced, but similar feeling against the nisei have somewhat subsided. This latest report issaid to be the result of personal cross section contacts with more than 1000 persons.

# Evacuee Land Owners

DENVER--Out of 64 Japanese aliens who now own farm lands in Colorado, only nine have purchased their land since Pearl Harbor, revealed James H. Curtis, officer in charge of the local WRA office.

According to Curtis, the nine were evacuated from the West Coast, while the remainder were residents of the state prior to evacuation. Eighty-four Japanese Americans own farms in Colorado.

There are now 7,986persons of Japanese ancestry in this state--5,772 citizens and 2,214 aliens. This number represents seventenths of one per cent of the state's population, added Curtis.

# Distribute Co-opChecks

Distribution of patronage refund checks, as declared at the membership meeting held last Aug. 31, will begin next week, announced Akira Inaba, Co-op executive secretary, Thursday.

Coming cash refunds will be one-half of 10 per cent refund declared on total purchase made during the last fiscal year (Sept. 1, 1943-Aug. 31, 1944), while the remaining 5 per cent will be distributed before Christmas. Inaba assured.
