HARVEST THIRD OF FARM CROPS

Over 800 willing volunteers from various center offices and high school gladly contributing their time and efforts this week harvested more than 80 acres of unions, tomatoes, potatoes and sorghum, smilingly stated William M. Fuller, assistant project director in charge of operations. This enthusiastic response to the farm harvest program resulted in a saving of thousands of dollars, in addition to an unrealized beneficial contribution to the whole center.

Project Director James G. Lindley concurred with Fuller and stated: "The program to complete our farm harvest before inclement weather arrives is proceeding very well. The cooperation shown by workers in all divisions and sections, block managers and their assistants is proving that by working together we are able to accomplish our objectives and bring desired results."

In citing the volunteers' accomplishments, Fuller happily manifested his appreciation for everyone's timely help. And as no let down in the farm program is contemplated, these sections volunteering this week are expected to return on their duly assigned day next week, he announced.

Conservative estimate of this week's harvest is set at about one-third of the crop, which still necessitates further participation of the volunteers. "If sufficient number of workers respond next week, there will be no further need of volunteer workers, was Fuller's opinion.

He asks consideration of the Japanese problem in Colorado on the basis of the background of the Japanese race.

DOUBLE-TALKER

DR. WELLS, the honorable mayor of Brighton, Colo., is indulging in some high class double-talk in supporting Amendment No. 3 on Colorado's Nov. 7 ballot. This proposed measure is, as you all know, more than a reasonably accurate facsimile of the California Alien Land law.

The mayor says he is not activated by any spirit of racial discrimination or prejudice, and yet the theme of his tirade is that the restricting of land ownership is one way of hitting at the Japanese. If that isn't discrimination, then they've changed the meaning of that word since I last stumbled through the Webster.

Aside from the measure's merits or demerits, on which Dr. Wells is a die-hard affirmative, it is his method of attempting to sway his listeners to his way of thinking that makes one wonder at the true make-up of this man.

He is, trying to expound the merits of the measure, not by its true worth, but by playing up the demerits of the character of the people at whom the measure is aimed. This, by condemning the Japanese race and the militaristic aims of Japan, the latter certainly is out of bounds as far as the amendment is concerned. Thus trying to educate the mind of his listeners, on the dangers of the "pound of cure," but slyly neglecting to state emphatically whether this proposed "ounce of prevention" is the best and the only possible solution.

Furthermore, the Mayor asks the consideration of the Japanese problem on the basis of the background of the Japanese race. If the Japanese in Colorado are a problem simply because of their race, then why aren't the Germans and the Italians in Colorado a problem? Certainly the Japanese militarists are no worse than the Hitler militarists and the defunct Mussolini militarists for starting World

COMMON SENSE WINS

A California outfit called the Japanese Exclusion association tried recently to round up the necessary 180,000-odd signatures to a petition for an initiative measure to make it virtually impossible for persons of Japanese descent to earn their livings in California. The petition failed by about 100,000 signatures--and California and common sense won, if you ask us, by the same score.

We don't hold with bleeding hearts and these advocates of a soft peace with Japan. But the facts in the Japanese-American case since Pearl Harbor simply go to show that measure like the one rejected in California are not necessary to our national safety.

In Hawaii itself, with a population some 40 per cent Japanese, Jap sabotage since Pearl Harbor has been practically nil--partly, of course, because of Army-Navy vigilance, but also partly because the great majority of Hawaiian Japanese are loyal to the United States. On the Italian front, a considerable number of Japanese-American troops have rolled up an admirable record. And we seem to have rounded up all, or almost all, disloyal Japs in the continental United States and interned them where they can't do us any harm.

Altogether, it looks as if the ancient American policy of giving minorities--any and all of them--a fair shake pays dividends, in peace and in war. Why, then, chip holes in that ancient American policy?

Besides, who made the Japanese in this country a problem? The racists and the economic patriots. After all, the Japanese on the Coast never thought of being a problem, they were minding their business.

ALL THIS is not intended as a crusade against Amendment No. 3, it could serve no such purpose as its readers in the main are non-voters of this State. But it should serve as an object lesson in steering our life's course and looking out for our future welfare. We must remember that while we are living complacently in a relocation center, there are people like Dr. Wells on the outside, who forget such things as the Constitution, tolerance, love of mankind--when such forgetfulness is expedient to their interests.

WASHINGTON--Reports that the Interior Department may attempt formation of large colony of former West Coast Japanese-Americans in the Central Valley Project of California were branded as "pure bunkum" by Harold L. Ickes, secretary of the Interior.

He said the department is studying plans under which large land holdings in excess of 160 acres on reclamation projects could be purchased for the resettlement of returning servicemen. However, Ickes emphasized that it had no connection with the relocated Japanese-Americans.

Draft Cases Handled By FBI Number 417,677

During the four years of the Selective Training and Service Act, the FBI has handled the cases of enough men to form an army of 33 modern infantry divisions, according to H. B. Fletcher, special agent in charge of the Cleveland office.

Fletcher said the bureau had closed 417,677 selective service cases up to Oct. 1, and the man involved in every instance was made available to the armed services or his case disposed of otherwise according to law. Convictions

totaled 10,490, out of which sentences totaling 26,780 years, one month and 13 days, and fines reaching \$92,859 were meted.

The bureau has 23,816 cases pending, against 295,184 uncleared delinquencies on Nov. 11, 1918.

It has handled 11,053 cases of failure to register, under the 1940 act, and of these 8,167 were not willful violators and registered on apprehension. Convictions for failure to register numbered only 1,240.
