

REPORT 5 MORE WAR CASUALTIES THREE KILLED IN FRENCH ACTION

Five more battle-front casualties of Amache nisei in uniform in France were reported by the War Department this week to their next of kin in the center. Three were killed in action and the other two were wounded, one for the second time.

Sgt. Harry Hiroshi Tokushima, native of Mitoville, Utah, was drafted from Los Angeles on Jan. 22, 1941, and trained at Fort Ord, Calif., and later graduated as radio technician at Washington, DC. He was transferred to Camp Blanding, Fla., and went overseas with the 442nd Infantry. He was reported missing in action on Oct. 27.

Only son of Mr. and Mrs. John Tokushima, Harry graduated from the Manual Arts high school in Los Angeles. He was the only nisei to

RECORD FAMILY RELOCATION

One of the biggest months for family relocation was reached in November when complements of 30 families consisting of 63 persons left the center, disclosed Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor, Monday.

During the month 93 indefinites, 19 trial indefinites and five seasonal leaves were granted to the evacuees. So far 3,141 indefinite leaves have been issued since the beginning of the center relocation program.

COAST BUDDHIST CHURCHES SYSTEMATICALLY PILFERED

"I was pleased to see the way evacuee property is handled. But the systematic pilfering of many of the Buddhist churches was very disheartening to me."

So stated Herbert J. Vatcher, center evacuee property officer, in his report of his recent trip to California to get first-

hand information on problems involving Japanese properties there.

He added that all WRA warehouses in San Francisco, Sacramento and the Los Angeles area are all fire-proof concrete buildings—each with a mothproof room. The WRA has contracts with the Bekins Van and Storage company in San Francisco and Sacramento, and with the Lyons Van and Storage company in Los Angeles, whose personnel are experts in handling household goods and commercial property, and are extremely careful in the handling of evacuee property.

Vatcher stated the present backlog of WRA forms 155—requests for storage of property, and forms 156—request for transportation of property are due to improperly prepared forms. A lot of time would be saved if more care was shown in filling out the forms, he added.

Nisei Shrapnel Victim Here

Pfc. Toshio Nagami, a seasoned veteran who fought with the hard-hitting 442nd Infantry and was wounded in the bloody Italian campaign, is visiting the Yamanes of 10E-5E.

In addition to the Purple Heart, Private Nagami has a good conduct pin and campaign bars for serving in the European theater of action, Africa and the Middle East.

He arrived in the States two months ago for operations on injuries which have affected his speech and movement of limbs on the right side of his body. He is now stationed at the Mayo General hospital in Galesburg, Ill.

Volunteering for the US Army in March, 1943, from Hilo, Hawaii, Nagami received his final training at Camp Shelby, Miss. He went overseas with the 442nd Infantry last April and was wounded in action on July 12; a shrapnel hit his head to put him in an unconscious state for nearly a month.

On last July 14 his younger brother was killed in action.

Here is truly a passing parade on nisei loyalty and heroism.

LAST SUNDAY afternoon, thanks to Amache's Goddess of Sports, the center fans were treated to by far the best three-card basketball program yet put on by the CA athletic department. All of the tilts were close and hard-fought, which had the rooters sitting on the edge of their seats--both.

As expected the thrill-packed battle had their share of shining stars on both the winning and losing sides. For instance, in the Katonks-Unknowns fracas, comparatively unknown (ironical) Sam Nozawa of the Katonks came through with six buckets in 10 attempts--that's sharpshooting. It was his unorthodox but net-swishing shooting that kept his team going at crucial moments. And Unknowns well-known Johnny Niizawa's four field goals in nine second-half attempts also come under the heading of terrific shooting. Mits Omoto's five free throw conversions out of six tries in the second half under pressure was a bit of cool tossing from the foul line.

Unknowns' Bobby Umekubo showed flashes of good backboard playing, but was below par compared to his performance against the G. Niseis.

On the other hand Nami Kinoshita, Flames' ambidextrous casaba tosser, gave a poor performance against the Spurs in scoring but 11 points--against the Densonettes she tallied 29. The Spurs' trio of tall defenders--Akiko Nakano, Margaret Makino and Helen Miyahara--had the Flames' vaunted offensive tried bottled up neatly, using their height to advantage. There only drawback was their slow, wobbly passes in getting the ball across the line.

Individually, Jean Yamasaki with her clutch scoring of four buckets in the Spurs' second-half rally gave the most sparkling per-

TIME FOR REDEMPTION

What should be one of the strongest organizations in Amache has been relegated to a position unenviable in local community affairs. Namely: the Amache Community Council.

This shameful council situation is primarily the fault of the residents, but they are not entirely to blame. In all fairness, the council body must share certain responsibility, and the administration isn't entirely blameless either.

It is an open secret that the council and the administration have been at odds for several months. It has failed to coordinate on community problems, working not as a team but as two strong minds unwilling to give in or give up; and yet hoping to be of some service to the center.

This revelation will bring denials from all quarters concerned, but it is time we faced the facts. We must let this be a lesson to us. We must correct whatever faults there may be on all sides. If the present attitudes and ways continue to persist, then our future will be no brighter than our past.

The coming council election gives all concerned a chance to redeem themselves.

The residents must take a greater interest in the community self-government program. They must weigh carefully the worthiness of their candidates--incumbents and newcomers--and vote in persons best qualified to represent their interests. And once voting them in the residents must back them up 100 per cent, as long as they remain good councilmen.

If the residents are careless and uninterested in their own welfare and how it is handled, then they have no cause to complain if their interests are neglected or mis-managed. And the next six months will be in all probability the most important six-month period since evacuation.

The council body, regardless of whether it contains incumbents not fully agreeable to the administration and now faces not fully experienced with the running of orderly community government, must be accepted in good faith by the administration as the will and the wish of the residents, and accord it the proper courtesy, cooperation, and the needed facilities to function properly.

And the council body in turn must take a greater recognition of its responsibilities and show more willingness to take active, positive and clear-cut action on problems requiring such response. It must function with a cool head and a warm heart, with a cooperative spirit, but also with a dash of "belligerency" to keep it from becoming a "rubber stamp"--either for the administration or the residents.

He is survived by his parents, two sisters, Yonoko of Chicago and Florence of this center, and a brother, Joe of Cleveland.

Pvt. Eso Masuda volunteered for the Army from Jerome (Ark.) relocation center on Nov. 16, 1943, and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., before going overseas with the 442nd Infantry. He was reported slightly wounded in action last Oct. 20.

He was born in Gardena, Calif., attending Norwalk High School and Fullerton junior college. The Masudas were evacuated from Artesia, Calif.

Surviving Private Masuda are his father in Chicago and mother in this center, a brother, Shige of this center and two sisters, Mrs. Hideko Ogawa of this center and Keiko of Chicago.

Pfc. Ernest Makita volunteered from this center for the Army in April, 1943, and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., prior to going overseas with the 442nd Infantry. This is Private Makita's second injury in action.

Sgt. Sam Hara was drafted from Los Angeles in February, 1942, and trained in an army camp in Wyoming, and went overseas with the 442nd Infantry.

EVACUEE TRANSPORTATION PLACED IN OPERATION

To provide an orderly conveyance of evacuee workers between their posts of duty in the administration area and points convenient to their respective blocks, a schedule of worker transportation was placed in operation last Monday, stated William Fuller, assistant project director.

Two round trips will be

made by six trucks operating from specific points on G. street to the administration area in the morning from 7:30 to 8 o'clock and in the afternoon between 4:30 and 5 o'clock. No transportation will be provided during lunch hours.

Third and F and 12th and G streets have been designated as the north and south terminus respectively, with stops being made at 10th and G, 8th and G, and 4th and G streets.

SET PRIORITY SYSTEM ON PROPERTY HANDLING

Because of large numbers of request for shipment and pick-up of evacuee property being received daily by the West Coast WRA property offices, there is a large backlog of these requests, according to information received by Herbert J. Vatcher, local evacuee

property officer, from Washington last week.

Therefore, it has been deemed necessary to establish a system of priorities for the handling of evacuee property now on the West Coast.

Priority for handling forms WRA 155 and 156 will be as follows:

1. Shipment of property to centers which would relieve undue hardship.
2. Pick-up and storage of property where loss or damage would result if it is not removed immediately from its present location.
3. Shipment of property to relocation points.
4. Shipment of property to relocation centers.
5. Pick-up and storage of property.

All emergency cases must be approved by the project director and specifically indicated as such, said Vatcher. All requests now pending in San Francisco may be reexamined, in view of above priorities, which may call for additional information. This will apply to household effects, commercial property and contraband.

In America, where girls are considered equal to boys, it is the usual thing for a girl to have several good boy friends. She needs to learn to be at ease around members of the opposite sex. She needs to learn to talk to them, and to have fun with boys as well as girls.
