

TO HEAR CASES OF CITIZENSHIP RENOUNCING

SAN FRANCISCO--Cases of American citizens of Japanese ancestry interned at Tule Lake center, who wish to renounce their citizenship will be heard by John Burling, representative of the Department of Justice.

Burling arrived in the camp last week to start hearings authorized by recently passed congressional legislation providing that any citizen during wartime may apply to the US Attorney General for permission to renounce his citizenship. The WRA did not disclose how many applications were received.

WAR WORK JOBS IN GOVERNMENT AGENCY

The government agency in Washington handling important war work will employ additional nisei and issei men or women to serve as Japanese language translators, writers, typesetters, and Japanese style artists and illustrators, according to information received by Willis J. Hanson, assistant relocation program officer, this week.

Applicants for translation work must have a good command of both English and Japanese, while it is preferable for writers to have had some college education in Japan and journalistic experience. No knowledge of the Japanese language is required for those applying as artists. Civil service rating may be obtained in some cases.

20 HAWAII NISEI GIs IN WEST COAST HOSPITAL

AUBURN, Calif.--Approximately 20 Hawaiian nisei soldiers, veterans of nearly every theater of operations, are being treated near here at the DeWitt Army General hospital, revealed Col. William H. Smith, commandant of the hospital.

Representing practically all the branches of the

service, including paratroopers and infantrymen, many suffered their battle wounds for which they are being treated on the Italian front. For example, there's Sergeant Imoto of Honolulu, a veteran of the Italian front, Southwest Pacific invasions and Saipan. He holds 13 different ribbons.

The patients were sent to the DeWitt General hospital because of army policy placing wounded soldiers in hospitals nearest their homes.

Servicemen say no matter how small I am, coming frequently I am better builder of morale than my bigger brother who may come now and then. Coming home my bigger brother picks up speed, but that's because he is often used as a ballast, however, going overseas he's a slow-poke. Even my other lighter brother, who is also air-minded, plays second fiddle to me--only I get to ride on the first plane out. And I am not only confidential but I am also easy on the pocketbook.

WORM IN THE APPLE

OUT WEST, up Oregon way there's a place called Hood River valley, which is considered one of the finest apple growing districts in the country. Just recently it came into national prominence in a far different way. What happened was somebody got careless and let an apple with a worm in it get by.

This particular apple did not grow on an apple tree--botanically speaking. It grew, of all places, on a branch of that patriotic tree called the American Legion, and the apple in this case is the Hood River legion post. And the WORM that has raised so much stink is the erasing of 16 names off of its war memorial honor roll. They didn't offer much in the way of reasonable reason for its action. They just felt that only names such as Jones or Smith or McCarthy or Johnson should belong on its honor roll; others should be taken off. And it wasn't their fault that these erased names happened to be Yamamoto or Saito or Ohji or Katsumoto. What reasoning power!

The Hood River post, bubbling over with patriotism, stated they wanted to let the nisei servicemen "know we don't want them back here." Perhaps the famous Oregon "mist" is clouding their thinking power and making them forget that if it wasn't for the millions of American servicemen of ALL NATION-ALLIES--there would be no such places as "back here."

Personally, I can't feature the type of mind that perpetrates such a cold-blooded act. I suppose I could learn to hate a person as fervently as any Hood River valley legionnaire, if I tried hard enough, but I couldn't hate anybody so blindly just because his ancestors happened to be different from mine--no matter what the cause. And I certainly couldn't be so ungrateful as to hate a man who was

NISEI FAMILY HOME AGAIN

PLACENTIA, Calif.--First Japanese-American family to return to Orange county since evacuation in May, 1942, was getting reacquainted with their 14-acre ranch and their neighbors.

William S. Fukuda, 41, a native of Yuba City, and his wife and their three children, Janet, 10; Louann, 7; and Mary Helen, 4, arrived last week from Colorado where he had been farm-

ing. Accompanying them was Shigoto Fukuda, his brother, who received an honorable discharge from the US Army about a year ago.

The Fukudas were given permission to reenter California by the Western Defense Command after approximately 60 days' investigation by the FBI and other government agencies. They were given a warm welcome by their neighbors.

TO THE SF CHRONICLE:

Editor--I have read in the Stars and Stripes of the action of a State official in saying: "The State of California will have nothing to do" with the return of American citizens of Japanese descent to their fighting and sacrificing his life so that I at home could continue to enjoy the freedoms of democracy.

BUT what we're really interested in is just what action will be taken by its parent organization in this matter. If Hood River's action is condoned without opposition, then indeed our sacrifice, meager as it is, for undergoing the woes of evacuation, and the much greater sacrifice of our nisei soldiers overseas will be ground to dust and blown away-- forgotten.

BUT if the trend of American thinking turns out to be like that of the men and women in the armed forces, then the Hood River post will find just retribution for its infamous act. For surely such an un-American act that makes hollow mockery of the very things we are fighting for cannot go unchallenged.

homes in California. I would like to make a few comments based on service with the Army in Italy since September of 1943. In the Fifth Army, which has had at one time or other some very famous and veteran outfits, the 100th Infantry Battalion has achieved a record that few outfits can equal. The commendations of the divisional commandor, the Fifth Army and of the War Department are all a matter of record. The 100th Infantry Battalion has also received a presidential citation. A record like theirs does not come easily. It means a lot of wooden crosses with dogtags nailed on, and it means a high ration of men with Purple Hearts. The men of this outfit were all Americans of Japanese descent, as are the men of the now 442nd Regiment. In Italy and now in France, they fought and died as Americans. In Italy they were considered as Americans by the rest of the Army, with no reservations.

From what can be read, except for the Japanese at Tulo Lake and the case in Colorado, the Americans of Japanese descent have behaved.

The Las Alegrias girls will continue to sell Christmas Seals all next week. This is for a worthy cause so don't forget to buy your share.

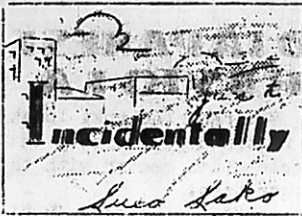

CHICAGO, Dec. 12--Another one of those confident nisei walked into USES office looking for a suitable job. During the course of our brief conversation, I got a sudden feeling of pity for him--because of his silly, childish dreams of getting rich overnight.

It was nearly a week later that our roads crossed again--and in the same building. He was definitely a different fellow. His once proudly held head and shoulders were sagging, and signs of dejection and bewilderment were plainly written on his tired-looking face.

Turning to me, he began to pour forth his woes and griefs. He vividly related how unsuccessful he had been in answering want ads. He even confided, how he came out of a relocation center just because a friend wrote he was making "plenty of money." Sorrowfully, he indicated that life was not a "bed of roses" as painted by this thoughtless friend.

To give encouragement to my crestfallen friend, I slowly turned back the pages of my sad experiences in Kansas City, Cleveland and here. For example, once I dared to apply for an office job with a firm that handled and awarded war contracts to various plants. As anticipated, I was a failure, but indelibly written in my memory is the unforgettable remark the personnel manager uttered upon learning of my racial ancestry, "Son, you're the first one of your people to answer this ad. In fact, the first one to step inside this building."

Stressing further setbacks that nisei must expect, I emphasized the most popular and polite method of nisei "brush-off"--"Sorry, we can't hire you." And that dreadful death drone--"Leave your address and phone number, and we'll notify you if you are ac-

 CITIZEN RETURNS TO LA**

LOS ANGELES--World War I veteran, Tadayuki Todah, 54, naturalized Japanese, returned to the city last week from Poston (Ariz.) relocation center with the full approval of the Army authorities.

Todah, a native of Japan,

came to Los Angeles in his youth with his parents and while still a Japanese citizen, volunteered in last world war and served in the US Army. In 1937 he applied for citizenship and qualified, receiving his naturalization papers.

This is the first release resulting from actions brought in Federal Court in behalf of several American-born Japanese and others who have been naturalized. Todah was represented in court by A. L. Wirin.

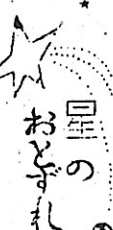
