This corrected information was released yesterday by the local internal security office.

Those listed on the call will dine tomorrow morning, 6:30 o'clock, at 7E mess hall, from where they will leave the center.

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## NEW MANUAL RELEASE

## GIVES DETAILS OF WRA POST-EXCLUSION PLAN

Further details of the WRA post-exclusion program, which went into effect at midnight, Jan. 2, 1945, have been supplied to Project Director James G. Lindley through a new manual release from the Washington WRA office. The program, as announced by Lindley, is as follows:

### Closing of centers: WRA

centers will be closed... not earlier than six months and not later than 12 months after revocation of the general exclusion orders (Jan. 2, 1945). At least three months advance notice will be given.

In connection with center closing, the new manual is worded as follows: "During the period that the West Coast area was closed to persons of Japanese ancestry, the chief function of the WRA was to help them find homes, either temporarily in relocation centers, or in normal communities outside the evacuated area. With the lifting of the general exclusion orders, it is still the duty of WRA to help the evacuees find homes. These differences exist: (1) Most evacuees are now free to return to their former homes in the evacuated areas. (2) While during the exclusion period the government was bound to provide temporary homes in relocation centers for those persons not yet able to resettle in communities outside the evacuated area, now that exclusion is lifted, the government cannot continue to provide subsistence and special services to evacuees eligible to leave the centers and return to the excluded areas, beyond a limited period of post-exclusion adjustment."

**Leave Policy:** All center residents not designated by the War Department to be ineligible... shall be eligible to leave relocation centers regardless of any leave clearance action hitherto taken by WRA.

## ICKIES — BAN LIFTING

### DUE TO VALIANT NISEI GIs

"It is a victory of faith in the principles of real Americanism, and of unflinching patriotism which has been so well exemplified by thousands of valiant soldiers, from the mainland and Hawaii, whose parents came from Japan," state Ickes in his message last week to GI Nisei on the lifting of the West Coast mass exclusion orders.

"This action," he continued, "is a well-earned recognition of the loyalty which the great majority of evacuee people of Japanese descent have displayed in the severest test that any group of Americans has ever had to face."

Ickes added that departing from the centers will involve difficult readjustments but ample time would be given them, and the WRA will give all the assistance possible. Federal and state welfare agencies will aid families that need special help.

"I send to you my wishes for your safe return home, and for a future in America endowed with the happiness that you have so well earned," the secretary concluded.

### SAYS NISEI

### RETIRED LA

### TOLERABLE

The atmosphere and conditions in Los Angeles were evidently quite tolerable to the nisei, and the prospects of resettling in California have become more promising. That is the opinion expressed by Robert Tashima, local evacuee relocation supervisor, who recently returned from a two-week sojourn in California.

He noted that he never had occasion to discuss the war or the evacuation as the average citizen is too busy minding his business. Neighbors and friends visited him constantly during his stay, and on his little trips to the drug store,

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# NISSAI PATPOURRI

1945: WHAT?

USUALLY it's fairly easy to write about "Happy New Year" and the hopes for good things to come. But this year the situation is somewhat different. With so many important decisions to be made and our somewhat shaky future needing complete overhauling, it's hard to be really happy. Words do not come very easily. We might as well as face the facts before us and realize that we have a hard trek ahead of us down the road of life. We must be realistic about this affairs of ours. Theories and dreams will not solve our numerous problems.

After remaining away from the nation's mainstream for nearly three years, it will be no easy task to get in the "groove" again--especially in strong competitive fields. Therefore, we must resort to sober thinking, and make our plans according to our best interests. Now, more than ever before, we must "look before we leap."

THIS SLOGAN about telegraphing your message instead of writing may save time but it's hard on the hearts of issei evacuee recipients. Unless it's of extreme emergency requiring utmost speed, the desire to wire should give way to less "dangerous" air mail or special delivery letter.

Why? Well, just recently an issei lady with sons in the Army received a telegram from one of her boys. Rest of the family were out at work. She could read his name as the sender but she could not read the contents. With so many war casualty wires coming in to the center, she accepted it to be the worst, and her fears mounted and mounted. It reached an insurmountable proportions until she was driven to despair.

She finally found someone to interpret the telegram for her, and her mind was again at ease. The message contained last minute holiday greetings from her beloved son. She was so glad she didn't know whether to

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must be kept in mind:

(1) Shopping passes and short-term leaves, with privilege of return, will be issued as in the past at the discretion of the project director. Each pass must show the purpose of the temporary absence from the center and the final return date which shall be no later than necessary to accomplish the purpose stated, and in no event later than 30 days after departure. Persons leaving a center under this arrangement who do not return by the time stated or who accept employment during their absence shall not be permitted to return to a center, except as paying visitors. Eligible aliens may also be issued temporary passes under this procedure, except that other requirements affecting travel of aliens must be fulfilled.

(2) Indefinite leaves are no longer required. Eligible citizen evacuees shall be permitted to depart upon request. However, unless a relocation plan is approved by WRA, the evacuee shall not be permitted to return to a center and shall not be eligible for a WRA leave-assistance grant or for transportation of property at government expense.

Eligible aliens may also leave a center under the above procedure, except that the following provisions shall also apply: (a) where

the proposed destination is outside the evacuated area, the WRA shall notify the appropriate US Attorney and arrange for the alien to notify the Immigration and Naturalization Service and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, as has been done in the past; (b) where the proposed destination is within the evacuated area, the relocation plan must be approved by WRA, (c) where the alien is a parolee or deportee, advance approval by the Department of Justice shall be obtained as in the past.

(3) Change of residence cards shall be furnished each person leaving a center in order that the evacuee will be able to notify WRA of address changes for forwarding of mail, Co-op patronage refunds, property assistance, work of other government agencies, and other matters.

(4) Seasonal leaves and indefinite trial-period leaves shall no longer be issued. However, persons already on such leaves shall be permitted to return to a center in conformity with past regulations.

(5) Center residents designated by the War Department to be ineligible for relocation shall not be permitted to depart from a center without the approval of the War Department.

Relocation Planning: In order to further orderly and planned relocation of evacuees, an approved relocation plan shall be required as a condition to the granting of relocation assistance and property transportation assistance.

The WRA officials for the Los Angeles district told Tashima of their difficulties in filling the numerous requests that continue to pour in. Illegible, improper and incomplete information on requests were cited as principal reasons for the delay in the transfer of evacuee property. —M.Y.

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to (a) any center resident who wishes to relocate, or (b) any relocated evacuee who wishes to return to the State or Territory in which he resided prior to evacuation.

(1) In the case of center residents not designated by the War Department as ineligible for relocation, who wish to relocate outside the evacuated area, the relocation plan shall automatically be approved where the destination is within a district open for relocation. Where the destination is not within a district now open for relocation (such as, Denver and Salt Lake City) prior approval of the relocation officer in the field shall be required.

(2) Where center residents wish to relocate to the evacuated area (West Coast) the following provisions shall apply with respect to approval of the relocation plan:

(a) The relocation plan shall not be approved unless it contains satisfactory evidence of adequate prior arrangements for means of support as follows:

(1) The applicant must have sufficient independent means or must have received a hospitality offer; (2) If the applicant for return to the evacuated area has a job waiting for him, a letter from the employer will be necessary as evidence; (3) Where the applicant intends to be self-employed in business or agriculture, letters from responsible persons (who may include WRA relocation officers in the evacuated area) confirming the arrangements shall be adequate; (4) Where the evacuee is a dependent and handicapped person who will need government assistance upon relocation to the evacuated area, proof that such assistance is assured shall be provided by the appropriate relocation office after proper local arrangements have been completed.

(b) Relocation plans shall be presented by evacuees in the center for approval to the relocation — continued on page 5 —

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program officer. Relocated evacuees shall present their plans to the field relocation officer nearest them.

Relocation Assistance:

Relocation assistance grants include: (1) Transportation grants covering only the cost of transportation, and (2) subsistence grants consisting of \$3 a day while enroute to point of relocation, plus a maximum of \$25 a person to meet initial expenses at the point of relocation.

Transportation grants shall hereafter be made available only as follows:

(1) Center residents who have not previously received relocation grants, or who have received such grants but were reintroduced into a center prior to revocation of the general exclusion orders, and whose relocation plans have been approved, shall be eligible for transportation grants to point of relocation in the Continental United States, Alaska, or Hawaii.

(2) All eligible evacuees who relocated prior to the revocation of the general exclusion orders and whose relocation plans have been approved by WRA, shall be eligible for transportation grants to the locality from which they were evacuated in the West Coast, Alaska, or Hawaii.

(3) Center residents temporarily departing from centers to investigate group relocation opportunities outside the evacuated area shall be eligible for transportation grants under the regular WRA provisions.

(4) Persons who depart from the center without approval of their relocation plans shall, thereafter, be ineligible for relocation assistance grants of any kind.

(5) Center residents who are eligible for transportation grants as outlined above and who can show need shall also be eligible for subsistence grants.

(6) Center residents who are absent from centers on short-term leave, seasonal leave, or indefinite

trial period leave at the time of revocation of the general exclusion order (Jan. 2, 1945) and who do not wish to return to the center shall be eligible for transportation and subsistence grants on the same basis as present center residents.

(7) Center residents whose departure is approved for a short-term leave and who do not wish to return to the center shall be eligible for transportation and subsistence grants to their point of relocation on the same basis as present center residents if the relocation officer in the field approves their relocation to such point.

Western Area Relocation Program: A relocation division has been established in the Western Field Office (WFO) of WRA with headquarters at San Francisco. Other offices are located in Los Angeles and Seattle, and additional offices will be opened in the very near future.

For the immediate future, the Western Relocation Division will be primarily concerned with: (1) working with local committees; (2) investigation problem cases which may arise as evacuees begin to return to the evacuated area; (3) Securing effective cooperation of Federal and State agencies.

Actual job placement, financial assistance for business and agricultural enterprises, and location of housing facilities will not be a responsibility of the Western Relocation Division. It is expected that under existing authority the United States Employment Service will be responsible for urban and industrial job placement; the War Food Administration for agricultural work; the Reconstruction Finance Corporation for financial assistance in urban commercial enterprises; the Farm Security Administration or the Farm Credit Administration for financial assistance in agricultural enterprises, and appropriate State and local agencies for housing.

As part of the western relocation program, WFO will be responsible for a program of information to facilitate the orderly re-

absorption of evacuees who return to the evacuated area. To this end, WFO will also provide a complete program of information to relocation centers for evacuee consumption. (This type of information will be carried in the PIONEER as it is made available.)

Reinduction Policy: There shall be no further reinduction of former center residents or further induction of new residents. The only exceptions are (1) persons already on seasonal leave or indefinite trial period leave and (2) persons excluded from the evacuated area by military order.

Transfers and Visits between Centers: There shall be no further transfers of evacuees from one center to another except upon specific approval of National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer. Visits between centers shall be restricted to actual emergencies and cases in which the center relocation divisions at both centers have been unable to work out a satisfactory relocation plan, and such a visit is approved by them, as necessary to complete and carry out such a plan.

New Policy on Visitors from Outside the Centers: Because of the program of center liquidation and the need for reserving all outgoing transportation for relocation purposes, visits to centers by persons of Japanese ancestry outside of centers shall be restricted to the following:

(1) Visits by relocated persons who have been accepted for service with the armed forces upon preinduction physical examination for the period pending induction. Application must be made to the field relocation officer.

(2) Emergency visits because of serious illness or death of immediate family members residing in centers. Application must be made to the field relocation officer.

(3) Students at the end of a school or college term, for a period not to exceed 90 days.

Application must be made  
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to the field relocation officer.

(4) Visits deemed absolutely essential to the relocation of family members residing in centers (not to exceed 30 days). Application must be made to the field relocation officer.

(5) No return to a center shall be approved because of the applicant's health or because he is unable to make a satisfactory relocation adjustment. In such cases, the relocation officer in the field shall assist the applicant in obtaining medical care or in making readjustments.

(6) If a person of Japanese ancestry seeks admission to a center without having in his possession the properly approved permission for visiting (Form WRA-325 or Form WRA-388 obtainable at field relocation offices), he shall be escorted to the center relocation office by an internal security representative. The relocation program officer shall interview the person and make such other investigation as may be appropriate. If the person who has returned to the center without proper authority has done so for any of the approved reasons as stated above, he shall be admitted as a paying visitor and shall be required to pay in advance two week's guest charges. If the unauthorized visit is not approved by the center relocation program officer, the applicant shall be required to leave the center immediately.

(7) A person admitted to a center as a visitor with the prior approval (Form WRA-325 or Form WRA-388) properly signed shall not be required to pay guest charges during the period of his authorized stay.

(8) No visit for the purpose of further relocation plans shall be extended beyond the expiration date set forth on Form WRA-388, except that where in the relocation program officer's judgment the applicant has made a genuine effort to complete relocation but has been unable

to do so prior to such date. The visit may be extended for not to exceed an additional 30 days.

(9) Any person who enters and remains in a center without permission or who obtains such permission through fraud or misrepresentation, or who fails to depart upon the expiration date specified for his visit shall be required to leave the center immediately. He shall thereafter be ineligible to receive any further relocation assistance in the transportation of his property. Lists of the names of all such persons shall be currently prepared by all centers and sent to all relocation centers, and West Coast transportation offices; indicating that such persons are ineligible for such assistance.

(10) Persons visiting in centers at the time of the relocation of the general exclusion orders (Jan. 2, 1945) shall be required to leave the center upon expiration of their visit, which shall be not later than the expected duration of the visit stated on Form WRA-388.

(11) Gate controls as authorized in the past shall continue in effect. Gate control is a means of maintaining full information concerning center population that is necessary for administrative purposes; such as, allotment of food.

Modification in Relocation Center Functions:

Only functions essential to the maintenance of essential operations shall henceforth be continued at each center. All work must be undertaken with the purpose of furthering speedy and satisfactory relocation of the evacuees, providing the essentials of community and administrative services, and putting the center on a standby basis by 12 months after relocation of the general exclusion orders. Specific activities at the centers are affected in the following ways:

(1) Project management, including information and legal work, shall continue substantially unaltered.

(2) Accounting work shall be revised to cover only

essential requirements on expenditure analyses accounting, beginning on Feb. 1 1945. Fiscal accounts shall be limited to budgetary accounting and prescribed controls.

(3) No further purchases of equipment shall be made without express prior authorization of the national WRA director.

(4) Property control shall be emphasized and strengthened for purposes of expediting liquidation and better utilization of property.

(5) Evacuee employment procedures and present functions involving evacuee employment shall be simplified as much as possible.

(6) Statistical records and procedures shall be maintained until the closing of the center.

(7) A program for liquidation of consumer enterprises on a basis which will provide adequate goods and services for as long as possible during the liquidation period shall be developed immediately.

(8) No further improvements shall be made in school plant and equipment. Instruction shall continue in pre-school, elementary and secondary departments until June, 1945. If summer sessions are found to be necessary at any center, schools may be kept open after that date but in no event later than Aug. 31, 1945. Vocational and adult education shall be reoriented.

(9) The internal security staff shall be maintained and strengthened.

(10) No new construction, whether or not previously authorized, shall be undertaken without approval of the national WRA director.

(11) Maintenance and repair shall be restricted to the minimum necessary to keep the center in a reasonable operating condition until the closing date.

(12) No crops shall be planted for the 1945 season. No more poultry shall be purchased for the farm. Hog feeding shall be continued. No more feeder cattle shall be purchased.

(13) Fire protection will be a continuing function and responsibility of each center.

(14) The motor transport and maintenance section will continued on page 7



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be required until centers are entirely closed.

Contributions of other Government agencies: Successful completion of the relocation process depends to a very large degree on the assistance which other Federal agencies can contribute. These are summarized below:

(1) Federal Security Agency:

(a) Social Security Board: Cooperation with WRA in the relocation of dependent and handicapped persons. (Details available at center welfare section office.)

(b) United States Employment Service: Placement of evacuees in non-agricultural jobs. (Details available at center relocation program office.)

(2) Children's Bureau (Department of Labor):

Relocation of children. (Details available at center welfare office.)

(3) Department of Agriculture:

(a) Provision of loans through the Farm Security Administration of Farm Credit Administration to evacuees who wish to reestablish themselves as farm operators. (Details available at relocation program office.)

(b) War Food Administration: Recruitment of evacuees in centers for labor in the evacuated area and assistance in placement of evacuees in permanent positions.

(c) Securing cooperation of state and county war boards in assisting evacuees to return to agricultural production.

(4) Other Federal Agencies:

(a) Reconstruction Finance Corporation: Loans to businessmen to reestablish businesses.

(b) War Production Board: Provision of priority equipment and materials necessary to reestablish businessmen, and other persons needing equipment as a prerequisite to effective relocation.

(c) Office of Price Administration: Allocation of rationed goods to former merchants to reestablish businesses and to bakers and other food producers.

(d) National Housing Agency: Assistance in securing housing for evacuees.

Evacuee Property Management: In the field of property management, service shall be limited to the following: (1) Completion of cases for which WRA assumed responsibility prior to revocation of the general exclusion orders; (2) Handling of new cases for persons on whose requests for assistance the project director or field relocation officer certifies that such assistance is necessary to prevent hardship or is in the interest of orderly relocation. Upon return of an evacuee to the evacuated area, WRA will in no case continue to handle any matter or otherwise give property management assistance to him beyond a period of 60 days following his return.

Evacuee Property Transportation: Assistance in transportation of property to point of relocation shall be available, under the limitations listed below, to persons who are eligible for relocation assistance to such destination. Upon certification on Form WRA-156 by the field relocation officer in the case of relocated evacuees or the project director in the case of center residents that the evacuee is eligible for the assistance requested, WRA will:

(1) Pack, crate, and move all household and personal effects and commercial property (subject to WRA instructions) in a WRA warehouse to the common carrier depot nearest the point of relocation.

(2) Pack, crate, and move all household goods and effects in a center, and commercial property forwarded to the center at the request of the project director under regular WRA instructions, to the common carrier depot nearest the point of relocation.

(3) Move household and personal effects in private storage in the evacuated area from common carrier depot nearest place of storage to common carrier depot nearest point of relocation. The evacuees shall be responsible for packing, crating,

and delivery to the nearest common carrier depot for shipment.

(4) Move household and personal effects of relocated evacuees from common carrier depot nearest relocation residence to common carrier depot nearest point of relocation within the evacuated area. The evacuee shall be responsible for packing, crating, and delivery to the nearest common carrier depot for shipment.

(5) All evacuees will be expected to pick up all property transported for them at the common carrier depot nearest the point of relocation.

(6) The above services will be provided in all cases except that where property is in a WRA warehouse or place of private storage and the evacuee's point of relocation is within reasonable trucking distance therefrom in the judgment of the appropriate transportation officer (which shall ordinarily be about 25 miles), the evacuee shall furnish his own transportation from such point to point of relocation and shall be notified.

Removal of Property in WRA Warehouses: All evacuees other than persons ineligible to return to the evacuated area, who have property in storage at WRA warehouses, shall be required to remove such property by 15 months after revocation of the general exclusion orders (Jan. 2, 1945). Evacuees returning to the evacuated area shall be required to remove such property within 60 days after their return. All evacuees having property in WRA warehouses shall be notified of these requirements, and shall further be notified that failure to remove such property within the time stated will result in the sale of the property pursuant to WRA provisions.

Property in private storage in the evacuated area shall not hereafter be transferred to Government storage except: (1) where requested by excludées or (2) where necessary to enable evacuees returning under an approved relocation plan to reoccupy buildings used for such private storage.
