STUDY PERSONAL PROBLEMS-JACL

Persons of Japanese ancestry were advised by the national headquarters of the Japanese American Citizens league to carefully study personal problems involved before making any move to return to the Pacific coast.

. Nisei who are within the draft age should not return to their homes without first clearing their status with the local draft board. If they are in essential work and return without obtaining releases, they will not be able to obtain new employment to qualify for deferment.

Even in cases where the evacuee is returning to his farm, it would be advisable, it was stated, to contact the local board to ascertain the status he may be able to obtain before making the move. This precaution may avoid considerable hardship in the event the local board is not friendly.

OST OF YOU perhaps are not a firm believer in ghosts, unless you're like Amache's famous newsboy--hitsuru kanki--but nevertheless you may have one of them (ghosts, we mean) haunting you sometime in the not too distant future.

The ghost in question arises from the supposed "grave" of the House un-American activities committee, which is more popularly or unpopularly known, depending on which side of the fence you're roaming, as the Dies committee. This body, as you may well recall, spent six years delving into the "inner sanctum" of various organizations which looked suspicious or which had gained the committee's displeasure.

It was generally believed that this committee had died when its chairman Lartin Dies (D. Texas) quit the Congress, having declined to run in the last election, and three other committee members had been defeated. But last week Representative Rankin (D. Miss.), a worthy successor to Dies in the art of witchhunting, proposed to continue the committee on permanent basis, with the haunting refrain -- "This is no time to relax our vigilance."

After a sharp debate the House members not only voted to continue the committee, but made it a permanent part of national political fixture. The vote was 207 to 186. As the vote indicates, there was sharp opposition to the proposal, whose adoption was quite a "surprise."

Representative Cochran (D. Mo.) protested that this "one-man committee" had come in conflict with the Army, Navy and FBI, and, therefore, should not be revived.

In all probability, Rankin will be named chairmand of this committee. Whether he will be as vigorous and zealous as his prodocessor had been in the pursuit of the committee's purpose, assuming, of course, that PHODEER

THE STEED OF CUITAZUE BUSHNUMP -

The Supreme Court has validated the evacuation orders issued by the War Department following Pearl Harbor and has also upheld the right of the War Relocation Authority to intern citizens until their loyalty could be determined.

On Sunday the "Tar Department ordered that loyal Japanese are to be released from the authority of the WRA and permitted to go back to their former homes. The court said in its decision that loyal citizens cannot be kept interned after their loyalty has been proven.

From California, however, mixed reporcussions indicate that there may be trouble when some of the Japs attempt to return there. State officials and local authorities generally have asked that the citizens of the West Coa. t be tolerant in their attitude and actions toward the returning Japs. But others predicted that there might be bloodshed and riots if the Japs try to return because of the crowded conditions and the still tense feeling against the Orientals who competed strongly with others in farming.

Californians as well as people throughout the nation are going to have to get used to the presence of Japanese in their midst. The loyalty of many thousands of them was proven and in the Army several thousands more are fighting alongside other boys from our country.

That is likely to be the real tost in the future is whether those returning Japanese, if they are badly treated, can withstand the pressure and remain good citizens. Resentment works both ways in human nature and the Amarican-born Jap isn't likely to take the brunt of mistreatment lying down.

If such people wish to stop off at a center or route, any additional travel involved will have to be at their own expense.

HOUSING REQUIREMENTS FOR RELOCATION PLANNING

Secause of the acute housing shortage in the evacuated area and, the difficulties being experienced by evacuees returning to the West Coast without prior housing arrangements, WRA will require evacuees to show evidence of housing arrangements before approving their relocation plan.

These arrangements may be temporary, but should be for a long enough period of time to permit the evacuees to obtain permanent housing

With due respect for wartime restrictions, for the past two and one-half years, we have been concerned, primarily, in establishing and maintaining a center along democratic lines: and, in promoting relocation in areas of the United States with which you were not too familiar. The War Relocation Authority has worked long and hard to have all restrictions, which were not necessary for public safety, removed. It was my great pleasure to announce to the old and to the new councilmen on December 17,1944, that the Army was revoking the West Coast Exclusion Order as of January 2, 1945. Today, then, should be a memorable date for you and the War Relocation Authority.

"The restoration of full citizenship rights, through the revocation of the West Coast Exclusion Order, came about largely through the influence of the sacrifices of the nisei now fighting on foreign soil.
