PUBLIC OPINION

VACUUMS who are about to be tossed into the whirlpool of America's war mainstream of life should be interested in knowing just how the public feels about them economically. A survey by the National Opinion Research Center of the University of Denver showed that only 16 per cent thinks Japanese should have as good a chance as Caucasians to get any kind of job--AFTER THE WAR.

Twenty-one per cent would give loyal Japanese Americans equal opportunities, while 61 per cent would give Caucasians first chance at any kind of a job. Two per cent had no opinion.

It is interesting to note that more education a person has more tolerant he becomes, and more likely he is to favor equal job opportunities for the nisei. Forty-four per cent with college background would give Caucasians first chance. Seventy per cent of persons with a grade school education or less favor giving Caucasians the first chance.

Below the Mason-Dixon line where prejudice comes second nature, the survey followed the natural trend--63 per cent of the whites and 48 per cent of Negroes think Caucasians should be given job preference over Japanese--AFTER THE WAR.

Sectionally, farther east a person travels, less discrimination he is liable to find: 66 per cent in the West, 58 per cent in the Midwest, and 56 per cent in the New England and Middle Atlantic states favor preferential treatment of Caucasians.

Majority of the 61 per cent favoring first chance for the Caucasians at all jobs did so because of bitterness, which may subside with the passing of time. Whether a comment such as one by an LA telephone company employee, "The Japs should not be allowed here at all," could be softshelled to take a fairer

Equal Opportunity

A BILL to wipe out job discrimination because of race, color, creed or national origin, proposed by Senator Arthur A. Brooks Jr., is one that deserves the most sympathetic consideration by the 35th General Assembly.

Whether Senator Brooks' bill, as drawn, is precisely what is needed in Colorado depends on a full analysis of its details. But there's no question that the principle is 100 per cent sound.

The record of Colorado's Spanish-Americans, Japanese Americans and Negroes in the armed forces is so good that it does not even need any defense. When they come home they will expect--and certainly should have--equal economic opportunities with those whose skins happen to be of a paler shade.

In meeting this problem the responsibility is not alone that of the employer. A great responsibility lies also within the ranks of organized labor, many of whose unions have flagrant policies of banning members of minority races.

The necessity of equal economic opportunity for all has been recognized by Congress in relation to federal employees by establishing a Fair Employment Practices Commission. This act was indorsed by Denver's own congressional representative, Dean M. Gillespie, and should form a model for whatever eventual form the state act takes.

Let this state act, when it is passed, stand as a promise on the part of our people that never again will a Ku Klux Klan be tolerated in Colorado.
