

## TWO MORE CASUALTIES

Pfc. Akira Morihara, 24, son of Mr. Usaku Morihara, 8G-7A, and Mrs. Unayo Morihara of Honaunau, Hawaii, was killed in action in Italy on Oct. 23, 1943. Mr. Morihara was recently transferred to this center.

Private Morihara was drafted in May, 1943, in Honolulu.

He is survived by his parents; three brothers: Pfc. Jimmy in Camp Hood, Texas, Kazuo and Satsuki, and three sisters, Mrs. Chizuko Kurisu, Mrs. Matsuye Suenaga and Mrs. Yaeko Takeuchi, all of Hawaii.

Sgt. Robert Yoshio Tominaga, 32, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kurahachi Tominaga, 8E-11E, was wounded in action in France on Nov. 1, 1944. He entered the Army via draft in March, 1942, and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., prior to going overseas with the 442nd Infantry.

## FUTURE CENTER VISITS NEED RELOCATION VALUE

All visits to centers, except for emergency purposes such as critical illness or death of an immediate family member, will be considered only in terms of their value to relocation, according to Jan. 16 bulletin from the Washington WRA office.

Two particularly pertinent and obvious reasons are cited: 1--All efforts at the centers are to be pointed toward relocation, and other activities such as visits for purely social reasons must be sharply curtailed. 2--Most of the centers are in isolated areas and transportation facilities even from the immediately adjoining territory are limited and must be conserved for the vastly increased flow of resettling center residents. There must be no resettling evacuee left behind while transportation facilities are occupied by casual visitors.

The bulletin, however, points out that it is recognized that many visitors can make a distinct contribution to relocation and nothing should stand in the way of such visits.

This change became effective Jan. 2, 1945, with the announcement of the WRA post-exclusion program.

## PREPARE BILL TO CLOSE ALL CENTERS BY JUNE 30

### HOODLUMS MAKE WACE DOIS

Hoodlums with vengeance have attempted to "scare" the Dois, who recently returned to their farm near Auburn, Calif., from this center out of the district with cowardly tactics.

Investigating a noise in an outbuilding on night of Jan. 17, the Dois discovered a small fire set by prowlers which was promptly extinguished. On the following night buckshot was fired toward the house from a shotgun by an unknown person on the road. Sheriff who was promptly summoned found several sticks of dynamite planted in the packing shed.

Appraised of the facts, Governor Warren and State Attorney General Kenny requested full protection for the Doi family.

WASHINGTON--Nearly all relocation centers would be closed by June 30 if a bill prepared by Rep. Dworshak (R. Idaho) for introduction last week in the House is passed.

Only centers to remain open are those maintained solely for evacuees whose loyalty to this country is questioned.

Dworshak averred there is an immediate need in the war effort for nisei in camps and the WRA personnel who would be released. There are some 2500 of the latter, he explained.

The Idaho congressman stated he had heard reports that "some of the evacuees have been so enraptured by the liberal treatment which they have received, as well as by the satisfying life in these camps, they are reluctant to leave these centers."

## COAST CONFERENCE

ALTHOUGH THE PACIFIC COAST COMMITTEE on American Principles and Fair Play in a recent San Francisco conference clarified some of the problems of minority race groups, it left much to be desired because it could not take aggressive action on any of the problems discussed.

However, its findings took on added importance because, in addition to the problems of returning evacuees, it concerned itself broadly to the entire race relations problem.

In regards to the nisei question, JACL President Saburo Kido made a four-star statement when he said:

"There are 60,000 people wondering whether to go east or west or to stand pat at the relocation centers. We are in a state of mental uncertainty. We wish the advice of our friends here. Few of our people were on relief even during the depth of the depression years. Japanese Americans now feel if they remain in the centers, where they were sent, they will suffer no stigma, but to return and find themselves on relief rolls would be a reflection."

Thereby echoing thunderously the nisei's chief concern: Would they be denied employment by white employers because of personal prejudice, or because of fear by those employers of prejudice on the part of other employees with resultant threat of job walk-offs?

This question was left hanging on the limb of uncertainty. Unless it is authoritatively answered without a string of "ifs," nisei future cannot be considered as being any too bright along the Coast.

ALTHOUGH conference mooted the various problems thoroughly, it offered no remedy or encouragement because the committee established the conference only as a discussion group. This policy aggravated

## TELETYPE: DOI INCIDENT

Following is the teletype received by James G. Lindley, project director, from R. B. Cozzens, assistant WRA director, in San Francisco, on the Doi incident: J G LINDLEY

In view of rumors, newspaper and radio accounts of "incidents" at Auburn, Calif., involving returnee Sumio Doi, his father and mother, here are the facts-Doi family returned from Granada to own farm January 5. Return was without incident until night of January 17 when Doi heard noise in outbuilding. Investigation showed hoodlums had started small fire which was promptly extinguished by Doi and father. Incident was reported to sheriff's office. Following night buckshot was fired toward house from shotgun in hands of unknown person on road. Sheriff was summoned. His investigation showed several sticks of dynamite planted in packing shed. Governor Warren and State Attorney General Kenny, apprised of facts, immediately requested full protection for Doi family, followed up with conference with Placer county superior court judge, sheriff and district attorney who assured protection. Doi's immediate neighbors are friendly, extending help. Merchants in Auburn are cooperative. Doi family will feel happier when other friends have returned to area.

Shigeichi Kubo Gila River after exploratory trip to Penryn, near Auburn, found situation friendly in that vicinity, has returned to Rivers to bring his family to Penryn. Story on Doi's problem played inside pages of Chronicle, page 1 in Call-Bulletin and News and not run by Examiner. All papers played up order of National Commander Scheiberling of American Legion ordering restoration of 15 names to Hood River Post's honor roll and protested "Bigotry race hatred." These are the facts.

Relocated evacuees living near a center may make application to visit on the same basis as those living a thousand miles away by simply filling out form WRA-388. These forms may be obtained by writing to the nearest field relocation office.

It is suggested that center residents may further their relocation plans by visiting relocated family member or friend's nearby. This can be done through regular short-term pass procedure.

**PREDICT NISEI FARMERS  
FACE LABOR SHORTAGE**

SAN FRANCISCO--Japanese Americans recovering possession of their West Coast farms will have a difficult time finding labor because of the "reluctance" of non-Japanese to work for them, Government officials and evacuees themselves predicted at a recent conference on agriculture here.

**CA TALENT  
REVUE SOLATED**

The question of labor was raised by Rev. Sohei Kowita from Poston (Ariz.) relocation center. He cited an incident of a Poston evacuee who had two Mexican employees who had quit working when the Japanese-American owner returned. They had worked for him for five years.

Dr. Paul S. Taylor, UC professor of economics, told the conference that it was erroneous belief that Japanese farmers were a serious competitive threat to other agriculturalists.

"Farms operated by persons of Japanese ancestry in the three Pacific coast states were a smaller percentage of the total number of farms in 1940 than in 1920," he stated.

In areas where the Filipino populations are large, residents have predicted conflicts between the returning evacuees and the Filipinos, but Antonio A. Gonzales, a representative of West Coast Filipino communities, said "the Filipinos are a Christian people and don't harbor a grudge."

This includes all servicemen wounded, missing, prisoner of war, and killed in action.

The Blue Star Service club, the PIONEER, and WRA offices will be notified by the block managers.

Three more local families departed for California, returning home after nearly three years absence. This is the second contingent of Amacheans to re-enter West Coast after the ban lifting.

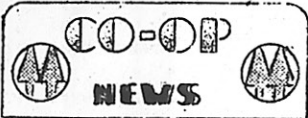

## QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q--Are there any curfew regulations for aliens?

A--Public Proclamation No. 21 revoked all curfew regulations.

Q--Are there any prohibited districts in the Western Defense Command area?

A--No. There are no excluded areas on the West Coast for either citizens or aliens except such posted areas around military installations which apply to everyone.

Q--What are the limitations on local movements of aliens, say between adjacent towns like from San Mateo to San Francisco or Berkeley to San Francisco? Is the five-mile travel limitation that existed at the time of evacuation for citizens and aliens of Japanese ancestry still in effect?

A--The five-mile limitation now applies only to aliens and is effective throughout the United States. Aliens must notify the US District Attorney and receive permission to travel beyond that distance from their homes. In cases of regular travel, as between home and work, they can obtain monthly travel passes. These are Department of Justice regulations and are subject to change.

Q--What are the specifications of contraband for aliens?

A--Executive Order No. 2525 regarding contraband for aliens of any country with which this country is at war are still in effect as heretofore. There are no contraband regulations for American citizens of Japanese ancestry. Proclamation 2525 provides that no alien enemy shall have in his possession, custody or control at any time or place any of the following articles: firearms, weapons or implements of war, ammunition, bombs, explosives or material used in their manufacture, short-transmitting sets, signal devices, codes or ciphers, cameras, papers, documents or books in which there

## STUDENTS MAY GET GRANTS

Students are now eligible for relocation assistance grants on the same basis as other residents, according to a recent teletype from Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director.

However, to receive the grants, students must have a final relocation plan, and, if grants are so provided, they will not be eligible to return to a relocation center.

Formerly only students who were working the major portion of their time to help with school expenses were eligible for grants.

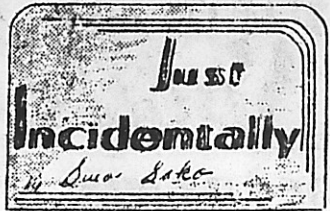

CHICAGO--A local chiroprapist recently wrote a touching letter to the editors of the city's leading papers. Its content told of how this man lost a patient by answering frankly the latter's question "What do you think of the Jap problem?"

The chiroprapist assumed the reference to be to the Japanese Americans, and not to those with whom this country is locked in a deadly warfare. Thus, he replied he fully understood the great misery suffered by the nisei at the hand of the only country they have ever known and loved. This opening reply was not received favorably by the patient.

This chiroprapist being an American of Negro descent, he couldn't have honestly answered otherwise. His people have long suffered under the sting of prejudice and discrimination which had tortured and haunted his forefathers long before his birth.

By now his patient arose and reached for his overcoat.

The Negro chiroprapist then spoke of the undescrivable misery of being denied the simple rights and privileges under law; of being barred from jobs regardless of qualifications; of being refused service in restaurants; of being ousted from homes of own choice. Movies and presses continually accentuating his people's shortcomings, and minimizing their virtues. Doors to institutions of higher learning were closed in many instances, but ridicule of his people's lack of education increased. His people, he went on, were "judged by the few" "unfortunate" element--which may be found in any race.

But as he expressed his hopes for the future, the patient was gone. Gone because he couldn't face the truth.
