DAYS SET FOR GOODS PICK-UP

In order to provide the best possible service to Amache residents, shipment of household goods to the West Coast or elsewhere will be picked up on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays only, Herbert J. Vatcher, evacuee property officer, announced Thursday.

Request for picking up such property must be made 48 hours in advance, and the boxes and crates must be plainly marked. Crating materials may be obtained by contacting Vatcher in the Froth building.

ASK ABOUT AVAILABILITY

Several government agencies that formerly employed evacuees on the West Coast have asked the San Francisco WRA office regarding the availability of these employes, according to John H. Province of the Washington WRA office.

It is suggested all eligible persons wishing federal employment in the evacuated area contact the local relocation office for assistance in submitting their applications to the proper civil service district.

ASKS LAW OFFICERS TO GIVE PROTECTION

SAN FRANCISCO--State Attorney General of California, Robert W. Kenny, has written the law enforcement officers of the state calling upon them to see that returning Japanese Americans are given full protection.

In his letter he quotes a statement issued recently by the State Law Enforcement Advisory committee, which says in part: "We consider it our sworn duty as law enforcement officers to fully cooperate with the Army authorities in dealing with the return of the Japanese residents of this State. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the law. The Army has carefully investigated each person to be permitted to return and will not allow those who are potentially dangerous to return.

"There should be no difficulty involved in this transition unless incidents

are provoked by intemperate words and thoughtlessness."

NO NAVY ORDER

Amache Silk Screen shop has no contract with the Navy for training posters at present, William L. Fuller, project operations chief, disclosed Thursday.

The Navy made an inquiry regarding additional posters, several weeks ago but no order was placed and it is not known at this time whether such an order will be forthcoming in view of the revised WRA program, Fuller stated. All outstanding Navy poster orders were completed some time ago.

COMMENCEMENT

LAST TUESDAY NIGHT in the auditorium 68 Amache high seniors received their diplomas, thus crowning the successful completion of a prescribed secondary school course. For them the affair was both happy and sad. Happy to be released from the yoke of three R's; sad to be parting from their fellow students and the carefree school life.

These students are a part of an estimated 2000 scholars who graduate yearly from the high schools at the eight relocation centers. About 400 of them enter schools of higher learning.

The question at hand is not how well these graduates were taught the ABC's of books, but how well they were taught the ABC's of life--to be faced after graduation. That is very important because four out of every five who receive center high school diplomas must make the best of life with no further formal education. Diplomas they received are not only a testimonial for things accomplished during their school years, but a green light to enter the threshold of greater responsibilities of life. Just how well they will meet these responsibilities depends on how well they have learned to accept them.

The future holds many opportunities but their attainment, because of unfortunate circumstances, will not come easily. There will be rebuffs and brush-offs, and it will be the survival of the fittest--physically, mentally and morally. Therefore, center high school education will be called upon to meet a severe test. Its reflection will be very meaningful to all concerned.

WIOLENCE IN CALIFORNIA

THANK GOD, we live in Colorado!

We say this especially this morning after reading the dispatch from Newcastle, Calif., wherein it is reported that a gang of hoodlums attempted to burn and dynamite a building on a ranch operated by a Japanese American. This Japanese American, Sumio Doi, had just returned from the relocation center at Amache, Colo., and was attempting to piece together again a life that had been broken by the evacuation orders following Pearl Harbor.

Several carloads of these hoodlums, according to the dispatch, parked near the building and fired shots to keep the frightened family inside while they attempted to destroy the property. A sheriff's patrol car drove up and they all scattered without doing great damage.

Colorado can be proud of the fact that during the entire time of the evacuation--with 5000 Japanese Americans brought to Denver alone--there was not a single important act of violence. The evacuation was a war measure, and Colorado accepted these uprooted citizens with a spirit of tolerance and understanding for their problems. Not so, apparently, the great State of California!

And, incidentally, did you notice the heavy casualty list published in Friday's Rocky Mountain News? Of the 34 Colorado men wounded in action, 13 of them were Japanese Americans--more than one-third. What greater way can a man show he is an American than laying down his life for his country?

was too hard or too dangerous. He was absolutely dependable, and I've never seen a man so cool in tight spots.

"He died a hero's death--was given a Christian burial and lies here in France in an American graveyard.

"I am proud to have known Pete so well and his loss hurts me more than it is possible to put into words."

Although this letter was written in deserved praise of Pete, such words of praise are in a way typical of all nisei soldiers fighting overseas. Certainly the fine war records attained by the 100th and 442nd bear this out.

And to be singled out of this array of fine soldiers makes Joe Nisei like Pete a credit to his country and to his fellow nisei.

INFORMATION ON SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS GIVEN

Social Security benefits, which includes old age and survivors' insurance, are available to all who are 65 years of age or older and who have made contribution for at least six quarters beginning January, 1937, according to Jacob Gerrild, counselor. However, he added, employment in agricultural production and domestic service did not add to the period or amount of contributions.

Regardless of the exact amount of benefits and its relations to contributions, many workers over 65 years of age and their members of their families who have

made contributions and have good claims should certainly exercise such claims. Every possible help and encouragement shall be offered those who may be entitled to these benefits.

Those who were employed by the railroad industry in August, 1935, or since that time and have earned even \$150 may have a claim for retirement benefits or death benefits to survivors under the Railroad Retirement Act. Those who have worked for a railroad industry during the last two years and are able to continue working may be eligible for Railroad Unemployment Insurance.

Unemployment compensation may also be a resource to those who have worked in industries covered by such social security during the last year or two. Those who have had covered employment on leave from centers recently have especially good claims for unemployment compensation.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.--What is the status of discharged soldiers in relation to visiting relocation centers?

A.--Although the policy on visits to a relocation center has been broadened to include soldiers on furlough and those awaiting assignment to active duty, men who have been discharged from the Army on medical grounds or for other reasons are considered the same as other relocatees in regards to center visits. In other words, they must obtain permission from the nearest field relocation officer.

Q.--What about visits to relocation centers of aliens who had been paroled from internment camps?

A.--Aliens who have been paroled from internment camps may be admitted as visitors to a relocation center in the same manner as a relocated evacuee. WRA has notified the Justice Department that WRA can no longer induct parolees as center residents and that sponsorship should hereafter be arranged for them before they leave the internment camp. Parolees may, of course, be admitted to the centers as temporary visitors providing they meet the necessary requirements.
