CHARGE ARSON, ATTEMPTING TO DYNAMITE

AUBURN--Two brothers, both AWOL from the US Army, and two other brothers are held in custody of local civil authorities and have been charged with felony counts of arson and attempting to dynamite a building at the Doi ranch.

Those in custody are Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, picked up by military police, and his brother Alvin E. Johnson, 18, both of Redding, Calif., James Edward Watson, 38, a bartender at the Cozy Spot, between Auburn and Newcastle, and his brother, Press, 35. They are held in lieu of \$5000 bail or bond of \$10,000.

Alvin Johnson was supposed to be at Fort Riley, Kan., on army duty, but officers found him in civilian clothes and AWOL since Jan. 5. Elmer Johnson has been AWOL for about four weeks from Camp Knight, Calif., where he worked in the post office.

Ray McCarthy and J. A. Mulvey, both of the State Justice Department, implicated Elmer Johnson in both night raids and stated his confession indicated he was responsible for his acts. It was learned that Fred Adge, local city policeman was a leader in solving the case.

103 NISEI SOLDIERS RECEIVE PROMOTIONS

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE --One hundred and three American soldiers of Japanese ancestry with the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team have received battlefield promotions recently for demonstrated leadership in combat against the Germans in France.

Thirty-four are from the continental United States and 69 are from the Territory of Hawaii. The promotions range from ratings of corporal to first sergeant.

All those receiving promotions wear the Combat Infantryman's Badge for exemplary conduct under enemy fire and wear at least two battle stars for participation in the Fifth Army's northward drive from Rome to and across the Arno river in Italy and in the Seventh Army's push through the Vosges mountains in eastern France. Many of them earned their promotions during the historic rescue of the now famous "Lost Battalion" near Bruyeres, France, last October. Most

of the men wear Purple Hearts, some with oak leaf clusters.

CALIFORNIA IS WATCHED

"The nation's eyes are on California to see whether it will treat returning nisei with justice and generosity," stated James Watterman Wise, director of the Council Against Intolerance in America, in a recent interview in Los Angeles.

Wise said he was "delighted" at the acceptance of two nisei girl students by Pasadena junior college over the protests of anti-Japanese interests. He declared that a hopeful sign for tolerance lies in Congressional interest in a bill to establish a permanent fair employment practices commission.

A native of Portland, Ore., Wise, son of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Zionist leader, is studying racial and religious tensions in the West.

TO REVIEW STORAGE, SHIPMENT REQUESTS

being returned to their respective center evacuee property office to be reviewed. Individuals involved will be mailed notices from the local office for appointments to check the old request forms.

"It is imperative that these residents come to the evacuee property office at the Wroth building at the time and date appearing on the appointment notice," Vatcher said. "Otherwise the requests will have to be cancelled."

LISTED AS WAR PRISONER

Pfc. Torace Largo Sagara, 21, previously reported as missing in action on Oct. 23, 1944, in France, was officially listed as prisoner of war in German hands, according to word received here by his brother, Wallace, who resides at 9L-2E.

Pfc. Sagara, formerly of Los Angeles, volunteered for the Army from this center in May, 1943, and trained at Camp Sholby, Miss., before going overseas with the 442nd Infantry.

Censures Name Erasure

A firm "recommendation" to restore the names of nisei servicemen erased by the Hood River American Legion post from its honor roll has been telephoned to Jess Edington, Hood River post commander, by National Commander Edward M. Scheiberling, it was revealed recently in Portland, Ore.

Dan McDade of Portland, national vice-commander, was advised by Scheiberling in Chicago of his recommendations, which also included a suggestion that the names of other nisei servicemen from the Hood River area be added to the list.

"Scheiberling said he feels that the action of the Hood River post, whether misguided or ill-advised, should not reflect on the 12,000 posts of the American Legion," declared McDade.

SERVICES AVAILABLE FOR EVACUEE FARMERS

Army personnel in this country, including center residents in the enlisted reserve or those awaiting assignment, will have a chance to demonstrate their artistic abilities in a nation-wide Army art contest, the War Department announced recently. All entries must be in not later than Feb. 20.

The contest emphasizes originality rather than technical excellence.

The eight classes are oil paintings and tempera, water colors and gouache, mural designs, sculpture, renderings, drawings, prints, and photographs. Entry blanks and full information can be secured from

Scope of services the Farm Security Administration can offer to returning evacuee farmers has been outlined by R. W. Wollenberg, FSA regional director, according to R. B. Cozzens, WRA assistant director.

Before a loan can be made to any applicant, the FSA county committee, composed of three prominent local farmers, must pass on his eligibility, character and integrity, Wollenberg said.

Rural rehabilitation or operating loans are available to citizens who qualify as low-income families (owner-operators, tenants, share-croppers and farm laborers with sufficient manpower for farm and home

operations, except possibly at peak seasons) if certain other requirements can be met.

Other requirements include: the necessity of full-time farm operations effectively utilizing family manpower, or part-time operations which may be supplemented by off-farm employment that will not interfere with successful operations in order to maintain full employment and a satisfactory level of living; a willingness to assume the necessary responsibilities in order to make an effective contribution to the Nation's war effort; a family background of rural experience and managerial ability; that the borrower be unable to obtain adequate farm and home financing at reasonable rates and terms from sources other than FSA; that there be a reasonable possibility of repaying the loan and that the family's level of health and living can be maintained or improved.

Heads of families eligible as standard borrowers can get loans for livestock, farm equipment, minor repairs and improvements for farm and/or home, participation in group health, hospital and/or dental services, for emergency

NISEI RETURN NO THREAT TO FARM INTERESTS

SAN FRANCISCO--Return of nisei farmers to the West Coast at this time will not threaten other agricultural interests, but

will strengthen them, Dr. Paul S. Taylor, UC economics professor, declared recently in addressing a race relations conference here.

He made four points refuting the "fancy" that had been spread into popular belief about Japanese Americans. They are:

1--Japanese-American farm people do not "breed like rabbits." The fact is their birth rate is sufficient to balance mortality and emigration.

2--Farm laborers of Japanese ancestry are not an economic threat to other farm labor. The fact is their employment would afford relief to taxpayers because fewer Mexican nationals would need be imported at government expense.

3--Competition from Japanese farmers does not threaten other farmers. Fact is that between 1920 and 1940 the percentage of Japanese American to other coast farms dropped by more than one-seventh; their average acreage dropped from 65 to 42.2 per farm and their farm values by more than half.

4--Unpaid family labor does not give Japanese-American farmers a great competitive advantage. The fact is that, prior to the evacuation, there were only 4,832 such unpaid laborers on the Pacific coast.

health services and for correction of physical conditions when the approved farm and home plan indicates that such expenditures are necessary to successfully conduct the family's war production program and rehabilitation of the farm family.

However, loans will not be made for refinancing, generally speaking, although exceptions may be made.

FARM OWNERSHIP LOANS

Farm purchase loans, which run for 40 years at three per cent interest, are available to veterans of the present war, farm tenants, renters and laborers who are citizens. FSA reports that due to the limited funds on hand for this purpose and the large number of applications already on hand, it is unlikely that more than 12 farm ownership loans can be made in California this year.

HEALTH SERVICES

Farm families, whose income for taxable purposes has averaged \$2000 or less a year during the last five years, are eligible for prepaid medical and hospital care through membership in county health associations established by FSA in cooperation with California Physicians Service, county medical societies and local farmers.

WATER FACILITIES LOANS

Water facilities loans, which run up to 20 years at three per cent interest, are available to farm families for repairing, rebuilding or constructing farm and irrigation water systems, provided the family cannot secure adequate financing from other sources.

GROUP SERVICES LOANS

Group services loans are available to farmers wishing to pool their resources for

NEWS ALONG THE COAST

GOVERNOR HITS RETURN

OLYMPIA--Gov. Mon C. Wallgren of the State of Washington recently declared emphatically that he is opposed to the return of any Japanese to the Pacific coast for the duration of the war.

Although he declined to go into details, he indicated that there have been highly serious developments having to do with espionage that compelled him to take such a stand regarding return of Japanese to the Coast.

The governor implied that the public has not been fully informed on the extent of underground Japanese American collaboration with Japan.

"The vast majority of them," he declared, "undoubtedly are all right but there is no one who can guarantee the loyalty and conduct of all of them.

Concerning the WRA's move to bring "good" Japanese back to Washington, Oregon and California, Governor Wallgren observed caustically:

"You'd think the war was all over, and our boys half way home."

CENTRALIA, Wash.--The executive committee of the State American Legion went on record recently at its mid-year meeting to support the constitutional rights of Japanese Americans returning from relocation centers.

The group reaffirmed the recommendation made at last legion convention that all persons of Japanese descent who have expressed or shown sympathy for their homeland be divested of American citizenship and deported.

STOCKTON, Calif.--Agricultural problems that will arise with the return of evacuees to California was the chief discussion at the monthly directors' meeting of the San Joaquin Farm Bureau federation here recently.

A special committee was named to study all angles of the situation and make recommendations of farm bureau policy, especially

in regards to leasing and renting of farm lands to returning Japanese.

VISALLA, Calif.--A committee of 25 ranchers, businessmen and other Croci district residents called on three evacuees who recently returned to the district and asked them to leave the community for the sake of harmony, peace and order, it was disclosed by Sheriff S. S. Sherman.

WRA office in Fresno asked District Attorney Walter C. Knight of Tulare county for assurance of protection.

"So far as I could see," said Sherman, "there was no rough stuff pulled."

In spite of the counsel given the Japanese by the group, the sheriff expects no outbreak of violence unless possibly isolated cases of individual hot-heads who might be aroused by liquor. There is however, a strong feeling against the return of Japanese to the district, he added.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.--When this center (Granada) closes, may I be transferred to another center?

A.--NO. It is planned that all centers will close at approximately the same time.

Q.--What constitutes an approved plan for return to California?

A.--Proof that housing is available.

Q.--What steps have been taken toward securing priorities for farm equipment and building materials?

A.--Such priorities include several categories, and allotments are made without regard to race, creed, or color. In the case of farm machinery and equipment, the determination of allotments is made on the basis of availability and the need for the production of essential foods.

Q.--Should I decide to return to my former home in the evacuated area, will my children be accepted in the schools there?

A.--Definitely YES.

Q.--What if I do not make my relocation plan before the center closes?

A.--You will not be eligible for the assistance and services which WRA is now able to give you.

Q.--Will we be sent to a dispersal camp in the evacuated area or elsewhere?

A.--NO. All relocation will be on an individual basis.
