

WOUNDED IN ACTION

War Department this week announced the wounding in action in France, February, 1945, of Pvt. Shigehiko Ishigaki, 23, son of Mrs. Shin Ishigaki, 9E-11C.

Private Ishigaki, graduate of Colusa (Calif.) high school, volunteered from this center on May 14, 1944, and received his training at Camp Shelby, Miss., prior to going overseas with the 442nd Infantry.

SPANISH CONSUL GENERAL

Captain Antonio Martin, Spanish vice-consul at San Francisco representing the Japanese Government, arrived here early this morning to confer with interested Japanese nationals, according to James G. Lindley, project director.

Captain Martin was accompanied by Charles C. Eberhardt, special representative of the US State Department.

NATIVE SONS PROPOSE JAPANESE REGULATION

SAN FRANCISCO--The board of grand officers of the Native Sons of the Golden West adopted a resolution here proposing a legislation regulating Japanese in California.

Following measures on Japanese legislation were recommended by the NSGW committee:

- 1--An act to ban coastal waters to fishing by persons of Japanese ancestry.
- 2--An amendment to the Alien Land Act to prohibit a Japanese-born parent from using his money to buy land for an American-born child.
- 3--A law giving prosecutors power to enforce rigidly the escheat provisions of the Alien Land Act so that land owned by subterfuge by Japanese-American citizens may be confiscated by the state.
- 4--A strict ban on Japanese language schools.

The board also adopted a resolution asking congress to pass legislation permitting the deportation of "any persons of Japanese ancestry who have by work or deed shown any disloyalty to the United States, as well as those persons who have refused to renounce their allegiance to Japan."

While in the Mile High city, Lindley and Knodel contacted the FSA, RFC, American Red Cross, state welfare and social security boards, and discussed with them the possibility of aiding the WRA relocation program.

Raymond D. Williamson, head of the board of grand officers, said the NSGW is still opposed to the return of Japanese to the Pacific coast.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

THIS WEEK Amache plays host to some 50 Joe Nisei from Fort Snelling, Minn., who will be here on their much-deserved furlough.

Therefore, it is fitting that we reprint here an editorial--**SELFISH? WE'RE THANKFUL**--which appeared in the Dec. 16, 1942, issue of the PIONEER. This dissertation by Ihan Komai is on James Kanazawa, then Block 119 representative, who enlisted for service at Camp Savage (Minn.) Japanese language school, which later was transferred to Fort Snelling. Kanazawa in his parting words to the assembly expressed his views on his enlistment, which should be food for thought for us who are still in relocation centers.

Text of the editorial follows:

"Before he left for Camp Savage to serve his country, JAMES KANAZAWA, representative of Block 119, said a few words of parting to the assembly.

"His reasons for enlisting, he said, were **SELFISH**. But his is the kind of **SELFISHNESS** for which all of us can be thankful.

"He enlisted because he felt that it was the only way he could do something for his children--**CHILDREN WHO WERE GROWING UP WITHOUT RESPECT FOR ELDERS, WITHOUT RESPECT FOR AUTHORITY, WITHOUT RESPECT FOR COUNTRY**.

"He enlisted to **FIGHT FOR HIS CHILDREN'S PLACE IN SOCIETY**--so that they would hold up their heads, so that they too **WOULD FEEL THAT THEIR PLACE, THEIR RIGHTS WERE WORTH FIGHTING FOR**.

His reasons, he said were **SELFISH**--but his **INTERESTS**, his **FEARS**, and his **HOPES** are the **INTERESTS**, the **FEARS**, and the **HOPES** of ALL OF US.--k.k."

LEGAL AID SOCIETIES OFFER SERVICES FOR NEEDY EVACUEES

More than 50 Legal Aid societies throughout the country will cooperate with WRA in assisting Americans of Japanese ancestry who are unable to employ the services of a lawyer, the National Association of Legal Aid organizations an-

nounced in a statement unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of its executive committee.

The service of these voluntary organizations covers both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also handle criminal matters.

Persons able to pay are not accepted as clients of Legal Aid societies, but will be referred to capable and honest attorneys who will charge a fair fee, or a reduced fee if necessary.

Relocatees may obtain the society's service by contacting their area relocation officer who is instructed to maintain contact with the Legal Aid society in his area.

FREE DELIVERY WITHIN CITY AREA

No extra charge is made for transporting household goods and other evacuee property from rail head to residence within the delivery area in New York, Cleveland, San Francisco, Sacramento and Los Angeles, according to information received from San Francisco WRA office by Herbert J. Vatcher, evacuee property officer.

All rates on property from Granada to the above-mentioned cities include delivery service to residence. In Chicago, however, carrier's rates do not provide for either pick-up or delivery of goods, therefore, prevailing rates will be charged to relocatees desiring transportation within the city.

a clearance before accepting employment, the process can be completed in a matter of few hours.

"Interviews with evacuees now at Sioux indicate that they have met with enthusiastic reception from their fellow workers," Morgan continued. "The combination of good wages and good working conditions, ample housing and school facilities, and employment in an essential war industry is a very attractive deal for evacuee workers."

Draft deferments for evacuee workers will be granted on the same basis as set for all others at the depot. The visit of the recruiting team has the approval of the relocation program division here and Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director.

WRA WILL SHIP STORIED GOODS

G. F. Castleberry, head of the evacuee property division from Washington, DC., in an interview yesterday reiterated that the WRA will crate and pack evacuee property in private storage and ship it to point of relocation if the evacuee's relocation plan is approved.

Castleberry is here to study and clarify procedures involving evacuee property.

TO GIVE INFORMATION ON OLD-AGE INSURANCE

Hugo B. Thomas Jr., manager of the Pueblo field office of the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, will be available at the welfare office tomorrow afternoon for consultation with anyone who may be entitled to benefits from this source, according to Jacob Gerrild, counselor.

Robert Tashima and Kobin Akeneko, former supervisor and assistant supervisor of the evacuee relocation information bureau office, left Sunday for California. Dr. T. Miyamoto will succeed them as the new head of the bureau.

Jack G. Bohon, finance officer, requests all relocatees to notify the welfare office well ahead of time for their clothing allowance checks. Last minute claims work undue hardship on the offices concerned and their personnel, Bohon added.

Wage and salary workers in industrial or commercial jobs come under this program, but farm and domestic workers and self-employed persons do not. Monthly payments go to persons 65 or older who stop regular work, and the retired worker's wife may also claim benefits when she is 65. The worker's widow may receive payments when 65, or earlier if she has children under 18 in her care.

Benefits must be applied for by the person concerned, or someone acting for him. Proof of eligibility is required with the application.

RELOCATING STUDENTS MUST MAKE TRANSFER

Students expecting to relocate before the end of current school term are urged to notify their principal as soon as possible to insure proper transfer of papers and records to the new school, advised Dr. Lloyd A. Garrison, superintendent of education. Unless the school authorities are notified of the departure well ahead of time, unnecessary hardship will be encountered when a

student attempts to resume and complete his schooling outside.

Students leaving before May 1 should inform the principal sufficiently ahead of time so that transcripts may be prepared and sent to the new school, while those departing after May 1 and before June 6 must arrange their programs now with their advisors in order to receive full year's credit, added Dr. Garrison.

CITES FIRE HAZARDS

Be more cautious when you leave your apartment--if only for a minute or if for the evening. That was the warning issued by Fire Chief Glenn R. Rumley this week.

Be sure your stove is properly checked and combustibles are a safe distance from the stove, Rumley added.

He cited as an example a recent fire in block 6E, in which only the early discovery of the flames prevented a serious loss of valuable property, in addition to endangering of lives of residents in adjoining apartments.

The cardinal rule of fire prevention is good house-keeping, Rumley advised, and we should make our homes as safe as possible.

NOTICES****SHOTS FIRED INTO HOME**

FRESNO--An unidentified person fired three shots at the home of Frank Osaki, 26, who recently returned to the Fowler district from Gila River (Ariz.) relocation center, it was reported. Sheriff George J. Overholt announced his office is investigating the case.

According to Deputy Sheriff Eugene Hunter, one of the shots was fired at the front door, another at a window and third through the screen porch adjoining the kitchen.

None of the shots struck Osaki, who was asleep in a bedroom on the opposite side of the house from where the shooting occurred. The incident took place on Saturday morning, Feb. 10, at about 1 o'clock, while Osaki was alone in the house.

Since his return, Osaki told Hunter, only once did he feel any resentment shown of his presence. It occurred in a Fowler store, where a Filipino stared at him constantly but said nothing.

Osaki and his brother, Moro, who was recently discharged from the Army, returned to the ranch about 6 months ago. Moro is now in Arizona making arrangements to bring back their parents.

Hunter said his investigation failed to show any animosity in the neighborhood, or in Fowler, where Osaki transacts most of his business. Osaki is convinced his neighbors had nothing to do with the attack, asserting that they all have been friendly and aided him in reestablishing himself on his ranch.

SACRAMENTO--The local Council for Civic Unity, of which Rabbi Norman M. Goldberg is chairman, recently issued a statement calling upon the State Personnel Board to "facilitate the quick return" of 87 nisei employees dismissed from the state service in 1942.

The statement said: "We call upon the State Personnel Board to facilitate the quick return of these former employees of the State of California to

their jobs. A speedy decision in this matter, affecting the rights and privileges of this minority group will set a favorable example for employers throughout the state."

BERKELEY--The Daily Californian, UC publication, reported that 65.7 per cent of "a representative group of university students" interviewed in a poll would welcome returning Japanese as members of their living groups, or aid in their return to the UC campus.

The council poll committee interviewed 523 women, men civilians, war veterans and servicemen.

SEATTLE--Miss Masako Takavoshi, nisei nurse at Harborview County hospital, announced last week that she was leaving Seattle, the city in which she was born.

Miss Takavoshi's decision was the outcome of an opposition by a group of nurses at the hospital who circulated a petition to effect that they objected to working alongside a person of Japanese descent.

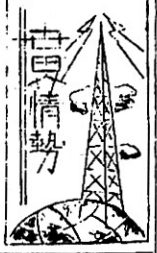

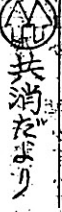
