

SHORT-WAVE

SETS SEIZED

Several short-wave radios in possession of aliens have been picked up here within the last few weeks, disclosed Harlow E. Tomlinson, chief of internal security, yesterday.

It is illegal for an evacuee in a relocation center, either citizen or alien, to possess a short-wave set, stated Tomlinson. Anyone possessing such a set should either turn it in to the internal security office, to be reclaimed when he relocates, or have the short-wave mechanism removed immediately.

According to Presidential Proclamation 2525, no enemy alien may have in his possession, custody, control, or use or operate a short-wave receiving set anywhere in the United States. Severe penalties

PRESENT 442ND WITH PLAQUE FOR RESCUE

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE
--The 442nd Infantry Regiment, comprised of Japanese Americans who rescued the 36th (Texas) Division's now-famous "Lost Battalion" from death in a Nazi trap, was presented with a silver plaque by the grateful survivors.

Under the "Remember the Alamo" regimental insignia of the 141st Infantry Regiment, of which the encircled battalion was a part, and under the insignia of the 442nd, are engraved these words:

"To the 442nd Infantry Regiment. With Deep Sincerity and Utmost Appreciation for the gallant fight to effect our rescue after we had been isolated for seven days. 1st Battalion, 141st Infantry Regiment. Biffontaine, France. From the 24th to the 30th of October, 1944."

The Texans were surrounded by the Germans in the Vosges mountains and confined to a circular area roughly 300 yards in diameter for a week. What food and ammunition they received had to be fired to them in artillery shells or dropped by planes. Their only source of water was a stagnant pool.

TO WIND UP AFFAIRS BEFORE WAR ENDS

The War Relocation Authority proposes to wind up its affairs before the war ends and is translating its proposal into action as shown by 100 per cent increase in relocation of Japanese-American evacuees over the last seven months, retary Harold L. Iokes in that agency's annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30.

The resettlement task involves finding homes for 60,000 evacuees still remaining in relocation centers.

The WRA, under Dillon S. Myer, which became a part of the Department of Interior in February, 1944, is

scheduled for liquidation sometime within the next fiscal year and is working to close all relocation centers by Jan. 2, 1946.

By the end of 1944 fiscal year, almost 17,000 nisei and law-abiding issei, had been relocated outside the West Coast area. Since then the figure has increased to 33,000, who are now living in 47 states and the District of Columbia, and 2500 Japanese Americans have joined the armed forces.

An agreement has been secured by the WRA with the Federal Security Agency, making relocated evacuees eligible for assistance under the program aiding aliens and other persons

Quarterly census taken last month revealed a total of 6,197 evacuees residing in the center, an increase of 603 since the previous census taken last October, according to Joseph L. Buckley, statistician.

The record showed that Kosaburo Baba, 90 years young, is Amache's oldest resident. Other interesting sidelights disclosed: There are 3,557 citizens and 2,640 aliens...60 years or older group led the age groups with 942...Females barely outnumber males, 3,102-3,095...17 to 20 category shows the gentler sex holding a small majority, in 21-29 group it overwhelms the poor males, 456-169... For matrimonially inclined girls, some consolation may be derived from the fact that there are 1,660 eligible males to 1,464 single lassies.

EXCHANGE

UNLIKELY

WASHINGTON--Appears none too good was the report given by Rep. Dworshak (Rep., Idaho) to the possibility of obtaining Japanese government consent to exchange imprisoned construction workers for Japanese nationals interned at Tule Lake, Calif.

Recently the Japanese government indicated a willingness to exchange American civilian internees for the Tule Lake Japanese, but has refused to release the construction workers, of which there are about 1,254, for repatriation.

SENSE OF VALUES

FROM STALD OLD BOSTON comes news that State VFW Commander Charles W. Franscotti got a little noisy and protested against Red Cross accepting blood from nisei donors. Roared Franscotti, "I wouldn't want any Japanese blood and I don't think our servicemen would."

It seems that Mr. Franscotti needs to go into conference with his common sense before getting vociferous; otherwise he will continue to come out with such caustic, unjustified statements. He should know that blood is blood, it matters not whose body it comes from.

We are all brave in making strong statements until the time comes to back them up--so no doubt he is pretty sure he doesn't need nisei blood, even if dying. Moreso, since he isn't dying at present.

But I'm sure "our servicemen" are not as touchy as he is about taking nisei blood. Neither are they in favor of having a man like Mr. Franscotti express their views for them, especially if such views are un-American and bigoted, thus heaping dishonor upon a group of people who are aiding their fellow Americans by giving voluntarily life-saving blood.

AND FROM SEATTLE comes word that Akemi Takayoshi "assigned" her position as a nurse in that city's Harborview hospital because a small group of nurses reportedly opposed working with her and threatened to circulate a petition expressing their views. A racial discrimination whereby the chief sufferers are the patients needing proper care to regain their health.

All over the country hospitals are faced with critical nurse shortage--cry for more nurses is getting louder and louder, and in Seattle a hospital turns one away because of petty personal issue. Shame on those who would

SET DISCUSSION SERIES ON SOCIAL SECURITY

Due to the fact that there seems to be much misunderstanding regarding Social Security, J. Ralph McFarling, community analyst, started a series of three meetings with the resettlement committee of the Protestant churches, the welfare advisory committee and other interested groups.

At the first meeting held last Saturday, the origin of social welfare from the Middle Ages down to early 1930s was reviewed.

Under Feudalism, social welfare was a function of the Catholic church. Assistance to people in need was more or less a sporadic and unorganized affair with the primary emphasis being placed on the donor and the value to him rather than the recipient. With the rise of towns and dissolution of Feudalism, the Catholic church also began to lose power, and social welfare was gradually transferred to civil authorities and became a government function.

In 1601, definite laws were passed during Queen Elizabeth's reign in England to provide care for able-bodied needy through a work relief program; assistance for aged, and apprenticeship care for homeless children. Institutionalization became the principal means of social welfare, which began to break down in the latter part of 19th century.

The US Government has held the states and local communities responsible for assistance to individuals down to the 1930s, when it began to share with the states in their assistance program.

For the next two sessions, the Social Security Act and its various functions will be discussed, stated McFarling.

affected by restrictive government action during the war. Since June 30, this program has been developed into an essential part of relocation.

During the 1944 fiscal year, thousands of evacuees on seasonal leaves have worked in sugar beet, potato and cotton fields, saving priceless war essential crops. Now, with the lifting of the exclusion orders and announcement of liquidation plans, WRA is abandoning seasonal leave entirely in favor of permanent relocation leaves.

Farm programs at the centers produced food crops, poultry and beef valued at more than \$3,000,000 during the 12-month period, all of which were consumed by the residents to effect a saving of that amount in center operation. Present agricultural plans embrace planting of spring crops only at Poston and Gila River relocation centers in Arizona, where harvesting can be finished by July 1.

WANT PROOF OF LEGAL ISSEI ENTRANCE TO U.S.

AUBURN, Calif.—The California Preservation association, formerly Placer County Anti-Japanese league, forwarded a resolution to Rep. Clair Engle (D.) of Red Bluff suggesting federal legislation requiring first generation nisei to prove that their

parents entered this country legally.

Every American-born Japanese under the proposal would be required to furnish proof "that his or her parents entered this country legally and with the express intention of severing all citizenship ties with the native land."

The resolution failed to say to whom the proofs should be furnished or what action should be taken against persons unable to conform to requirements of the proposal.

Since its inception five weeks ago, the association has succeeded in having placed in nearly every shop window here a sign which says: "We do not solicit Japanese trade."

can be imposed for violating this prohibition.

In order to protect innocent evacuees and further the orderly administration of relocation centers, it is deemed advisable to make a uniform prohibition for all evacuees against possession or use of short-wave radios. Therefore, possession or use of a short-wave set by any citizen evacuee shall be an offense against peace and security of the center, which may be punished by disciplinary action of the project director in accordance with WRA regulations, Tomlinson warned.

NEWS ALONG THE COAST

TAKE 3-POINT STAND

STOCKTON--The executive committee and directors of the San Joaquin Farm Bureau federation here made a three-point recommendation in regards to Japanese returning to California at their monthly meeting.

The federation's stand on the Japanese problem, based on recommendations of special committee headed by Verne Hoffman of Lodi, follows:

1--The return to Japan, after cessation of hostilities, of all alien and Japanese Americans admittedly disloyal to the United States.

2--Force Japanese Americans to disavow their dual citizenship to Japan and declare their loyalty to America. If they refuse... they should be returned to Japan.

3--Prohibit the operation of foreign language schools, limiting study of foreign languages to state schools, namely, high schools, junior colleges and universities.
