NISEI SAYS 3 CONTEST LEGALITY SHOTS FIRED OF WEST COAST BAN INTO HOME

LANCASTER, Calif.,-- Six rifle shells, said to bear Army markings, were found near the house of John Shiokari, who recently returned to his farm 14 miles north of here. Shiokari reported to the sheriff's office that shots were fired into his home and pump house.

"This is my home and somebody is trying to shoot me out of it and I can't understand it," said Shiokari, who has been called to report for his pre-induction physical examination. He said he was in the bedroom when he heard six shots fired.

Shiokari relocated from Poston relocation center to attend the University of Nebraska. He returned to his ranch on Feb. 15.

NO DIFFICULTY GETTING WAR PLANT CLEARANCE

In practically all war plants near San Francisco, particularly smaller ones, no difficulties of clearances will be encountered by qualified nisei seeking employment, according to report received from Fred W. Ross of the San Francisco WRA relocation office by the relocation program office here.

Ross wrote: "We have discussed the problem of war-plant clearance on a local basis with the district security officer of the Provost Marshal General's office for the employment of persons of Japanese ancestry in plants and facilities will no longer be required, except on certain specific facilities, such as Master Inspection Responsibility list and secret and top secret contracts. Not more than 1 or 2 per cent of all the plants in the San Francisco Bay region are on the special list. This ... should greatly expedite the employment of evacuees

LOS ANGELES--Three Japanese-Americans--Dr. George Oshikubo, former Oakland dentist; Elmer Yamamoto, former LA attorney, and Kiyoshi Shigokawa, erstwhile San Pedro fishing boat operator--appeared before Federal Judge Poirson H. Issues 160 Indefinites

During the month of February, a total of 160 indefinite leaves were issued by the local relocation program office, disclosed Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor, yesterday. Of this number, 46 were issued for individuals returning to the West Coast, while 47 families comprised of 127 persons were included in the figure for the last month to boost the family relocation program.

To date, 3,419 have gone out on indefinites since the opening of the center, of which 67 have returned to the West Coast.

REFUSES TO REVIEW DECISION

WASHINGTON--The Supreme Court recently refused to reconsider its decision in upholding the Army's evacuation of Japanese from the Pacific coast in 1942, declaring it was a legal wartime action.

The court denied a petition of Fred T. Korematsu, nisei from San Leandro, Calif., who asked for a reconsideration of his conviction on Dec. 18, 1944, for failure to report for evacuation.

Korematsu, given a five-year probationary sentence, contended the decision overlooked the fact that native-born Japanese had been shorn of citizenship rights.

"If military control over civilians is to be unlimited," his petition

represented the American Civil Liberties Union, in seeking to enjoin officials of the Western Defense Command from preventing their return to Los Angeles, contended that the WRA had listed the three plaintiffs as "loyal," but the Army, he charged, had refused to permit the petitioners to return to their former homes here.

US Attorney Charles H. Carr informed the court that the Army had issued individual exclusion orders against the three after a "thorough investigation," and said the Government would "uphold the Army to the limit" and vigorously resist their efforts to secure the injunction.

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TWO CONFINED

Shigoyoshi Kawabata and Minoru Hinoki, Tule Lake segregation center internees, are serving 30-day confinement sentences for unlawful activities as presidents of center's two pro-Japan societies, Sokuji Kikoku Hoshi Dan and Hokoku Seinin Dan.

They were arrested and sentenced on a charge of unlawful assembly, following a raid by center police on a meeting of leaders of the two societies.

PROTESTS EVACUEE RELEASE

Speaking from his background of 10 prewar years as a newspaper correspondent in Japan and his subsequent observations, James R. Young gave a Fresno Town Hall Forum audience some information which should be an eye opener for Californians.

Moreover, at least one of his assertions should occasion either a confirmation or contradiction from official sources.

In protesting against the release of Japanese evacuees by the War Relocation Authority until the War Department is prepared to guarantee safety from attack "west of the Mississippi," he said.

"We have been given to understand the FBI passes on the loyalty of those released from WRA camps. That, I know positively, is not so!"

And that statement emphatically calls for a response from one or the other or both of the agencies mentioned.

The public, however, will prefer such from the FBI rather than by spokesmen for a setup concededly quite lenient toward its wards.

Amazing, too, is Young's claim that some 10 per cent of the 35,000 Japanese who colonized certain mandated Pacific islands--which also were being fortified in violation of treaties--were former California farmers.

He explained:

"These men had learned farming in California and Hawaii, yet practically none of them was an American citizen. A great many of the valley contingent were reported to be from the Fresno and Stockton areas."

Thinking back, many rural residents in the valley doubtless can recall their curiosity when Japanese neighbors moved away--destination unannounced.

Young's version is that a large number of them, their California chore completed, went to the Marshalls, Carolines, etc., on assignment.

Pending facts to the contrary, his report on the evacuee guarantor question and the Japanese who emigrated from America at the emperor's bidding a few years ago stands.

DISCLOSES RETURN OF 500 COAST EVACUEES

More than 500 persons of Japanese ancestry have returned to the West Coast since the lifting of the exclusion orders went into effect on Jan. 2, Interior Secretary Harold L. Ickes announced last week.

IRA records, through Feb. 17, showed that during the same seven-week period over 1000 relocated eastward. An additional 62 left the centers to enter active Army service.

The rate of Coast return, said Ickes, has conformed

with the expectations of IRA administrators and with the assurance that it would be a gradual and orderly process. Of the 521 who returned west, most of them in family groups, 413 went to California, 43 to Washington, 33 to Oregon and 32 to Arizona.

Three hundred fifty-two of the 1200 eastward relocatees went to Illinois, 120 to Ohio, 85 to New York, 70 to Michigan, 66 to Colorado and 63 to New Jersey. The remainder was scattered in smaller numbers to 24 other states.

Sadamune, former Oakland grocer, informed authorities that when his wife answered the phone, a man's voice said: "You and your husband are to get out of town, or I'll cut your throat."

The Sadamunes have three sons serving in the United States Army. They are Sgt. Alfred, wounded in action in Germany; Pfc. Raymond, with General MacArthur in the Philippines, and Pvt. Clarence, in training in Texas.

我々日系人は在米五十年の歴史を有し、法律を遵守し、産業を営み、初め商工業業、其他各種業及び労働に従事し、住居の基礎を固め、善良なる住民たるは米國一般職者の認むるところなり。

一九四一年日米戦争勃発し、一九四二年軍部に依り西部沿岸同胞は一世三世の別なく強制立退を命ぜられ、精神的には極度の衝動と脅威を受け、

物質的には半世紀に亘る苦心經營の基礎は全く根柢より覆され、此れ而も荒涼たる原野の狭小内に約三千年の歴史の生活を續け、今日に至り、然るに一九四四年十二月十七日西部防衛司令官の防衛地域除外令撤廃と同時に WRA は一九四六年一月二日限り全轉住所を閉鎖する旨を明せり。
