ILLEGALLY EXCLUDED CONTEND THREE NISEI

LOS ANGELES--Contending that they are being illegally excluded from Southern California by the Western Defense Command, a Japanese-American attorney and two fellow nisei testified last Wednesday in US Judge Peirson M. Hall's court, seeking to override the military order.

Attorney Elmer Yamamoto and his co-petitioners, Kiyoshi Shigekawa, former fishing boat operator, and Dr. George Ochikubo, dentist, asserted that they are loyal to the United States and denied charges made by the Army authorities that they should be excluded from the West Coast because of averred disloyal acts.

DIRECT ORDERS

Brig. Gen. William H. Wilbur, chief of staff of the Western Defense Command, last Friday explained in US Judge Peirson M. Hall's court that the exclusion of certain Japanese from California defense zones is executed under direct orders of the President, as issued to the military through the War Department.

It was brought out in the testimony that the WRA had approved their return, but military officers, after making individual investigations, ordered them excluded. US Attorney Charles H. Carr, in opposing the injunction against the Western Defense Command by the three nisei petitioners, has called numerous ranking officers

S/SGT. KASHIWABARA WINS BRONZE STAR

Awarding of the Bronze Star to S/Sgt. Kay K. Kashiwabara, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matsuo Kashiwabara, 12E-4B, was announced recently by Lieut. Gen. Jacob L. Devers, commanding general of the Sixth Army Group now serving in France.

His citation reads in part: "...for heroic achievement in France, from 28, October to 5, November, 1944. While seeking cover from an intense enemy artillery barrage, Sgt. Kashiwabara, section sergeant of a heavy machine gun section, was painfully wounded in the back by shrapnel. Disregarding instructions by the medical aid man to be evacuated, he remained with his men because of the imminent danger of an enemy counter-attack, and in the ensuing action skillfully and successfully led his men against the strong enemy forces. Sgt. Kashiwabara's courage and devotion to duty inspired his men to continue their advance, despite the heavy opposition and unfavorable weather."

Sergeant Kashiwabara, now stationed at Fitzsimmons General hospital in Denver, is spending his furlough here with his parents.

IN DENVER ON BUSINESS

James G. Lindley, project director, and Henry F. Halliday, assistant project director, are in Denver on official business, revealed W. Ray Johnson, acting project director. They are expected to return this Friday.

PRIOR RELOCATION PLAN CONDITION SUSPENDED

The requirement of an approved relocation plan as a condition to relocation assistance (grants) is suspended until further notice in the case of center residents eligible to relocate, Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor, announced yesterday. Only exception will be those needing public assistance at a point of relocation.

Evacuees eligible to relocate shall be entitled on application to relocation assistance and property transportation assistance to any point in the United States from which they are not excluded by military order.

However, the center relocation program office shall give the applicant all the factual information available on the area of proposed destination, bringing to his attention any adverse facts, such as critical housing problem.

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ARRIVES HERE TO ARRANGE LAND LEASING

J. B. Barge of the real estate division of the Army engineers arrived on the center to make arrangements for the leasing of project farm land declared surplus by the WRA, according to James G. Lindley, project director. Bids for leases have been advertised in nearby community papers.

Lindley stated that project feed lots, pasture land for hog and cattle, slaughterhouse, several of the block ranch buildings and the center proper will be retained.

POISSON POTPOURRI

TO THE EDITOR
WRITERS of "letter to the editor" in California against the Return of evacuees are loud and windy, but invariably they lack the full informational knowledge of the subject. They are usually addicted to seeing things their way only and have a sly way of overlooking facts that may belie their utterances.

Take for instance a lady in Merced who says, "...group of ministers are reported urging the return of the Japanese who they feel are honest American citizens. If they are so honest, why are they not out fighting along with our sons and grandsons instead of being thoroughly protected?"

Now, if she was a hermit or if she came out of the hills of Kentucky, we could excuse her for making such a statement--but out in sunny California--Heaven forbid!

What we want to know is just what she was doing while the 100th Battalion and the 442nd Infantry were writing indelibly in the annals of the US Army feats of heroism--collectively and individually--that has yet to be approached by any group of American soldiers. And for her information, both the 100th and the 442nd are comprised entirely of persons of Japanese descent.

She might ask any US soldier who has served in the Italian campaign or in French action, and they'll tell her that the Japanese Americans are "out fighting along with our sons and grandsons." And they're doing a danged good job of it.

And she might ask the evacuees returning to the Coast if they have a son or brother or husband in the armed forces and more likely than not the answer would be yes. Practically all the young men physically acceptable to the Army, who were in relocation centers, have been called to active duty, and

DAINGEROUS NONSENSE

Well, those returnees have relatives--close ones--in "this war fighting to win," and many of them have joined the Army from the confines of the barbed wire fences. They joined knowing that they had been forcibly removed from their homes on an act that verged close to being unconstitutional. Yet, their subsequent war deeds far surpassed expectations, thus establishing once and for all the nisei have earned the right to pursue the American way of life.

OFFER FARM JOB FOR 60

The Mesa Orchards at Mesa, Idaho, has openings for about 60 evacuee workers on a permanent basis.

Family housing consisting of 4-room cottages and two-room cabins equipped with running water, sinks, wash basins and cooking facilities are available with year-round employment promised. There is also work for single evacuees.

Wages are 60 cents an hour for men and 50 cents an hour for women and children. During the apple picking season, wages are paid on piece basis.

Employer has a contract with a local doctor and hospital to care for all medical needs, for which service the worker pays \$1 a month and the employer pays 50 cents a month. Grade and high school facilities are available with no tuition charges.

WASHINGTON-- Authorization by the Congress to sterilize the Japanese aliens held in US segregation camps was proposed by Rep. Johnson (D.) of Oklahoma. His suggestion was disclosed in a testimony released by the House Appropriations committee considering the resettlement of enemy aliens.

"I will say for the record...that we should make an appropriation to sterilize the whole outfit," Johnson told his fellow committee members. He criticized what he termed the "pampering" of Japanese war prisoners and said "our citizens generally are getting fed up" over the treatment of prisoners.

Brig. Gen. William H. Wilbur, chief of staff of the Western Defense Command, declared: "We consider it absolutely essential to exclude those individuals we deem dangerous to the military effort." He pointed out the ever-present danger to the country and the vital information which might be given submarine captains or enemy ships off shore.

The General listed those named in the exclusion orders as:

"Those who have definite information about, such as those renouncing American citizenship.

"Those who refuse to swear allegiance to the United States.

"Those who have asked to be returned to Japan."

SAYS RETURNEES BRING NEW SOCIAL PROBLEMS

SACRAMENTO--The state Department of Social Welfare revealed recently that many of the returning evacuees are bringing new problems to the war services program in California.

"Cases received from the WRA so far have presented serious social and medical problems and have raised a number of basic questions in regard to residence, method of referral and scope and duration of eligibility under the war services program," said a department bulletin.

Several unemployables, ill persons, needy minors and other indigent returnees have been received in California since the lifting of the West Coast ban, the bulletin reported.

Even in naval engagements with the enemy the naval doctors give the finest care available to the wounded Japanese captives who are brought aboard their ships, yet Supt. Hilton refused admittance to an innocent young woman who was born in America of Japanese ancestry and who had no part in this ghastly war.

Dr. Shevir is to be commended for his stand.

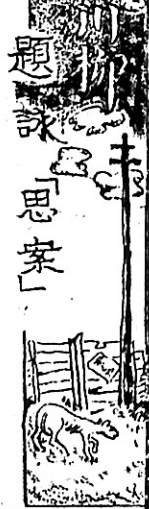
