## HLLEGALLY EXCLUDED CONTEND THREE NISE

LOS AMGELES -- Contending that they are being illegally excluded from Southern California by the West-ern Defense Command, a Japanese-American attorney and two fellow nisei testified last Wednesday in US Judge Peirson M. Hall's court, seeking to override the military order.

Attorney Elmer Yamamoto and his co-petitioners, ON BUSINESS Kiyoshi Shigekawa, former fishing boat operator, and Dr. George Ochikubo, dentist, asserted that they are loyal to the United States and denied charges made by the Army authorities that they should be excluded from the West Coast because of averred disloyal acts.

#### DIRECT ORDERS

· Brig. Gen. William H. Wilbur, chief of staff of the Western Defense Command, last Friday explained in US Judge Peirson M. Hall's court that the exclusion of certain Japanese from California defense zonos is executed under direct orders of the President, as issued to the military through the War Department.

It was brought out in the testimony that the TRA had approved their return, but military officers, after making individual investigations, ordered them excluded. US Attorney Charles H. Carr, in opposing the injunction against the Western Defense Command by the three nisei petitioners, has called numerous ranking officers -recontinued on page 3 ---

Awarding of the Bronze Star to 3/Sgt. Kay K. Kashiwabara, son of Mr. and Mrs. Matsuo Kashiwabara, 12E-4B, was announced recently by Lieut.Gen. Jacob L. Devers, commanding general of the Sixth Army Group now serving in France.

His citation reads in part: "... for heroic achievement in France, from 28, October to 5, November, 1944. While seeking cover from an intense enemy artillery barrage, Sgt. Disregarding instructions by the medical aid man to be evacuated, he remained with his mon because of the imminent danger of an enemy counter-attack, and in the ensuing action skillfully and successfully led his men against the strong enemy forces. Sgt. Kashiwabara's courage and devotion to duty inspired his men to continue their advance, despite the heavy opposition and unfavorable weather."

Sergeant Kashiwabara, now stationed at Fitzsimmons General hospital in Denver, is spending his furlough here with his parents.

RITERS of "letter to the editor" in California against the Feturn of evacuees are loud and windy, but invariably they lack the full informational full informational knowledge of the subject. They are usually addicted to seeing things their way only and have a sly way of overlooking facts that may belie their utterances.

Take for instance a lady in Merced who says, "...group of ministers are reported urging the return of the Japanese who they feel are honest American citizens. If they are so honest, why are they not out fighting along with our sons and grandsons instead of being thoroughly protected?"

Now, if she was a hermit or if she came out of the hills of Kentucky, we could excuse her for making such a statement -- but out in sunny California --Heaven forbid!
