NEWELL, Calif.--A group of 125 Japanese aliens and admittedly disloyal citizens left Tule Lake segregation center last Monday for an undisclosed Justice Department camp.

Shigeyoshi Kawabata and Minoru Kinoki, presidents of two pro-Japanese societies at the camp, were also included in the group, a WRA spokesman reported.

This transfer makes 1,016 segregants to be sent from Tule Lake since last December 27 to Department of Justice camps, the WRA revealed. There were three previous transfers.

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# URGIE CENTERS KEPT OPEN FOR DURATION

After a week of study and discussion on various evacuee problems, the delegates to the seven center conference in Salt Lake City two weeks ago decided to send a letter to National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer, urging that the relocation centers "be kept

open for the duration of the war and for some time thereafter. It may be needed," according to Sakae Kawashiri, chairman of the Community Council, who was one of the delegates.

Toy Dragami and Shinichi Furuta were the other local delegates.

Present economic status and fear of violence and discrimination were cited as two reasons for the request to keep the centers open.

Along with the letter, an itemized statement of facts and 21 recommendations covering various problems and difficulties confronting them were submitted to the national director.

The recommendations briefly summarized included:

CAMP SHELBY, Miss.--After six months of activity the 171st Infantry Battalion, Separate, a training unit of Japanese Americans, was officially inactivated as of last Feb. 18.

The 171st trained men have entered the ranks of the veteran 100th Battalion and the 442nd Infantry, both having won fame on the battlefield.

In his final message to his men, Major Senter, commanding officer, declared:

"This is the day I had hoped would never come until the dawn of peace. However, now the 171st is just another page in history.

"You have made a record of which you may well be proud, and I am confident that had you stayed together, you would have been second to none no matter what the assignment."

Following is the inquiry sent Hoover:

"Has the FBI put the stamp of loyalty on these returning Japanese? How can the FBI tell whether a Japanese-American is loyal to his country or to Japan if said Japanese is smart enough to keep his feelings hidden by word and action?"

Hoover replied:

"The Federal Bureau of Investigation makes no recommendation whatsoever as to whether any person of Japanese ancestry should return to the West Coast. This is a matter exclusively within the jurisdiction of Army authorities, and in this connection it is my understanding that the Army contemplates carefully screening those individuals within the war relocation camps prior to their release, in order that those believed to be dangerous may be made the subject of individual

## COAST WAR WORK PLANT HAS SEVERAL OPENINGS

The Pacific Electric Manufacturing corporation of San Francisco has openings for several evacuees, according to information received here by the local relocation program office. This concern has several prime war contracts, hence is considered essential work.

The plant has been cleared for employment of Japanese Americans without the necessity of filing for individual Provost Marshal General's Office clearance. It designs and makes special equipment and does a variety of repair work and has the following departments: Machine shop, pattern shop, foundry, steel fabrication shop, engineering department and clerical staff. From time to time, there will be vacancies in all departments.

be wrong as many times as he is right--though in many cases others are not aware of it.

In addition, he can err in action as he errs in thinking, and when both occur at the same time--it means "not so good." This doesn't, however, preclude that his actions are always with malice or with lack of good intentions.

### MANY NISEI IN WAR WORKING FOOD

WASHINGTON--Over 200 nisei--many of whom spent months in relocation centers --are working in the capital, a large percentage in Government jobs. About one-tenth of those in Washington are in domestic work.

Some are doing highly confidential work for the War Department and the FBI. Some are translators and researchers; some stenographers and clerks.

The United Federal Workers union has expressed strong opposition to discriminations against these citizens.

WRA employ persons of Japanese ancestry in WRA field offices... Reinduction into centers be simplified... Establishment of hostels and homes through the FHA... Provide transportation of all evacuee property... Establishment of Old People's home exclusively for persons of Japanese ancestry... Make arrangements so that former civil service employees may be reinstated and business licenses be made available... Short-term leave regulation be changed to permit absence of two months and one month extension... Release of frozen assets to individual or organizations... Powers of attorney for alien parents to manage and operate properties damages from anti-Japanese action... Insurance against damage to evacuee property while stored or while in transit... Provide students of Japanese ancestry protection and opportunities equal to those enjoyed by Caucasian students... Secure work opportunities for relocatees and returnees on equal basis with Caucasian citizens, particularly in reference to labor unions.

VISALIA, Calif.--Three shots from high-powered rifle were fired last week into a house occupied by

Sam Uyeno and 10 other Japanese, reported Sheriff S. B. Sherman.

The shooting occurred on Uyeno's small farm east of Oroshi 25 miles from here.

The sheriff's investigation also revealed that a small unoccupied building near Uyeno's place had been burned by trespassers on the same night. The building was owned by Frank Sakaguchi, who is at Poston (Ariz.) relocation center.

In the shooting which occurred at 10:30 p.m., two bullets entered the living room and one into the bedroom. Although Uyeno indicated the bullets passed near some of the occupants, none was struck.

Uyeno returned recently from Poston with 10 of his family and relatives, including his elderly parents and several children.

"The Federal Bureau of Investigation does, upon request from the War Relocation Authority or the Army, conduct a search of its files for any information which might be available concerning any particular individual who is being considered for return, but this information is passed onto the interested agency with no recommendation or comment.

"Representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation do not sit on any boards considering these cases, and this bureau certainly does not certify the loyalty of any individuals released under these circumstances," the F. B. I. chief concluded.
