

MUST CHECK OLD PROPERTY REQUEST FORMS

Evacuees who have received notices from the local evacuee property office for appointments to check old request forms should do so immediately, advised Herbert J. Vatcher, evacuee property officer.

Unless the residents appear and fill out new forms, the requests for storage or shipment of property on the West Coast will have to be cancelled, he added.

All requests for storage (Form WRA 155) and shipment (Form WRA 156) that are now pending have been returned to the center evacuee property office to be reviewed, and individuals concerned have been mailed notices from the local office.

ORDERS RETURN OF PROPERTY TO NISEI

OREGON CITY, Ore.--Last week the circuit court ordered Mr. and Mrs. Dale Bergh, Boring, Ore., farmers, to return the farm they had leased from Masayuki Fujimoto, who has recently returned from a relocation center. This is the first decision involving nisei ownership of land, it was reported.

FEW EVACUEES RETURN WEST

DENVER--A nationwide survey revealed that only a few of the Japanese leaving relocation centers are returning to the West Coast, according to H. Rex Lee, chief of WRA relocation division in Washington, D.C.

Only 1,495 of the 28,541 evacuees who had reported their resettlement were in California, Oregon and Washington, on Feb. 1, the survey disclosed. Of the 60,297 Japanese remaining in eight relocation centers, only 1,938 had definite plans to return to the Pacific slope.

The West Coast will have a postwar Japanese population numbering in low thousands, if the present trend continues, compared with the 110,000 living there Dec. 7, 1941, the WRA officials stated.

Most of the resettlement revolves around large cities, with Chicago, Cleveland, and New York being the largest.

to Mrs. Chikayo Masuoka of 6H-8B who had four sons in the armed forces of the United States, one of whom, Peter, was killed in action. Mrs. Clark told Mrs. Masuoka how proud General Clark was of the nisei fighting men and considered them one of the best outfits he ever had.

Mrs. Clark was especially happy to meet Charles M. Ankcom, project supply officer, who served under her husband as brigadier general.

RETURNEES ATTACKED WITH FIRE AND BULLETS

SAN JOSE--Early last week a Japanese family of nine were attacked with fire and bullets by a group of unidentified men who set fire to the ranch home on the San Jose-Alviso road to which they had returned recently from a relocation center.

This was the first case of violence against the returning evacuees to be reported to Santa Clara county authorities.

Gasoline was splashed on the wooden six-room house and a match applied. And as the family awakened and rushed out to fight the flames, shots were fired at them from a slowly moving

sedan which subsequently disappeared in the darkness.

Joe Takeda, nisei and acting head of the household, said: "We expected something unpleasant but we didn't anticipate this. We have no bitterness. We realize we are the victims of circumstances. We have always wanted to help the war effort and have sent word to the farmers of the valley we would be glad to help...where needed, especially those farms where sons are in the service."

Three deputies who were at the scene shortly after being called found two empty jugs still carrying the

Applicants for USO hostess have come in such a drove that it was forced to temporarily discontinue accepting any more members, it was reported. It has an active list of 75 hostesses at present.

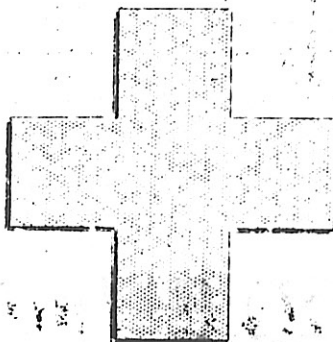
I take it that our USO hasn't an active list of 75 hostesses, not quite, but I venture to say that it has a program every bit as good as any set up in any relocation center.

These returns have to be completed and filed by April 15 by the appointed personnel, advised Horn. Evacuees are not required to make this return unless they had substantial incomes earned in the state in 1944 and who have since returned to the center to reside.

ASTRIP QUALIFYING TEST SET HERE FOR APRIL 12

The Army Specialized Training Reserve program qualifying test will be held on Thursday, April 12, at the local high school, according to Miss Grace Lewis, school guidance counselor.

Young men taking this test must have their 17th birthday anniversary between Oct. 1, 1944 and Aug. 31, 1945, and must be a high school graduate by July, 1945. They must also be American citizens.

If an applicant receives a qualifying score and written consent from parents or guardian is obtained, he may then enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps and ask for assignment to the ASTRP.

The test is said to take two hours and is divided into three sections. The first section tests the knowledge of arithmetic, algebra and geometry; the second section test reading comprehension, and the third section tests level of vocabulary.

Candidates will be notified by May 19 as to whether or not they have passed

The service covers both advice and representation in court, generally covering all types of civil matters. Some organizations also handle criminal matters.

Within the scope of its objectives, the legal aid organizations will cooperate with the WRA in meeting the needs of nisei for legal services, it was announced.

NISEI HERO AWARDED DSC POSTHUMOUSLY

Pfc. Harry Madokoro, formerly of Wat. onville, Calif., was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, nation's second highest military honor, for extraordinary heroism on the Italian front.

Brig. Gen. John H. Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command at Camp Hahn, Calif., presented the medal and a 250 word citation signed by Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark to Mrs. Matsu Madokoro, mother of the hero, at a ceremony held in the Cottonwood Bowl, Unit II, Poston (Ariz.) relocation center.

"By his stubborn determination, conspicuous devotion to duty and courage, Madokoro inspired his squad in preventing the enemy's escape while his company closed in to occupy the town of Luciana," the citation stated.

Private Madokoro volunteered for the Army in June, 1943 and went overseas with the 442nd Infantry. He was killed in action last August 25.

PAMPHLET HERE ON OHIO FARMS

Prospective relocatees seeking information on Midwest farming possibilities will find the recently issued 12-page pamphlet entitled "Ohio Farming" a very useful booklet, announced Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor. As far as citizenship is concerned, how many Japanese-Americans disobey our laws or are in jail? How many cases of sabotage by Japanese-Americans have been reported? I have not heard of any.

There are some disloyal Japanese, yes, but I still believe we have men qualified to determine who they are and I do not believe they are being turned loose.

land and Cincinnati being most popular. Illinois has accepted 7,900 relocatees, more than twice as many as any other state, while South Carolina is the only state without resettlers. Rural families, particularly those owning land, comprise the bulk of those planning to return to the Coast.

WRA says not all evacuees are eligible to return to the Pacific states. The Army has excluded an undisclosed number from coastal areas, and others are not free to leave WRA supervision. Those who are not permitted to relocate will be transferred to Tule Lake segregation center when the relocation centers are closed on Jan. 2, 1946.

The present Japanese population of the United States, including those in the armed forces, approximates 133,000; according to the WRA census. The eight relocation centers and the Tule Lake Camp have about 79,000 inhabitants, and almost 67,000 have relocated. The remaining 17,000 are Japanese who were living outside the Pacific coast military zone and were not affected by the WRA program.

OVER 2000 IN ARMY

Of the 33,000 who have resettled, 28,541 reported voluntarily. The Army has more than 2,000, and another 2,000 are on indefinite leaves from the centers. Whereabouts of nearly 4,500 of the evacuees who have left the centers are not definitely known.

Births at the eight centers, at Tule Lake, and at Jerome relocation center (now closed) totaled 4,837 through January. There were 1,375 deaths.

Colorado River relocation center (Poston) leads in number of relocatees with 5,773, while Minidoka and Gila River centers follow in order with 4,853 and 4,753 respectively.
