

KENNY'S STATEMENT CHALLENGED

SACRAMENTO--Assemblyman Chester F. Gannon of Sacramento challenged statements by Attorney General Robert W. Kenny which is said to have implied that agricultural production has suffered since the evacuation of Japanese from California.

The Sacramento legislator, former chairman of an interim committee on Japanese problems, said the investigators were informed repeatedly that vegetables produced by the evacuees' white successors were equal both in quantity and quality, and that greater yields an acre have been harvested since the Japanese left.

POLICY GOVERNING VISITS TO CENTERS MODIFIED

A modification of the present policy governing visits to relocation centers, effective April 16, allows relocatees two visits not to exceed an accumulative total of 30 days, according to an announcement by National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer. The new regulation also eliminates the previous requirement for advance approval for visits to the centers.

Another feature of the adjusted policy is the provision, whereby a visitor may be refunded the guest charges on application to the project director, if he has accomplished or scheduled the relocation of other family members during his stay at the center.

The altered ruling is intended to permit as free a movement as possible of center visitors, and at the

NISEI HOME FIRED UPON

MADERA, Calif.--To determine whether the bullet dug from the wall of the home of Minoru Ohashi on the Ripperdan road was fired by a rifle or revolver, Deputy Sheriff Ray Andress sent the bullet to the state bureau of identification in Sacramento for examination.

The slug was one of five fired into the Ohashi home early last week. In the building were Ohashi, an honorably discharged veteran; his parents, Mr. and

REDUCED STAFF

THE PIONEER staff box does not make interesting reading, so perhaps not many of you have taken the trouble to read it, which is understandable. Andrews said the state attorney general's office called from Sacramento for a complete report of the shooting, but did not indicate that action, if any, would be taken.

Meanwhile, a thorough investigation was launched by District Attorney Everett Coffey in collaboration with the sheriff's office.

The bullet that entered the house went through an inch thick outside wall, shattered a mirror in an upstairs bedroom and then drove into the inside wall panel.

Ohashi, 26, returned to his home March 11, bringing his family with him, after he was given a medical discharge from the Army. He has a brother in the service on the western front.

He told the officers he has heard no threats and that his relations with his neighbors have been friendly.

SEABROOK MAN TO OFFER JOBS

Herbert W. Letts, executive assistant to the president of the Seabrook Farms in New Jersey, will arrive in the center this afternoon from Denver to interview evacuees interested in jobs at Seabrook, according to Walter J. Knodel, relocation program officer.

Opportunities are offered for single men and women, and childless couples, or with children over 16 years of age. Room and meals (excellent cafeteria) are available for \$8 a week. Year round employment; minimum wage for women 55 cents an hour, for men 60 cents an hour, and 93 cents an hour maximum. Work week will range from 40 to 70 hours.

The Farms also offer paid vacations, life and hospitalization insurance free after one year service.

SERVICE FLAGS SET

The Blue Star Service club and the Community Activities section are in the process of making service flags for every eligible family in the center, announced John D. Neal, CA supervisor.

The service club purchased the materials and the CA section is undertaking the task of creating the finished product.

RELOCATORS ASSURED OF ASSISTANCE

Resettlement assistance for evacuees in Cleveland was assured last Friday when the county commissioners consented to provide the dispersal of federal funds to be advanced for this purpose, according to Mrs. Dorothy G. Barber, district relocation officer.

Previously the county commissioners questioned their right to advance poor relief funds for the special resettlement assistance program. Their attorney had questioned the use of poor funds, since the assistance program was rehabilitation and not relief.

But this matter was worked out satisfactorily when the Ohio Welfare Bureau requested an advance of funds from the regional Social Security Board for the resettlement program.

Several evacuees whose applications for assistance have been approved, but had been held up pending this decision, will receive their checks within a day or so, added Mrs. Barber.

RESETTLEMENT FUND PAYS DECEASED'S BILLS

The issei need have no fears of being a financial burden if they should become suddenly destitute, unemployed, ill, or meet death unexpectedly after leaving a relocation center, according to Mrs. Haru Tanaka of St. Louis, Mo.

One of the resettlers employed by Mrs. Tanaka, who operates a cafe with her husband, died recently after a brief illness. To her knowledge, the deceased, George Yasumitsu Nakai, was a bachelor and had no close relatives.

Having only \$59 when he

died, the Resettlement Assistance Fund, set up by the Social Security Board to aid needy evacuees, added the necessary amount to pay for Nakai's hospitalization, doctor's bills, and funeral costs. The funeral was entirely fitting and in no way less than anyone would accord a close friend or relative, said Mrs. Tanaka.

The deceased, of Miyeken, came to St. Louis from Poston relocation center to work at Tanaka's cafe. Prior to evacuation, Nakai resided at Tucson, Ariz.

Mrs. Tanaka is seeking information on the whereabouts of the deceased's relatives in Japan, as she wishes to send the ashes to them after the war.

Another example of aid given by the Resettlement Assistance Fund to evacuees in need: Shiyokichi Kobayashi, an issei, underwent an operation at the St. John's Hospital in St. Louis. His doctor's bills and hospitalization were all paid by the Social Security Board.

NEWS ALONG THE COAST RETURNEES FARE WELL

The Murakamis are busily engaged preparing for the grand opening of their family store--Higa 10 Cents store--well known in Seattle for many years.

The family returned from Minidoka relocation center on Jan. 23, and only nine days later they were saddened by the death of Mr. Murakami, who died of heart attack. The two girls and their brother--Kay, Betty and Masako--are helping their mother carry on in the business, which they hope to have in operation in about two months.

They reported that they have been well received by everyone and have encountered no unpleasant incidents. Referring to some unfavorable rumors of conditions "back home," Betty, the family spokesman, said, "The people have been in the center for three years, and they don't know what it's like outside now."

Taro Matsumura, who recently returned to Seattle with his wife and daughter, Jean, plans to resume operation of his wholesale wood and coal business. After contacting many of his old Caucasian customers, he feels certain that he can proceed with very little interruption of the friendly relationship he has experienced in the past.

The Matsumuras were evacuated to Minidoka relocation center. Matsumura has spent eight months in Salt Lake City, assisting in the Utah coal industry with labor problems, and recently moved to Spokane, from whence he returned to Seattle.

He has two sons, Henry, in the Army, and George of Spokane, Wash., and two other daughters living in Chicago.

Miss Bessie Nagahori honor graduate of Compton junior college and a recent returnee to Los Angeles from Gila River relocation center, is well pleased with her present job, which she considers a "pretty ideal situation." She is working as a domestic, which pays her \$125 a month and room and board.

She has "gone everywhere" since her return about eight weeks ago and has had not a single unpleasant encounter of any sort.

"The people," Miss Nagahori said, "are too busy now to wonder who you are, and I'm sure those in the centers don't realize how pleasant things are in Los Angeles. My principal advice to my friends in the centers is for them not to wait, but come out here, for the only way you can get a job... is by being here."
