# POLICY GOVERNING VISITS TO CENTERS MODIFIED

A modification of the present policy governing visits to relocation centers, effective April 16, allows relocatees two visits not to exceed an accumulative total of 30 days, according to an announcement by National MRA Director Dillon 3. Myer. The new regulation also eliminates the previous requirement for advance approval for visits to the centers.

Another feature of the adjusted policy is the provision, whereby a visitor may be refunded the guest charges on application to the project director, if he has accomplished or scheduled the relocation of other family members during his stay at the center.

The altered ruling is intended to permit as free a movement as possible of center visitors and at the
