Offering year-round work for at least 1600 persons, plus seasonal employment for 5000 more, the Seabrook Farms opened widely the door of attractive opportunity to center relocators. H. W. Letts, an executive of the Bridgeton, N.J., firm, visited Amache last week in the interest of explaining the advantages of the Farms' offer.

Letts stated that while he is interested in having the relocatees come on permanent basis, his concern will pay the traveling expenses of any dissatisfied evacuee employee to any point in the West Coast--provided he has worked until Dec. 1.

Project Director James G. Lindley was advised by National WRA Director Dillon S. Myer last Friday that the Spanish Embassy has formally notified the State Department that it will no longer represent Japanese interest in the United States.

"We have no information as yet as to what nation may take over the function

TWO NEUTRALS

With the recent announcement of the Spanish Government's withdrawal as protecting power, the Japanese Government was left without representation by a neutral power in the United States.

There are only two other neutral countries in a position to represent Japan in the United States. They are Switzerland, which is representing this country in Japan, and Sweden, but both of those neutral countries are said to lack sufficient personnel to undertake the task.

BACK TOLERANCE

RACE KEPT in the mess hall at San Quentin prison recently will in no way affect the newly instituted policy of California state prison authorities to abolish racial discrimination, so asserted ranking officials.

When several Negro convicts left their own table at dinner and sat down with white convicts, in line with the new policy, they (white convicts) hurled dishes and cutlery and the guards were forced to fire several shots in the air.

Governor Warren informed Richard A. McGee, director of the state department of corrections:

"I approve heartily of your program to remove discrimination that might arise from race, creed or color."

Said McGee: "We don't believe in Jim Crowism and have instructed our wardens to correct conditions to the best of their judgment."

At San Quentin, Warden Duffy averred that the non-segregation... will continue on a voluntary, not compulsory, basis.

It is agreed without much opposition that anyone seeking racial equality would not go so far as to become a San Quentin inmate to get it. But it does go to show that champions of racial tolerance can be found in the strangest places--fortunately. Governor Warren and the state prison officials are to be congratulated for taking action to outlaw race discrimination in the state's penal institutions. They are setting an example worthy of other institutions and organizations to emulate.

HEAVY NEWS of Nisei doughboys of the 442nd Infantry again fighting in the Italian hills and making important gains may mean that the Allied push up the Axis under-belly is geared for faster action. Or perhaps the US Fifth Army in Italy needs a good shot in the arm. Whatever

ACHIEVE TEXAS FARMING SUCCESS; NEED WORKERS

It has been over three years since their decision not to be caught in the evacuation net, and those years have been fruitful. Their decision to leave the Pacific coastal area found them leaving their California homes early in January, 1942. Their trip ended in the state of Texas where they

rented land and started producing food-products that America needed in its war efforts.

That is the story of Mrs. Shizu Kobayashi and her American-born sons and daughters, and sons-in-law, who are all in Texas now, and they love it. She and her husband, now deceased, came to this country almost 40 years ago and had staked all of her and her family's future in America.

Their neighbors like them for what they are--true Americans, who, like the Nisei soldiers, have fully proven their right by their friendly and eagerly helpful attitude, to be known and respected as 100 per cent American citizens.

Frank and Tommy Kobayashi, Robert Akashi and Frank Takahashi have jobs for at least six evacuees for year round work on their farms. They will pay \$150 a month, plus room and board.

Work through a season or two, learning how to farm this fertile vegetable land, they advise, and then rent available acres for themselves.

OHIO WANTS FAMILY GROUPS

Family groups wanted immediately to work on a number of Lorain county farms, 25 miles west of Cleveland, according to Mrs. Dorothy G. Barber, northern Ohio relocation officer.

Besides general farming, there is orchard and greenhouse work, and the jobs are year round. Most of those offers have housing now or will build, and the farms are all located within a few miles of each other.

Local relocation program office has further particulars, if interested.

MRS. ROOM FOR GIRL STUDENT

Kenshwa Hicks, 2733 Durant Ave., Berkeley, Calif., will furnish room, board, and a reasonable wage to a Nisei co-ed--upper-classman preferred, in exchange for light domestic help.

Mrs. Hicks, who lives alone near the campus, is an elderly woman seeking companionship as well as help with the household work. Her home is in the heart of the sorority district, and she has employed Nisei girls before evacuation.

been glad to provide full information to them, since we have been glad to have a neutral country fully informed as to the program carried on by the WRA. We expect to provide the same cooperation to the representatives of whatever nation may be selected by the Japanese Government for carrying on the work of the protecting power in the future.

"Until a new representative is selected, I personally and other members of the WRA staff will do everything we can to help both citizens and alien evacuees. The project directors of the centers will be glad, I am sure, to meet with representatives of the Japanese aliens at the centers and to discuss their problems with them.

Alien evacuees should bear in mind, in this connection, that they are entitled to the same protection of life and property by law enforcement officials as are other aliens. They are also legally entitled to sue in the Federal courts, provided that their suit does not give aid to the enemy."

Myer also pointed out that according to an Associated Press story from Madrid on March 25, the Spanish Government ceased representing the Japanese aliens as a result of "the execution of Spanish nationals and the destruction of Spanish property in the Philippines."

To help overcome housing shortage along the Coast, WRA will lend furnishings from surplus center stocks to non-profit hostels offering temporary shelter to 20 or more persons, Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, announced.

FRESHO--A 10-year-old boy who lives near the Mountain View cemetery admitted he was involved in

overturning tombstones on Japanese graves during the last few weeks.

Undersheriff John Ford said the boy at first told Deputy Sheriff Henry Schafer he was responsible for the vandalism. Later he denied he was involved and then said other boys were implicated.

Schafer said he questioned more than a dozen youngsters but the 10-year-old boy appeared to be the only one who was connected with the depredations.

The investigation is being continued to determine if youngsters other than those already questioned aided the 10-year-old boy.

Rev. A. A. Fratt and Mrs. Mary Worley, school principal, at Cressey paid a call soon after their arrival to talk over the 25-acre alfalfa farm.

The Kawasakis were accompanied home by Mrs. Kawasaki's mother, Mrs. Yayano Hishihara; a sister, Yoshiko, and two brothers, Harry and Jackie. In addition, Mr. and Mrs. I. Shibata and their five children came along to stay with them until they could move into their home nearby, which is now leased.

The Hishiharas found their home and farm in good condition. The farm is owned by Mrs. Kawasaki and her brother, S/Sgt. Joe Hishihara, who is fighting in the Philippines.

Sergeant Kawasaki, who is now back with the Army G-2 (Intelligence) in the Aleutians, said everyone has been very kind to our neighbors, the storekeepers, the school teachers.

It's a load off my mind to know that my family is okay and home at last, he added.

SAYS HE'S STAYING

In a letter to James E. Edminston, WRA relocation officer in San Jose, Calif., Joe Takeda, whose family was endangered in the recent attempt to burn and shoot up his home near San Jose, set at rest rumors which have been widely circulated throughout Santa Clara county and relocation centers.

Takeda said he and the family "are satisfied the attack was perpetrated by a few individual thugs and did not reflect the feelings of the people of Santa Clara county against his family or any other returning evacuees." Caucasian friends have been cordial, he reported, and both teachers and students have welcomed his two brothers and sister who are attending local schools.

Takeda asserted that the report that he and the family had left or about to leave "is entirely without foundations."

"We are here catching up the threads of our lives where we left off and it would take more than the incident reported to convince us that we are not wanted in this community," Takeda concluded.

SAFEGUARDING LIFE FIRST OBJECTIVE

Safeguarding life is the first objective of fire prevention and fire protection. Loss of life by fire in the United States is estimated at approximately 10,000 annually, and the number of fire injuries, excluding minor burns, is at least twice that number.

The fire prevention and protection problems have resolved themselves into the preventing of the outbreak of fire, preventing the serious spread of fire and providing for the prompt detecting and extinguishing of fire. All three phases must receive attention for the possibility of human or mechanical failure makes it unsafe to place sole reliance on any one method.

Cause of loss of life by fire should be carefully distinguished from cause of fire.

In addition to the general measures for safeguarding of property, there are certain special provisions which must be taken for safety of life. Most important being adequate exit facilities. If we will plan for use of avenues of escape in the event of emergency, and the avenues of escape are maintained readily available, then the danger of loss of life is largely eliminated.

We, the people of this center, are fire-conscious. This is well written in the records of the fire department. However, your diligent efforts to discover and correct fire hazards must not be relaxed. The relocation program reduces the population of the center, but increases the fire hazard and risk. Therefore, the fire department needs your cooperation at all times.

TO THE MODESTO BEE:

Editor--Sir: I have just read several Public Thinks published in your paper concerning the people of Japanese ancestry. Letters from people who call themselves good Americans and true Christians. They claim there are no loyal Japanese--that we were spies and that soldiers would be displeased to find us free like any other Americans and not behind barbed wire.

I should think people like Mrs. K.N. and Mrs. N. F. and anyone else who thinks like they do would be ashamed to show their ignorance by voicing such untrue statements.

The government, so far as I know, has made no report of any espionage by the people of Japanese ancestry.

People like Mrs. N. F. should know we are fighting a war against Nazism and imperialism both of which hate our democratic and Christian nation. Nazism and imperialism teach their people superiority and hatred toward other people. The United States teaches liberty, equality and justice for all, at least that is what I say when I pledge allegiance to the flag. What do you say Mrs. N. F.? She also should know we have our loved ones fighting besides hers. The 100th and the 442nd Infantry Battalions' heroic deeds are many.

To people like Mrs. K. S. who think we are being treated too well in camp and that we should be sent back to Japan--I would like to ask, have not you heard of the Constitution of the United States? Especially Article XIV?

What is our nation fighting for if not to erase social and national superiority among the peoples of the world?
