## WAR FUND DRIVE EXCEEDS QUOTA

The 1945 War Fund drive conducted in behalf of the Amache unit of the American Red Cross last week exceeded its quota of \$1,420 and went "over the top" by nearly \$300 through the voluntary contributions of center residents, announced Masao Itano, executive secretary, Thursday.

Without resorting to the usual door-to-door solicitation, a total of \$1,715.95 was accumulated, of which \$1,216.40 was contributed by the evacuees and \$499.25 was received in cash and pledges from the appointed personnel.

"I am glad the people of Amache did not fail us and in behalf of the American Red Cross, and those who will benefit by this successful drive, I wish to thank each contributor for his generous contribution," stated Itano.

The Amache Red Cross gratefully acknowledges monetary donations from Pvt. James Hirashiki, Mrs. Tamino Tanizawa, Mrs. Misako Chama, S. Kawamoto, and the Fujin Renmei.

## DON'T GIVE CREDENCE TO RUMORS

FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT, 31ST PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE ONLY CHIEF EXECUTIVE IN THE NATION'S HISTORY TO BE ELECTED TO THIRD AND FOURTH TERMS, DIED LAST THURSDAY AFTERNOON OF CEREBRAL HEMORRHAGE AT WARM SPRINGS, GA., WHERE HE HAD BEEN RESTING FOR 10 DAYS. DEATH CAME AT 3:35 P.M. (CENTRAL WAR TIME).

Funeral services will be held this afternoon in the East Room of the White House, and interment will be at Hyde Park tomorrow afternoon, according to Stephen Early, White House secretary.

The four Roosevelt sons, all of whom are in the service, were notified of the President's death by messages from Mrs. Roosevelt. She told them that the President had done his job to the end and that she knew he would want them to do so too.

Mr. Roosevelt apparently had been wearied by his long arduous trip to the Big Three conference in Yalta. Despite his assurance — continued on page 3 —

## THE NEW PRESIDENT

**T**HE DEATH last Thursday afternoon of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt came as a shocking news to the entire nation. Passing away quietly at Warm Springs, Ga., the President went to his reward, a martyr to his unswerving, ceaseless desire to attain total victory and bring lasting peace at the earliest possible moment to this war-torn world. It was said the rigors of his recent trip to the Big Three conference in Yalta had greatly affected his health, which led to his untimely death.

Now that Harry S. Truman has been sworn in as the 32nd President of the United States, the evacuees, as well as members of all minority groups, will be greatly concerned about President Truman's domestic policy--more than anything else. Not only for duration but more for the post-war rehabilitation period.

We know the country's war policy will remain unchanged. But the new President's policy at home will no doubt affect the protection of rights of the little people, the attitude of people on the practice of democratic principles, and the erasing of intolerance and discrimination because of race, color, or creed.

Let us hope that Mr. Truman will select the same tolerant and humanitarian path so ably followed by Mr. Roosevelt.

definite responsibility towards the evacuees and every effort will continue to be made to establish all relocations under conditions which have been previously investigated and found satisfactory. In line with this policy, all authentic available information will be promptly relayed to the evacuees.

It seems that there is a rumor mill in operation in the center in regards to the relocation set-up. If any doubt exists in the minds of those who are considering an early departure from Amache, the relocation office is the place to get authentic information.

Dr. Y. Ichihashi, at a recent center-wide meeting, gave as reasons for early relocation: better weather, excellent economic conditions, and generally improved attitude of outside acceptance. The truth of the first two is self-evident, and reports of evacuee relocation investigators should establish the veracity of the latter, Lindley added.

# Asks For Cooperation In Conserving Water

In order to maintain an adequate water supply for possible fire emergency, it may become necessary to interrupt the use of dwindling water supply, announced

William McF. Fuller, assistant project director in charge of operations, Thursday. However, if cooperation from residents in conserving water is received, such drastic action will not be necessary.

The critical water shortage was created by the failure of two sets of transformers in the water wells, and until replacements arrive, normal service cannot be expected, stated Fuller.

In the meantime, as a conservation measure, periodical curtailment of hot water has been scheduled and will remain in effect until a safe level of water is assured.

to Congress in a report of the meeting that he never felt better, now lines were noted on his face. He went to Warm Springs on March 20 for an extended rest.

Mr. Roosevelt had been President for 12 years, one month and nine days, taking office on March 4, 1933.

Vice-President Harry S. Truman was sworn in as the President of the United States by Chief Justice Earl Warren, three hours after the death of President Roosevelt. Mr. Truman became the seventh vice-president to succeed to the nation's highest office.

# FRIENDLY SCHOOL RECEPTION ASSURED MOVIES

Parents who are delaying their relocation plans, believing that it is unwise to move their children to new schools at this time, are assured by Dr. Lloyd A. Garrison, superintendent of education, that schools everywhere are ready to accept children of Japanese ancestry, and in nearly every case friendly treatment can be expected.

In fact, it would be extremely wise for many children to change schools at the earliest possible date, stated Dr. Garrison.

Those who prefer to wait to see whether or not the schools in the coast area would accept their children without difficulty may note the action taken by city, county, and state school officials to make sure that the schools wel-

come the boys and girls from the centers.

Some excerpts of letters from Amache families who have gone outside are quoted to indicate that local residents need have no fear of discrimination in schools.

**Sacramento:**

"My children have started school Monday and they are getting along fine."

**Atwater:**

"...we are having a squabble between two schools trying to claim the children's attendance...am very glad the two schools are not trying to kick us out but trying to gain our children."

**Chula Vista:**

"When the children started back to school the principal, teachers, and the other children were leaning backward to make things pleasant."

There were at least three times as many hecklers among about 250 persons attending as there was anti-Japanese. With them was Kenji Okuda, nisei graduate of Oberlin (Ohio) college and formerly of Amache, now residing at the UW campus.

A woman shipyard worker, Louise Gregg, stirred up a hornet's nest as she shouted that the question whether returning Japanese are dangerous has been settled because they have been passed and approved by government agents.

Less than 375 of the 18,656 persons of Japanese descent evacuated from Oregon and Washington have returned since the lifting of the exclusion orders, it was disclosed by the WRA.

MADERA, Calif.—A fire which destroyed a tool shed belonging to Fred T. Kumagai, is being investigated by the sheriff, district attorney, and state forestry fire department officials.

LOS ANGELES—Eighteen-year-old Kimiko Okanishi, former Poston resident, is believed to be the youngest evacuee to come all alone to Los Angeles, and solve her resettlement problem herself.

Miss Okanishi is at present attending Santa Monica junior college as a first-year student.

"My mother was worried about my coming alone," she said. "My experience is that how you are received is all in your own feeling."

SAN JOSE, Calif.—National Association for the Advancement of Colored People issued a statement commending Sheriff William J. Emig for his work on the Takeda case, offering co-operation in bringing the criminals to justice and helping to prevent further such outbreaks against the returnees.
