Allied headquarters reported April 12 that American troops had captured Carrara, four miles north of Massa, as the new Italian offensive paced by the Japanese Americans continued onward. The capture of Carrara, famous marble quarry center of 50,000 population, informed sources said, had "apparently been made by the 442nd Regiment." (Later reports confirmed the Carrara capture by the Japanese Americans.)

The Hazi hold of Massa and Carrara was throatoning tho Fifth Army's march northward near the Ligurian coast. The enemy's important naval base of La Spozia seems to be the apparent objective of the present Allied offensive.

The Germans obviously were putting up one of their "show piece" defenses all along the Italian front-a stubborn, bloody resistence for every crossroad - continued on page 3-

AAA COMMITTEE SETS "REALISTIC"

POLICYONNISE

The Fresno County Agricultural Adjustment Agency committee invoked what is termed a"realistic" policy recently concerning applications from returnees for benefit farm and soil conservation payments.

Chairman Frank Long said the committee will not make any payments until the Japanese furnish proof by affidavit he has repudiated dual citizenship and is not a citizen of any other

country.

Furthermore, disclosed Long, the Japanese will be required to furnish statements from District Attorney James M. Thuesen that to his (the Japanese's) farm is not nor never has been in question regarding alien property

Paul J. Fischer, WRA district relocation officer. would not comment on the matter, it was reported.

Long said he understands a group of returnees have hired an attorney to press their claims. About 20 AAA payment applications made by returnees are on file at present.

SETEPSERVICES AT ALL LEVELS

Evacuee property services, formerly directed jointly by the Administrative Management Division in Washington and the San Francisco field office, became the responsibility of the Relocation Division at all levels, e ffective April 10, according to National WRADirector Dillon . S. Myer.

Under a general realignment of basic functions, West Coast area relocation offices in Arizona, California, Oregon and Washington will report directly to the Relocation Division in Washington, DC., and will function as other area

offices.

TAKES EXCEPTION TO RACIST OBSERVATION

. MANDAN, N Dak .-- Lieut. Col. James M. Hanley, commander of the famed 2nd Battalion of the 442nd Infantry Regiment, took time recently on the Western Front to write a letter to his home town editor, Charles F. Pierce of the Mandan Daily Picneer.

Colonel Hanley, son of James M. Hanley Sr., of Mandan, took exception to a remark in Editor Pierce's column some weeks ago which road: "A squib in a paper makes the statement that there are some good Jap-Americans in this country but it didn't say where they were buried."

Colonel Hamley's letter, published in the Daily Pioneer on March 31, declared:

> 1C March 1945 Southern France

Dear Charlie:

Just received the Pioneer of Jan. 20 and roted the paragraph enclosed.

Yes, Charlie, I know where there are some GOOD Japanese Americans -- there are some 5000 of them in this unit. They are American soldiers -- and I know where some of them are buried. I wish I could show you some of them, Charlie. I remember one Japanese American. He was walking ahead of me in a forest in France. A German shell took the right side of his face off. I recall another boy, an 88 had been trying to get us for some time--finally got him. When they carried him out on a stretcher the bloody meat from the middle of the thighs down hung over the end of the stretcher and dragged in the dirt-the bone parts were gone.

I recall a sergeant -- a Japanese American if you will--who had his back blown in two--what was he doing? Thy, he was only lying on top of a white officer who had been wounded, to protect him from shell fragments during a barrage.

I recall one of my boys who stopped a Jerman counter-attack single handed. He fired all his BAR ammunition, picked a German rifle, emptied that-used a German Luger pistol he had taken from a prisoner.

I wish I could tell you the number of Japanese Americans who have died in this unit alone.

I wish I could tell you the number of wounded we have had -- the sightless eyes, the missing limbs, the broken minds.

I wish I could tell you the decorations we have

I wish the boys in the "Lost Battalion" could tell you what they think of Japanese Americans.

I wish that all the troops we have fought beside

could tell you what they know. The marvel is, Charlie, that these boys fight at

all -- they are good soldiers in spite of the type of

racial prejudice shown by your paragraph.

I know itmakes a good joke-but it is the kind of joke that prejudice thrives upon. It shows a lack of faith in the American ideal. Our system is supposed to make good Americans out of anyone--It cortainly has done it in the case of these boys.

You, the Hood River Legion post, Hearst and a few others make one wonder just what we are fighting for. I hope it isn't racial prejudice.

Come on over here, Charlie, I'll show you where "some good Jap-Americans" are buried.
