BRONZE STAR AWARDED TO SGT. KARATSU

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, Germany -- Gen. Jacob L. Devers, Commanding General, Sixth Army Group, has announced the awarding posthumously of the Bronze Star Medal to Sgt. James S. Karatsu for "heroic achievement on Oct. 20, 1944, in the vicinity of Bruyeres, France."

Sergeant Karatsu, son of Mr. and Mrs. Unosuke Karatsu, 10H-7E, Amache, Colo., was killed in "a subsequent action."

His citation reads in part: "While engaged in repulsing a strongly launched counter-attack against the battalion's flank, Sergeant Karatsu's section was subjected to highly destructive fire — continued on page 3 —

AT ABROAD: Coming back for a "repeat performance" in the Italian campaign after a scintillating action in France, including the "Lost Battalion" rescue at the cost of some 1700 casualties, the 442nd Infantry pitched right in and gave the stalemated Fifth Army a much-needed "shot in the arm." Result was a speed-up in the "spaghetti push" that had the bewildered Jerries running helter-skelter up the Italian hills. Their hitting power has been so devastating that the Axis Sally on Berlin radio has referred to them as US "secret weapon."

The men of the 442nd are by far one of the most popular bunch of US soldiers in the European Theater of Operation--not only among the liberated people, but also among other servicemen. They have achieved this enviable position through unswerving devotion to their duty; through exemplary conduct in performing hazardous tasks; through modesty of mannerism and mien.

AT HOME: Pfc. Fred and AT/5 Sherman Kishi are stationed at Ft. Snelling, Minn., doing their part in serving their country. Yet, because justice and fair play have not reached perfection in the hearts and minds of certain segment of our people who are racially inclined, these boys had to send a telegram to the WRA in Washington stating that "vandals have been terrorizing our parents and sisters at the family farm at Livingston," therefore, "request necessary steps be taken to protect their lives and property."

Two American soldiers have to appeal to government agency for protection for their parents and sisters--in their own country. Strange, isn't it? If willingness to offer their lives in the service of their country cannot assure their family of safe conduct, then what will? What more

Pvt. Larry M. Tanaka, formerly of Broderick, Calif., was called for active duty from this center in May, 1944, and obtained overseas training at Camp Shelby, Miss., prior to joining the 442nd in Italy. He was wounded previously in France in December, 1944.

DISTRIBUTION BRINGS IRE

SACRAMENTO--Attempted distribution of WRA literature calling for fair play for nisei produced a flurry of indignation in the State Assembly last week.

Numerous epithets were hurled across the chamber, mostly hostile to circulators of the literature.

In a resolution passed at the meeting the council condemned "those who are attempting to split the American people by arousing racial prejudices for their own partisan ends." The resolution called upon the public officials and people of Oregon to do everything in their power to cooperate with the War Department and assist in the readjustment of returning Japanese Americans to normal community life.

OHIO SAID TO BE GOOD AREA FOR ISSEI FARMING

CLEVELAND--"There are many factors which favor Ohio as a good region for issei farming," stated Tony Takashima, agricultural chemist for the State of Ohio.

There are 700,000 acres of idle, undeveloped tillable soil--much of which could be used for general farming, he continued. The industrial cities in Ohio and the middle west afford good markets for farm produce, and furthermore, he stated, the public sentiment in this area is good for issei relocation.

SACRAMENTO--A report on un-American activities in California submitted by the "Little Dies" committee headed by State Sen. Jack Torrey (Rep., Los Angeles) rapped the Japanese Americans as one of state's "menacing subversive forces."

In summarizing the investigation of outbreaks at Tule Lake center, the report said: "The relocation centers should be maintained for those evacuees who voluntarily elect to remain in them until the end of the war."

The committee recommended that all nisei who have demonstrated their loyalty "should be extended every opportunity of developing their Americanism and taking their respective places in communities of their choosing with all the rights guaranteed to all American citizens."

It finds "little or no basis" for prevalent charges that agricultural interests have fomented "anti-Jap" feeling for selfish economic reasons.

Much of the report was concerned with charges of Communist activity in California.

os, disclosed the officials yesterday.

Elementary school children may enter class A, while class B will be for junior and senior high school students. Class C is open to the general public, and it was stated that class A and B kites may also be entered in this classification.

Sixteen prizes will be awarded to qualified kites for altitude, design and sizes (largest and smallest).

All kites must remain aloft in the air 10 minutes before becoming eligible for each contest. Only contestants will be permitted to fly kites in the designated area for the contest, and practice flying will not be allowed.

THIRD INSTALLMENT

COMMENTS ON PROPOSALS

Third and final abridged installment on the WRA comments made on the 21 proposals recommended by the delegates at the All-Center Conference at Salt Lake City last February follows:

16. Negotiate... arrangements where under alien parents may operate or manage properties with powers of attorney issued by their children, particularly by sons in the Army.

WRA is investigating this matter and will provide further information at a later date.

ON PAROLEES

17. Arrange to secure outright releases for parolees who relocate.

Parolees who have relocated and desire to be released from parole restrictions should apply to the Enemy Alien Control Unit of the Department of Justice. Persons making such applications should submit any factual information they may have bearing upon their loyalty to the United States and their willingness to cooperate in the war effort.

WRA will, upon request of an individual parolee, submit any information it may have regarding his character and loyalty to the Justice Department.

18. Obtain the establishment of some avenue of governmental indemnities for relocatees who may become victims of anti-Japanese violence in terms of personal injuries or property damage.

Federal legislation is required to provide governmental indemnities for relocatees who may become victims of anti-Japanese violence. It is extremely doubtful that Congress would give favorable consideration to the proposal in view of the fact that no similar special consideration has been given to other persons or groups.

If evacuees should suffer any damage or injury, they have the same rights as any other person to seek compensation in the courts from the person causing the loss. WRA will assist evacuees upon request in obtaining insurance for themselves

and for their property to cover any risks of damage that they think might occur after relocation. WRA is confident coverage can be obtained.

19. Arrange for government compensation against losses to evacuee property by fire, theft, etc., while in government or private storage, or while in transit.

WRA is not authorized by Congress to pay claims against losses of evacuee property. However, where property has been lost, destroyed or damaged as a result of negligence of government employees, claims can be filed against the government up to \$1000 under the Small Claims Act of 1922.

Evacuee property officers and project attorneys at relocation centers can give evacuees complete information with respect to filing claims under this law. Where property has been damaged while in transit, claims can and should be filed against the transportation company. Most such claims would likely be paid by the carriers involved.

20. Arrange to provide nisei students with adequate protection in case of need, and opportunities equal to those enjoyed by Caucasian students.

FULLY ACCREDITED

Since all center schools systems (except Tule Lake) are fully accredited, WRA does not anticipate any difficulty concerning credits of relocating students entering outside public schools. In West Coast area special efforts have been made to see that the transition of evacuee students is a smooth and satisfactory one, and the superintendents of public instruction in all three of the Pacific coast states have given assurance to do anything possible to assist in satisfactory adjustment of the returning evacuee students.

REFUSE NISEI REINSTATEMENT

LOS ANGELES--Dr. Masako Kusayanagi's request for immediate reinstatement to her proevacuation position as a physician at Los Angeles General hospital has been denied by County Charities Superintendent Art Will.

The county board of supervisors had previously refused to reinstate Dr. Kusayanagi on the contention that her leave of absence was given for a specified time--duration of war. Since the leave may be terminated by mutual agreement, the board turned the matter over to two interested departments--County Department of Charities and County Civil Service Commission--for final decision.

SAYS NEW YORK OK FOR ISSEI

NEW YORK--Chuguro Aoki, issei relocatee who recently opened his busy tailoring and dry cleaning shop here in a fashionable section near Fifth and Park avenues, declared that "any issei could open a business in this city."

"This city," he continued, "has room for more issei tailors, cleaners, and laundry men, and there is no need to do cheap, hard work here, either. My business is better than the one I had to sell in San Francisco when the evacuation came."

The Aokis are formerly of San Francisco, where they operated a cleaning and dyeing establishment, prior to evacuation.
