

TENDERS RESIGNATION

STILL OPPOSES COAST RETURN OF JAPANESE

SACRAMENTO--Standing pat on its previous stand, a senate interim committee on Japanese resettlement placed a report before the senate vigorously opposing the return of Japanese to California before the end of the war.

The committee on its opposition to the Japanese return stated:

"This committee further reiterates and finds that no Japanese evacuee should be permitted to return to California during the war; that the policy and plan stated by the National War Relocation Director, Dillon Myer, of removing these evacuees from the camps throughout the nation and distributing them in California or the coastal area should not be countenanced."

Private Adachi won the award for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations from 19 Oct. to 8 Nov. 1944 in the vicinity of Bruyeres and La Hausserie, France."

THE 346 NUMBER

During the month of April, 346 indefinite leaves were issued, according to Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor. Of this number, only 80 were for West Coast returnees.

The total number of persons who have relocated from this center now stands at 4,461, added Vecchio.

FORMER AMACHE RESIDENT GLAD "TO BE HOME"

Rokutaro Nakamura, former Amache resident (8E-3A), and his oldest son, Shigeo, returned to their preevacuation home at Woodland, Calif., last week.

"I am glad to be home again," he told Woodland residents, "and I want to do what is right."

Nakamura's two other sons, Sgt. Toshio and Cpl. Yoshio, former Woodland Sea Scouts, are fighting in the European Theater of Operations with the US Army. Corporal Yoshio Nakamura was reported wounded in action this week.

"I am proud of my boys and the fighting they are doing for the United States," said Nakamura.

In May, 1942, the Nakamuras were evacuated along with nearly 1000 other Yolo county Japanese.

Pvt. George Oki, native of Yuba City, Calif., entered the Army via draft on April 21, 1944, from this center and received his basic training at Camp Shelby, Miss., before going overseas to join the 442nd Infantry.

Pvt. Hachiro Togashi, erstwhile resident of Modesto, Calif., was inducted from this center in April, 1944, and went through his overseas training at Camp Blanding, Fla., prior to joining the 442nd Infantry as a replacement. His brother, Pfc. Naoye, was wounded twice in France.

W-E DAY BRINGS JOY

HOPE FOR EARLY RETURN

Official announcement yesterday of the V-E Day, which brought all hostilities, except few isolated minor skirmishes, to a close

in Europe, was a source of much rejoicing among the center residents.

Reaction of the nisei servicemen, especially overseas veterans, was one of deep gratitude.

A high school student, Ayako Kawamoto, whose brother, Pvt. Haruo, was killed in action on April 9, and who has two other brothers in the service, said:

"I am glad the war is over in Europe, and I hope to have my brothers back."

Miss Rosie Matsuoka, whose brother, Pfc. Yoshio, is a prisoner of war, commented:

"I am glad that V-E Day has finally come and I hope for my brother's, as well as other nisei boys', early return."

But the most surprising statement came from an unidentified elementary school youngster who uttered:

"Now, we gotta beat Japan."

SPECIAL GAS ALLOTMENT

Prospective relocators desiring gas rations for their automobiles may secure an allotment by applying for special mileage rations at the relocation office, revealed Walter J. Knodel, relocation program officer, last week.

Gasoline can be obtained to facilitate relocation to any part of the United States, if the relocatee on the project owns the car.

Supplement rations, however, cannot be recommended by the relocation office to those (outsiders) who bring their cars into the center to relocate another family. In such cases, applications must be made at their respective local ration board, added Knodel.

OUTLINES MEASURES ON EVACUEE HOUSING

Extraordinary measures to assist relocatees in finding housing have been outlined by H. Rex Lee, relocation division chief in Washington, in instruc-

tions sent to all field relocation offices.

In most large WRA offices a staff member will be assigned the specific responsibility of organizing community efforts toward providing housing for relocatees.

Other principal steps to be taken include: establishment of a clearing house for all available housing information; improving provisions for temporary housing accommodations, and closer examination of local housing and FHA privately financed building programs.

HST SIGNS BILL TO TRANSFER WRA FUNDS

A deficiency bill authorizing the transfer of an additional \$175,000 from WRA funds to the Resettlement Assistance Program was signed recently by President Harry S. Truman.

Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, said accelerated relocation exhausted the \$50,000 originally set aside to provide outside assistance during the fiscal year of 1945.

This diverted fund will be available through June 30, 1945, to relocatees in greatest need.

WRITER TOURS MIDDLE WEST

CLEVELAND--Sasabune Sasaki, noted writer and resident of Amache, Colo., stopped off here on a personal observation tour of the Middle West to gather information for a series of articles on relocation.

"Issei are making a success of relocation all over the Middle West. Public feeling is very favorable and I believe now is the best time to...resettle while jobs are plentiful," said Sasaki.

He is the author of two books, "American Life" and "Biography of Poet Tanaka."

Will Aid EXCLUDEES, SAYS ACLU

TO THE PIONEER:

Editor--It has become painfully evident that the military authorities on the West Coast have issued individual exclusion orders against a great many American citizens of Japanese ancestry who are by no reasonable test disloyal.

The American Civil Liberties Union, as an organization interested in the protection of civil rights, is prepared upon request of those persons interested to aid any citizens of Japanese ancestry ordered excluded who have not applied for expatriation or repatriation to Japan and who did not give a negative answer to questions 27 and 28 in the questionnaire filled out by all evacuees. We would also consider as suitable court cases persons who did not answer these questions at all, or who later changed their answer from negative to affirmative. In addition, we understand there are some persons resident in other parts of the United States who have been ordered excluded from the West Coast though they never resided there. Such persons would appear suitable also for court tests where no application for expatriation or repatriation has been made and where no clear evidence of disloyalty is found.

These citizens of Japanese ancestry who have further inquiries may address communications to the American Civil Liberties Union at 170 Fifth Avenue, New York City 10, New York.
