FIELD DAY PROGRAM SET; PRIZES GALORE

Completion of final arrangements for tomorrow's gigantic Field Day festivities, which will probably be the last center-wide celebration in the project, was announced by the officials yesterday.

The day's events will commence promptly at 9:30 a.m., and is scheduled to continue to 6 o'clock.

A varied program of general interest, including a colorful masquerade parade, kite flying contest, and an assortment of races and contests, has been slated. Prizes galore have been generously donated, thus assuring each winning and placing individual of an award.

The Boy Scout troop 179 drum and bugle corps will offer tuneful renditions of well known marches, in addition to recorded music.

Refreshing soft drinks will be prepared by each block, while children are promised pappicles, the officials disclosed. Families are urged to bring their lunches and make an enjoyable picnic out of the Field Day tomorrow.

APRIL ONLY NO DEATH MONTH

Since the inception of the local project, last month (April) was the only month in which no death was recorded here, according to Joseph Buckley, statistician.

There have been 30 deaths, last of which was on March 30. Ol' Doc Stork rang up 385 births to date.

ASSIGNS ACTING REPORTS OFFICER

Russell Bankson of the Washington WRA reports division will arrive here Thursday to take charge of the local reports section as acting reports officer, announced James G. Lindley, project director, Wednesday.

He will remain until a new reports officer is secured to replace Dale Cooley, whose resignation due to business reasons was disclosed last Monday.

Bankson was formerly a reports officer at Topaz (Utah) relocation center.

TO ACCEPT NEW POSITION

Willis J. Hanson will relinquish his post here as assistant relocation program officer and assistant coordinator and leave for Denver Monday to become Veterans' Vocational counselor with US Civil Service commission.

Hanson, long popular with both the evacuees and the appointed personnel, arrived in Amache as a leave officer in August, 1942. He is one of the pioneers of the project.

Hanson will leave his wife and two sons here in the center until school is dismissed in June.

TO UNBLOCK ACCOUNTS OF CLEARED EVACUEES

The Treasury Department will unblock all but a limited number of accounts of evacuees on the Army clear list to aid WRA relocation and liquidation program. Forms to request unblocking orders will be forwarded to the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco through the project director. The bank will determine whether the statements on the individual forms are correct.

Evacuees in the following categories are not eligible to apply for unblocking orders: 1) persons not on the Army clear list, 2) those who have been issued specific blocking orders, 3) evacuees who have represented or acted as agents for any person outside the continental United States on or since July 26, 1941, and 4) persons who now hold funds belonging to blocked nationals.

Persons and business enterprises not eligible may, however, apply for re-

consideration of their cases by filing Form TFU-1 with the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco.

Former internees whose accounts remain blocked may upon application withdraw up to \$200 a month for living expenses, while those whose accounts are unblocked may withdraw as much as \$500 a month. Any blocked person or enterprise may apply for a

ITALY CONQUEST COSTLY 109,000 US CASUALTIES

WASHINGTON--The United States' share of the price paid for the Italian conquest was more than 109,000 combat casualties, revealed Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson recently.

The US Fifth Army had suffered 109,163 casualties from the start of the Italian campaign to April 28, Stimson informed his press conference.

The Fifth's losses were as follows: 21,577 killed,

77,248 wounded and 10,338 missing.

Total US casualties in all theaters approached within less than 50,000 of an even 1,000,000. The over-all figure was 950,472, of which 846,089 were Army losses. However, 275,467 of the Army wounded have returned to duty. Of the soldiers taken prisoner, 2,974 have been listed as exchanged or returned to US military control.

GI CHALLENGE

LIFE OF A PERSON who expresses his opinion publicly in writing isn't exactly rosy. In fact, oftentimes, it's an extremely hazardous avocation.

But even a columnist's dark clouds have a silver lining.

Other day I received a letter from anisei soldier convalescing at an army general hospital at Hines, Ill. Although he is an Amachean, I've never met the fellow personally, which seems to be my loss, but he wrote as if we were old cronies. What's more, he voted himself in as one of the few who agreed with the subject matters carried in this column.

He has been chewing on quite a chunk of this war ever since he became a casualty in France and had time to think things over. He certainly has no use for race-baiters and self-interested politicians--particularly those along the Coast.

He says, and I quote: We, nisei must show these race-baiters of America what 'stuff' nisei are made of. Are we going to 'take it' nonchalantly and do nothing about it? Unquote.

Here is a question that should perk us up and do a little cogitating--if we expect our future to be brighter. And while most of us dilly-dally, this fellow has his sight all set. He says:

"Well, Roy, I for one am not going to let a pack of rats feed me any of their contaminated, unsond talk of 'A Jap's a Jap, wherever you find him,' 'Kick the dirty Japs out of California,' etc., and gulp it down!"

For us who have not had the grim experience of war, his words seem harsh, but they make sense. And, guys and gals, sense is something we can use plenty of.

Furthermore, this fellow shoots us civies a challenge that just can't be brushed aside:

'over there' can, and **MUST**, fight just as fiercely, just as courageously as the boys of the...100th and the 442nd. It can be done in school, at work, at play--anywhere, by proving, by your deeds, to the tolerant people of America that we are worthy of her, America. It will, no doubt, be hard to gulp prejudice and at the same time give out the best that is in you generously, but it's got to be done sometime, and now's the time just as good as any. You know, they say the harder you fight for something, the dearer it will be and you will covet it more. **LET'S ALL GIVE, AND GIVE ALL WE GOT!!"**

That is a potent, timely challenge. The boys who have been "over there" know what the "score" is and they are in no mood to let a bunch of race-baiting economic "super-patriots" mulct them out of an equal chance to earn a decent living--wherever they choose. They rightfully feel that that is something they have earned, but they also know it will not come easy.

Therefore, we must "fight" at home with them if we are to make the principles of democracy work for persons of Japanese ancestry. We owe it to "our buddies" overseas who lie beneath the sod with wooden crosses over them--that they shall not have died in vain. We must realize that we cannot live in peace and content, unless we keep faith with those who died so that we may live--as American citizens.

AIDS EVICTION PROCEDURE

Any evacuee who wishes to reoccupy his rented property should consult the project attorney's office at once to obtain aid in drawing up proper eviction notices, stated Mrs. Mima R. Pollitt, acting project attorney. She will remain here during the rest of this month.

A letter must also be sent to the OPA when tenants are asked to leave. Even if the tenant is willing to leave, he may need a notice to help him get another place, she continued.

Quick action should be taken, added Mrs. Pollitt, because it sometimes takes three or four months before a house can be vacated.

ANNOUNCE EXTENSION OF "SURVIVING SON" POLICY

In a joint extension of their "sole surviving son" policy, the War and Navy Departments have announced that they will place in non-hazardous duty other service members of families

in which two or more persons have died in line of duty or are reported missing in action or prisoners of war.

However, no action to reassign surviving members will be taken unless requested by serviceman involved or by a member of his immediate family, it was stated.

Requests involving Army personnel should be mailed to the Adjutant General, Washington, D.C. Cases previously submitted and denied should be resubmitted for consideration under the now, broader policy, the joint statement advised.

The person making application should furnish the name and relationship of the writer to all members of the family. For the members in the armed forces, grade, serial number, organization and station assignment should also be included. Full information as to death, capture or missing status of family members should be given in the request.

USO TO HAVE BILLIARD TABLE

Local USO of the Blue Star Service club will place a pocket billiard table at the 119 servicemen's center soon, announced Mrs. Molly Wada, executive secretary.

The facilities of the center is at the disposal of all visiting service men and women, discharged veterans and onlisted reserve corps members, added Mrs. Wada.

—continued from page 1— special license which will permit sufficiently free use of funds to conduct business.

Evacuees who wish further information or wish to secure necessary application forms should contact the project attorney or the relocation program officer. Relocates may communicate with the director of the project from which they relocated.

LIMIT SERVICE TO EVACUEES

The local staff canteen, which is a private enterprise operated by the appointed personnel, extends service privileges to evacuees working in the administration area only, stated Joseph Donnegan, Monday. Hours will be limited--8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

Evacuees are asked to comply with this regulation.

HITS "LITTLE HITLER" RACE INTOLERANTS

CHICAGO--"Small but well organized economically interested groups of little Hitlers" were profiting from a commercialized campaign aimed at 2000 returnees, declared H. Rex Lee, Washington WRA director of relocation, in a recent address before the City club. He added that the campaign was "founded on race prejudice and masked in terms of patriotism."

Lee asserted the WRA was "not fighting the thoughtless and deluded people who join the anti-Jap" organizations.

"Our fight is against the men who keep the ledgers--the race baiters who count their success in dollars and cents. Too many merchants have anti-Japanese signs in their windows because they are afraid to take them out.

"Too many people have signed anti-Japanese resolutions because they were afraid not to 'play ball,'" averred Lee.

Relocates are paying exorbitant prices for leases, deeds and businesses, because they are not familiar with wartime values and are too anxious to go into business.

In order to offset this condition to some extent, the Chicago office has prepared two booklets relative to business opportunities.

It also has a business and a legal consultants on its staff to advise prospective buyers before they make a purchase.

A suggestion is made to relocatees arriving in Chicago to consult these reliable staff members before investing money or purchasing property.
