

TO SPEED UP RELOCATION OF PAROLEES

Changes of procedure designed to speed up the relocation of paroled enemy aliens have been made by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

One of the principal features of the streamlined procedure will be the approval of travel applications as promptly as possible after requests have been made. Parolee's application will be handled on an individual basis.

Each paroled alien will be responsible for following completely the terms of the INS instructions issued in his case.

To avoid delay, a temporary sponsor who is a public official, but not an INS member, may be designated at the parolee's relocation destination.

CHARTERS PULLMAN CAR TO AID SPECIAL CASES

In order to facilitate the relocation of "special case" evacuees to the West Coast, a Pullman car will be chartered exclusively for returnees to leave here on June 25 for various California cities, announced Lewis Fanslan, relocation advisor, Monday.

Evacuees in the following categories are eligible for Pullman reservation:

1. Mothers with infants under 18 months.
2. Women who are pregnant six months or more.
3. Men and women 65 years of age or over.
4. Persons who are ill, regardless of age.

Evacuees who are eligible for Pullman service and planning to return to California during next month are urged to take advantage of this special car. Individual Pullman

BRIDGES GUARANTEES "FULL PROTECTION"

SAN FRANCISCO--A "full protection" was guaranteed nisei CIO warehousemen at Stockton by CIO leader Harry Bridges last Friday against any possible discrimination by fellow workers, and promised official punishment to members violating the union's fair play policy.

If the union insists on inclusion of returned Japanese Americans, it would "only create trouble and friction," asserted two unidentified warehousemen at Stockton.

However, refusal to work with nisei "constitutes a violation of our policies and union constitution," warned Bridges.

REVERSE POLICY

STOCKTON--Three hundred members of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union (CIO) last week voted to reverse a "no discriminatory" policy adopted several weeks ago and refuse to work with returning nisei.

Dick Lyndon, president of San Francisco Local 6, failed in an effort to persuade the members from taking this action.

Elvin M. Balatti, union business agent, disclosed that he had been forced to remove three nisei from a warehouse to which they had been assigned, in order to prevent a work stoppage.

"The union will not retreat in any way or relax for a moment in its determination to meet and deal with an individual within the union or local who seeks to project and support Hitler-like policies.

"Japanese Americans, particularly veterans of the armed forces, will be welcomed back and helped to find jobs by our union and they will receive full protection and support of the ILWU."

The nisei, declared Bridges, "enjoy the respect and support of the overwhelming majority of our union members and local and national officers."

ARE UNDESIRABLE AS RESIDENTS

KAMLOOPS, B.C.--Persons of Japanese ancestry should "never again be permitted to reside in British Columbia," declared Ian MacKenzie, minister of veterans' affairs, last week.

NISEI GIRL THREATENED

The WRA disclosed that it was prepared to turn over to law enforcement officials the names of five men who have threatened Miss Mary Masuda, nisei girl, with bodily harm unless she moves out of Talbert (Orange county), Calif.

Miss Masuda, who has four brothers with Army service records, lives with a Caucasian family named Trudeauaux.

Her four brothers are: Yazu, killed at Cassino; Takashi, wounded while with the 442nd Infantry in the Vosges mountains; Masao, now en route home on furlough, and Mits, who has received a medical discharge.

Their parents reside at Gila River (Ariz.) relocation center.

DETERIORATION

MOST OF US have allowed our better-than-passable proevacuation manners and social conduct to deteriorate to a point where they have become tarnished--and embarrassing. We have disowned our better selves and put on a low-class rugged outer shell to hide our inferiority complex.

We have managed, unfortunately, to get by in a relocation center because our evaluation of ourselves as cultured, well mannered people has dropped to a sub-standard level.

Since entering the barbed-wire enclosures, we had no way of measuring the degree of our downward slide. We had no standard to live up to: It reached a point where good manners and being nice didn't pay proper dividend. To get anything, and anyplace, you had to be a rugged individualist--and you couldn't be that by being a Sir Walter Raleigh.

But on the outside where you must get along with people on a give and take basis--life will be different. You must give the other fellow the same consideration you expect to receive from him. It won't be just take and take without giving--as is customary in a relocation center.

In addition to your head and hands, you must have the right stuff in your heart to get anything worthwhile. Your head guides your hands in doing your work and earning a living, but it's your heart that guides you along the path of happiness.

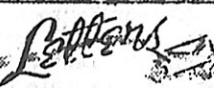
I listened attentively for an hour, hoping to hear somebody I knew-but no 442nd. No doubt others were just as disappointed

20 RETURNEES REGISTER FOR SPECIAL COACH

Approximately 20 West Coast returnees bound for the Sacramento area have registered to board the special coach, which is scheduled to leave here between June 1 and 8, disclosed Mario Vecchio, relocation advisor, Monday. Actual departure date will be announced later.

As there are still accommodations available on this car, evacuees returning to any point in California may obtain reservations, if immediate notice is given to the relocation office, added Vecchio.

Another coach--the Los Angeles special--has been tentatively slated to leave here on Monday, June 18.

RAPID SUCCESS DUE TO SMALL TOWN RELOCATION

Dr. Joe Abe, former Amachean, made a formal announcement of the opening of his office in Helper, Utah, on July 30, 1944. In six months he was able to establish a "very gratifying business," whereas, it took him two years in California--prior to evacuation.

Dr. Abe attributed this rapid success to the fact that he chose to establish himself in a small town. In addition, he said the fine letter of introduction written by the project director, chief medical officer, and the relocation supervisor of his area had been very helpful. A government agency letterhead does carry weight and influence, the doctor added.

Indicative of the attitude toward nisei in the Midwest, once the ice is broken, is the following notice in the classified ad section of the Omaha (Nebr.) Evening World-Herald, April 24 issue, under domestic help wanted:

"MAID, Japanese American Preferred, house work. Stay on place, private room, \$28.50 per week. Write Box 6840, World-Herald."

Some employers who have never known nisei are hesitant to employ them at first, but once they have employed them, they are almost always eager to employ others, stated Miss Prudence Ross, acting supervisor of the North Central area.

Nisei should relocate now while jobs and business opportunities are still open and sentiment is good, added Miss Ross. In this way they will not suffer greatly during the temporary dislocation of workers following the cessation of war contracts.

use my reserve funds to establish a good credit rating, but now I am able to take advantage of the credit privileges so willingly extended to me. A small community has an advantage in that it is easier to become well acquainted with your fellow business men, and to gain their good will and cooperation.

I feel that any one with an earnest desire to go into some community as a businessman can readily do so, asserted Dr. Abe. However, I believe it is wise to be sufficiently fortified financially "to ride out the getting-started period."

For those without sufficient funds, a salaried job is better to start with, preferably in a community in which he plans to establish his own business.

"It is true that places like Chicago and New York present many opportunities but... the small town is not to be overlooked," concluded Dr. Abe.

RELOCATEE LETTERS URGE EARLY RESETTLEMENT

Project Director James G. Lindley last week received two letters from former Anacheans who have relocated in opposite directions. One from California and the other from Minnesota--both expressing fine reception received.

They follow:

Lake Minnetonka, Minn.
May 15, 1945

Dear Mr. Lindley:

I should have written to you sooner, but waited until I was a little better acquainted around here and could tell of things that might interest you.

My wife and I started to work for Mr. W.R. Stephens the first of this month. I am quite pleased about our job. We are provided with two living quarters, one by Lake Minnetonka, the other on a farm by the Mississippi river. I have a car for my own use.

My boss seems to like us fine, and the people around here are very kind and friendly.

The WRA office in Minneapolis is doing a fine job and is really helpful to the relocatees in this area. It has solicited many good jobs for issei and nisei. At present it is in a rather embarrassing position because not enough evacuees are coming here to fill the requests.

Jobs are plentiful and it seems better to select the job after arrival here. One doesn't have to worry about employment, if he's willing to work.

The housing shortage is a headache here, too, but occasionally apartments are available.

I like it here so much that I doubt if I will ever want to go back to California.

Dear Mr. Lindley:

We arrived here May 3 and...getting along very nicely. It was a long trip, but a pleasant one because everyone was nice to us on the train.

We have found the people

here to be friendly and good to us, especially our old friends who are glad to see us back.

Our lawyer...told us that the American Legion of Napa said it was okay for us to return and they didn't have any objections...we were very glad to hear that. I say this because there have been places where the Legion has objected to the returning of Japanese and have been doing all they can to keep them from returning.

We have found most of our things in good condition, even though we have been away for three years. I think that we were very lucky because so many people have had their things stolen. We are all very satisfied with the condition of our place.

My brothers have started school and like it very much. They both have teachers who are very nice and understanding; and have made many friends.

I imagine there will be many families relocating as soon as school is out. I certainly hope so, because it's so much nicer for the children, as well as the adults, to be on the outside living a normal life again.
