CHARGE WRA IS MAKING IMPROPER USE OF FUNDS

WASHINGTON--Three California congressmen last week presented statements to a house appropriations subcommittee opposing use of funds by the WRA to circulate "propaganda favoring the Japanese people."

"Tax funds should not be used to propagandize for any racial group," said Rep. Clair Engle (D.), one of the complaining trio. "WRA was never set up for the purpose of convincing the American people that the Japanese are a superior or better race, but that seems to be their concept of their mission."

FIRST SHOOTING ARREST MADE

WASHINGTON--Harold L. Ickes, Secretary of the Interior, disclosed last Saturday the first arrest for attempted shooting of nisei on the West Coast. Twenty attempted shootings have been reported since last June 2.

The WRA has informed him, stated Ickes, that Ernest Multanen of Parlier, Calif., was arrested last Friday. Multanen had admitted firing a shotgun at the home of Charles K. Ayasaki at Red-ley, Calif., May 20, said Ickes.

ANTI-NISEI ACTION BRINGS SUSPENSION

STOCKTON--Local unit of the International Longshoremen and Warehousemen's Union (CIO) Local 6 was placed under indefinite suspension from the parent body by Richard Lynden, president of the local, last week at a closed membership meeting here.

PREINDUCTEES TO DINE AT 9E

Local selectees departing for their preinduction physical examination at Denver this Friday morning will dine at 9E mess hall, 5 o'clock, announced Harlow H. Tomlinson, chief of internal security, yesterday.

Approximately 475 warehousemen attending the meeting were advised that they would be suspended from the union if they do not sign a pledge stating they will work with returning Japanese Americans.

Harry Bridges, union's international president, spoke to the members present, after which Lynden read the local's edict.

Officers of the Stockton unit were ousted and administration of its affairs was taken over by the San Francisco officers of the union.

The union's action was based on alleged defiance of the international union's policy against racial discrimination. The dispute arose from an asserted vote taken by a majority of members at a meeting on May 14, not to work alongside Japanese in local plants. This action led to the release of three nisei assigned to one of the local warehouses.

The bolting members took this position: "Japanese never worked in Stockton warehouses before the war nor had any Japanese ever belonged to a CIO union here."

750 RETURNEES IN FRESNO AREA

FRESNO--The return of 750 evacuated Japanese to Kern, Tulare, Kings, Fresno and Madera counties was disclosed by the San Joaquin valley WRA officials last week.

The figures are those of C. F. Lane, manager of the Fresno WRA office, and Paul J. Fischer of the Visalia WRA office.

Fischer said about 90 per cent of the returnees are property owners.

CHARGE BANK LIQUIDATION PROCEDURE

Plans for the liquidation of the Yokohama Specie Bank of San Francisco and Los Angeles have been changed, disclosed Mrs. Mima R. Pollitt, acting project attorney, yesterday.

William Murphy, liquidator of the California State Banking department, has informed Mrs. Pollitt that all depositors and claimants on the bank's books will be mailed personally a claim form to fill out. The forms will be sent out sometime after June 1, 1945, which should be filled out and returned as directed on the form.

Claim forms may be requested at the project attorney's office by any person who does not receive one from the bank's liquidator, stated Mrs. Pollitt.

MEMORIAL DAY

MEMORIAL DAY, 1945, carries a meaningful significance.

Today is the first Memorial Day in which we, Americans of Japanese ancestry, can really claim an equal share with Americans of other ancestries in revering the memory of our country's war dead. And it is to their lasting credit and to our treasured heritage that each and every one of them entered Valhalla a hero.

Today is a good day for us to take inventory and see what we at home have done to deserve this heritage. It isn't a pleasant picture.

While Nisei GI's were fighting across the sea, we in relocation centers have watched the months and the years pass by--without adding much on the credit side of the ledger. We've become arrogant, if not crude, in our manners. We've changed, if not lost, our sense of values. We've learned little, if nothing, on how to get along with people.

And we've done practically nothing towards making our future brighter. Worst of all, we've failed to prepare ourselves to properly face the outside life--vastly different from what ours have been for nearly three years--which we must eventually meet. Through that failure some of us may make evacuation rehabilitation more difficult.

So much for us in centers.

JUST CLOSE YOUR EYES and take yourself to a West Coast state-house. A legislator at a committee meeting discussing an anti-Japanese legislation is vocally backing the measure with his anti-Japanese tirade. When he gets through, he is confronted by a nisei veteran recently recently from action in the European theater. This Japanese American GI stands up to say with intense feeling: I went overseas to fight this sort of fascism and here I come home and find you preaching it.

Editor The Auburn Journal Auburn, Calif. Dear Sir:

The recent decision of your local court acquitting confessed arsonists appears to us to be almost fantastic. Editorials in most of the newspapers lead one to believe that the facts we have found so unbelievable are substantially correct. We find it exceedingly hard to believe that any group of Americans would be capable of such miscarriage of justice.

It has been our firm belief that the present

Thus, this legislator is justly castigated. He is put in his place.

But what of us also at home who unknowingly and perhaps unthinkingly but passively assist these fascist-like forces by not even lifting a finger in protest? Our inaction against such practices at home is second only to preaching it. We shall fail in our duty as good citizens, and it will certainly be to our own detriment, if we do not take means to "correct" this attack on democratic principles.

And, in addition, we shall live to see history repeat itself--that of our nisei heroes, like the American doughboys of World War I, having died in vain to keep democracy at its proper level.

Lest we fall heir to such misfortune, let us pledge to make this Memorial Day a starting point to keep alive the heritage left us by the Yamamotos, Saitos, Nakamuras, and score of others.

World War was occasioned by certain minority groups in other parts of the world allowing their personal and prejudiced feelings to be vented on other less fortunate groups. It has also been our belief that one of the prime reasons for our engaging in the war was to prevent the spread of such social conditions which make similar actions possible.

As private citizens who, to some extent, take their social obligations seriously we wish to protest as vigorously as possible the decision of your court of a crime against a fellow American who happens to be of Japanese descent. As a matter of simple justice the question of Mr. Doi's ancestry should not enter the picture.

3 Workers Are Wanted

Three single men or a family with three workers are wanted by A. M. Flukey of Grand Junction, Colo., for his farm. He offers year-round work with good pay.

TIMBER AND SAWMILL WORK STILL OPEN

Positions in the Big Spruce logging operations near Glenwood Springs (Colo.) region for timber work are still open, according to information received by the local relocation office from James Yanari, Denver labor contractor.

Yanari said he could still hire 30 men for falling, limbing and bucking, and about 40 for skidding, decking and sawmill work. Applications will be accepted until July 1, he added.

In the logging operations the workers will be paid a wage bracket developed by the War Labor Board, which is as follows: \$1.25 a thousand for falling; 90 cents for bucking, and 60 cents for limbing--total of \$2.75.

Single men are preferred, but married men may bring their families since there is adequate housing in clean CCC type barracks. Food will be prepared by a skilled company paid cook at a cost of about 50 cents a meal.
