

WINS SILVER STAR, COMMISSION IS DECORATED FOR ACTION IN NORTH FRANCE

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy--Shigeo Teraji, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donsuke Henry Teraji, 6G-11F Amache, Colo., and formerly of Hollywood, Calif., recently received a battlefield commission and was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action while serving with the 442nd Combat Team.

The presentation of the Silver Star was made by Lieut. Gen. Lucian K. Truscott Jr., Fifth Army Commander, at a ceremony at Novi, Italy.

Teraji was decorated for an action in Northern France on Oct. 28, 1944, when the 442nd was in the forward ranks of the Seventh Army's drive for the approaches to Germany.

The Silver Star citation read in part:

"When the communication line suffered a direct hit from an enemy artillery shell, Lieutenant Teraji with utter disregard for his personal safety, dashed out into the enemy artillery barrage in search of the break in the line. Locating and repairing the break after following the line for 200 yards, Lieutenant Teraji, upon noting that he was unable to contact switchboard operator, followed the line for another 50 yards until he located a second break.

"While he was making repairs, an artillery shell exploded nearby, painfully wounding Lieutenant Teraji's right thigh. . . Lieutenant

Private Onoyo, whose proevacuation address is listed as Salinas, Calif., is reported to have been quite an athlete during his school days and well known in his home town.

The Onoyos are now residing in Cleveland, Ohio.

"Ever since we came overseas Doi has been acting in an officer's place while the officer was on special duty elsewhere. He is unquestionably the company's best soldier."

UNAWARE

BECAUSE UNUSUAL and bizarre happenings make the headlines, whereas what are accepted as "regular" events escape the public eye, most of us are unaware that there are many fair minded citizens along the Pacific coast, who are resisting and in some cases bucking the race pressure groups. For obvious reasons, they do not as a rule come out in the open and rave and rant like the soap-box patriots. But, nevertheless, they are slowly but surely making certain headway towards a better all-round race relations.

However, they need active participation in the issue by the nisei, if the ill-feeling engendered by few rabble-rousing economic opportunists is to be stalemated--and eventually erased.

That the below-the-belt terrorist tactics--shootings, rock throwings, arson, "No Japs Wanted" signs and such--have made certain inroad into the nisei mind is well attested to by the number of evacuees resettling elsewhere. This, to a certain extent, is a good thing because we must sell the nisei all over the country--to gain public confidence, understanding and backing. But this does not preclude that we should become completely oblivious of the task of founding nisei rights "back home."

According to one WRA official less than one third of the nisei relocatees, since lifting of the exclusion orders, have ventured to return to their former homes. Majority of them have entered the American stream of life in a more tolerant and less discriminating areas.

This certainly must be encouraging to the Japanese Exclusion League of Oregon, the California Preservation association, and the Remember Pearl Harbor League of Washington--all attempting to rid the West Coast of evacuees.

ONLY A SHOTGUN

Judge L. B. Crosby of the Justice Court at Parlior, Fresno county, has now joined Superior Judge James T. Lawlor of Seattle in moting a minimum sentence upon a defendant pleading guilty of terrorism against Americans of Japanese descent.

Because one Levi Multanon, in the words of District Attorney James M. Thuosen, used only a shotgun to fire into the house of a Japanese American whom he might have used a powerful deer rifle he owned, and therefore "did not intend to injure anyone," Judge Crosby let Multanon off with a suspended sentence. Besides, Multanon said he was sorry.

The District Attorney offered further condonement with the gratuitous remark that "people think it was a mistake to bring these people"--the Japanese Americans --"back to the West Coast." Only in this context, Mr. Thuosen admitted that "the law must be obeyed."

If the law is to be obeyed, Judge Crosby and Mr. Thuosen are offering very little encouragement, coming from officers sworn to uphold the law. To remind Mr. Thuosen of something he should know already under his oath of office: it is not incumbent upon him to pass along anyone's questioning of the constitutional rights guaranteed everyone in this country; his job is to enforce them. The Judge's pat on the wrist speaks--very softly--for itself.

WINS VERDICT TO REPOSSESS PROPERTY

OREGON CITY, Ore.--A circuit court jury here last week deliberated only 15 minutes in returning a verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the eviction suit of Masayuki Fujimoto against Dale and Lorene Bergh.

The case was held before Judge E. M. Page, who had overruled a motion to strike portions of the answer, filed by Glenn Jack, Bergh's counsel, which permitted the matter to be decided on the jury's interpretation of the lease agreement between the contending parties.

The defense contended the lease was for duration, and the war emergency was not over. The plaintiff countered that the emergency as it affected his return was ended with the lifting of the exclusion orders.

Judge Page ruled that this question of interpreting the meaning and intent of a lease was a question of fact and hencemissible for jury decision.

By his courage initiative and devotion to duty Lieutenant Teraji reflects credit upon himself and the United States Army."

In addition to the Silver Star and Purple Heart with Oak Leaf Cluster, Teraji wears the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Good Conduct medal and the European Theater ribbon with four battle stars.

NEEDS FIREMEN IMMEDIATELY

Due to heavy toll taken by relocation, the local fire department is in need of about 20 firemen to operate effectively, stated Paul W. Nowland, acting fire protection officer, Monday.

At present there are only enough firemen to operate one fire truck and the regular shift schedule cannot be maintained unless more firemen are added soon.

SEATTLE--Harold S. Burton, Vashon island farm worker who admitted burning four homes of evacuated Japanese, pleaded guilty to second degree arson and was fined \$1000 by Superior Judge James T. Lawler.

Burton said he thought burning the homes would prevent return of the Japanese to the Puget Sound island.

6-MONTH PROBATIONARY TERM GIVEN TERRORIST

FRESNO, Calif. -- Levi Multanen, Parlier district rancher, who pleaded guilty in Parlier justice court to firing four shotgun blasts into the home of Charles Iwasaki, Parlier area returnee, was given a six-month probationary term last Tuesday.

The specific charge to which Multanen pleaded guilty before Justice of the Peace L. B. Crosby was firing a gun in a rude and threatening manner.

James M. Thuesen, district attorney, stated that lesser charge was filed because he believed an assault with a deadly weapon conviction could not be obtained.

The accused man told the judge that the grief over the supposed death of a nephew in the South Pacific induced him to fire the shots. Multanen added that the day following the shooting he received a letter from his nephew.

TAX EXEMPT UP TO \$1000

A veteran is exempt from taxes to the extent of \$1000 on property in California, according to information received by the project attorney's office.

If the veteran is deceased, his widow is entitled to this exemption. In the event he is not married, the exemption goes to either of his parents or both.

AN OPEN LETTER

Dear Reverend Shirakawa:

The Buddhist church Sunday service program news is written and brought in by you and is carried in the Japanese section of the PIONEER.

It is true the news items brought in by you, as well as by others, are edited to correct any grammatical errors, to make statements more readily understandable, and to delete redundant words. This is a policy generally followed by all newspapers and is accepted as a part of editor's duty. But no changes are made in the factual matters in the news.

Reverend Shirakawa, you are well educated and your church work is well known, and because of your position you are highly respected in the community.

Therefore, it is unfortunate that the Buddhist church Sunday (June 3) service program news carried in the June 2 issue of the PIONEER as brought in by you has created much unpleasantness between you and Reverend Kashiwa.

Of course, you realize that all this came about because you, through an oversight or perhaps knowingly, put down Reverend Yonemura as the Sunday service speaker at the Buddhist church No. 2, when it should have been Reverend Kashiwa. Reverend Yonemura, I understand, is away on a tour.

When Reverend Kashiwa asked you why Reverend Yonemura was listed as the speaker when he (Reverend Kashiwa) was assigned, you were reported to have said the PIONEER (Japanese section) put in the article in "any old way" manner. Thereby inferring that the PIONEER had made the error.
