cases for a police executive. "Adhoring to a policy declared by the governor, the attorney general and the law enforcement advisory committee is another thing. "

Kenny said the policy adopted was that the offioers consider it their sworn duty to fully cooperato with army authorities in dealing with the roturn of the Japanese, and that all persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the law. Ho said vigilance, not viglantes, is essential.

#### NISEI GI'S TO TEACH JAPANESE WAR TACTICS

American soldiers of Japanese descent will teach the American troops (Caucasian) being shifted from Europe to the Pacific how to fight the Japanese cnemy, according to June 2 UP report.

Special teams of Jupanese Americans will demonstrate Japanese uniforms, weapons and methods. These teams, consisting of officers and 13 onlisted men,11/of the latter being nisei, havo been undergoing special training at a camp in Maryland in readiness for providing instructions to soldiers returning from Europe. Not all divisions bound for the Pacific will have the opportunity to go through the full course, it was reported.
