

# AMACHE BOND DRIVE OVER QUOTA

Amache's Seventh War Loan drive purchases and subscriptions by the appointed personnel totaled \$27,555.36 in E bonds, exceeding its quota of \$23,637.20 by a comfortable margin, revealed Walter J. Knodel, drive chairman, yesterday.

This figure which includes payroll deductions amounting to \$16,960.36 is exclusive of evacuee purchases made during the drive.

In the divisional drives, Community Management headed by John D. Neal, CA supervisor, went clear over the top with purchases amounting to \$14,836.84 or more than half of the total sales and subscriptions. Administrative Management, Project Management and Operations divisions followed with \$5,550.19, \$4,272.59 and \$2,885.75, respectively.

The successful Mighty Seventh drive here which officially came to a close last Saturday put Prowers county well up to the top among the state's 63 counties, added Knodel.

## WATERFRONT BAN STILL IN EFFECT

OAKLAND, Calif.--Persons of Japanese ancestry, whether US citizens or not, are still banned from Pacific coast waterfronts, the Oakland Board of Post Commissioners was warned by Capt. Paul B. Conk, in charge of waterfront activities for the Coast Guard.

The ban, under reconsideration, Captain Conk explained, but until official government order is forthcoming the prohibition will remain.

## GETS 4 NAZIS WITH 4 SHOTS

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, Italy--Pfc. George Oki of Amache, Colo., showed fine marksmanship in downing four Germans with four shots from his Garand rifle at a distance of 300 yards during the Fifth Army's Ligurian coast drive in Italy.

A member of the 442nd Combat Team, Oki saw four Jerries walking in a single file along the ridge of a hill. He accounted for the lead man but the other three took cover behind bushes. After several minutes of silence, one of them raised his head, which was his last act as Oki shot—continued on page 3—

## LISTS CASUALTIES OF NISEI GI'S FROM WRA CENTERS

Total number of casualties of Nisei GI's who have been or whose next of kin have been or are presently in a WRA center was 747--167 killed in action, 574 wounded and 6 missing or prisoners of war--up to June 23, 1945, according to information released recently by the WRA statistics section in Washington, DC.

There were 97 casualties listed from Granada relocation center. Of this number, 22 were killed in ac-

tion, 74 wounded and one missing or prisoner.

All figures were based on War Department releases and center reports. It was also explained that numbers refer to individuals suffering casualties, that is, a soldier wounded two—continued on page 3—

# NISEI POTPOURRI

TWO-WAR VETERAN

**S/SGT. JOHN TANIKAWA** of Sacramento, Calif., was recently decorated with the Bronze Star medal by Brig. Gen. Harold Haney at a ceremony in the Philippines.

With due respect to Sergeant Tanikawa, it was not so much the receiving of the medal, which is quite an honor in itself, that made him a noteworthy personality. What made him a significant figure is the fact he is a veteran of two wars--having also fought with distinction in the World War I. This is an unusual attainment for a Japanese American; a privilege and honor gained but by a select few.

Tanikawa, now with the famed 41st Division, has fought in two campaigns in the Pacific theater of operation as a combat infantryman. In the first World War he saw action in six campaigns as a machine-gunner.

This two-war veteran, in addition to the newly won award, has been bestowed with the Purple Heart with an Oak Leaf cluster and the Croix de Guerre, which was given him by the French government during the World War I. Thus his attribute as a soldier has been highly proclaimed by France as well as by the United States.

Sergeant Tanikawa is truly a living example of the loyalty of Nisei Americans.

## PETITIONS US SUPREME COURT TO RECONSIDER APPEAL DENIAL

A petition for rehearing was filed last week urging the US Supreme Court to reconsider its order refusing to allow an appeal in the case of Minola Tamesa, Heart Mountain (Wyo.) relocation center evacuee, convicted for a violation of the draft law. The petition was filed by A. L. Wirin, American Civil Liberties Union attorney.

Tamesa and 62 other Heart Mountain selectees were convicted by Federal Judge T. Blake Kennedy at Cheyenne, Wyo., for having refused to report for pre-induction physical examinations. They took the position that since they were virtually prisoners of war by virtue of their detention in concentration camps they were not free persons within the provisions of the draft law, and hence were not subject to a draft board order to serve in the armed forces.

The Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals at Denver later upheld the three-year sentence imposed upon Tamesa and his fellow defendants.

## CANNERY UNION OKAYS EVACUEES

MONTEREY, Calif.--Five hundred persons of Japanese ancestry are in good standing with the Fish Cannery Workers' union here, said Louis Martin, union head. He expressed the opinion that all evacuees formerly employed in that industry will be welcomed back by the fishing industry and union.

The canneries expect to start on Aug. 1. and will run continuously for about six and a half months.

Former workers in the fishing industry who plan to work at their trade again this year are advised to return as soon as possible.

Although housing shortage is quite acute here, quarters may be found, if several places owned by evacuees are made available to returnees.

## TO PROMOTE TOLERANCE

MADISON, Wis.--Gov. Walter S. Goodland recently named County Judge Fred M. Evans chairman of a 17-member commission on human rights, which will promote racial and religious tolerance throughout Wisconsin. Judge Evans is an active member of the Madison resettlement committee.

The commission has been appointed to keep the influence of "diversive factions who seek to stir up racial and religious discord, at an absolute minimum," according to Edward Doan, governor's press secretary.

Governor Goodland will serve as honorary chairman of the commission.

War Department releases also disclosed 32 killed, 127 wounded and four missing in action for whom there are no records indicating that they or their families were ever in a center.

Minidoka (Idaho) relocation center was listed as having the most casualties, 127, while Granada was second with 97 and Poston (Ariz.) relocation center third with 95.

# INADEQUATE ASSISTANCE CHARGED AGAINST WRA

A charge of inadequate assistance by the WRA, along with reiteration of the original relocation assistance recommendation, was voiced in a recent letter to Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, from S. Hideshima of Topaz (Utah) relocation center, acting chairman of the all-center

evacuee representatives' headquarters, according to the July 2 ROCKY SHIMPO.

This is request for further consideration by the director of the recommendations made by the all-center delegates at the Salt Lake City, Utah, conference last February, and subsequently forwarded to him.

The point of "poor, inadequate assistance of WRA and its associated welfare agencies" to the resettlers is reiterated in the letter. It further stated the authority is "forcing families with school age children to relocate" by closing down the project schools in advance of the January, 1946, closing date of all projects.

# OFFICERS HEVA CUHENS TIMBER WORK; LISTS OTHER JOBS

Timber work on logging operations about 180 miles from Denver for both nisei and issei has been offered to local residents, through the center relocation program office by Jim Yanari of the coordinated labor resources in Denver.

Jobs for nisei will be timber felling, which is done individually or in pairs, and the wages are

\$3.50 a thousand feet. According to Yanari, a man can easily earn \$10-\$20 a day with little experience, and those with a couple week's experience can earn an average of \$15 a day or more.

Issei are hired to drive horses, dragging logs out of the forest. They will be paid a guaranteed minimum of \$1 an hour; some are earning more, added Yanari.

Workers are housed in barrack rooms and the charge for board is \$1.50 a day, which is used entirely for meals.

Apartment rooms in Denver will be made available to all families of logging operation workers in about two months, and reservations will be made for all those signing up. Jobs will be obtained for family members remaining in Denver.

The council is operating a hostel at 1236 Washington street, which is available to all returnees at a minimum cost of 75 cents a day for adults.
