

LIST RELOCATION RATE BY BLOCKS

The percentage of relocation by blocks in Amache, between Jan. 1 and July 13, 1945, shows block 7K leading with a percentage of 51.5, closely followed by 9K with 50.0 percentage. Blocks 8E and 10E are trailing neck and neck in the relocation parade with 19.7 and 20.0 percentages respectively.

Average relocation percentage is 34.4. Block 6F is nearest the "average" — continued on page 3 —

TELLS PRODUCE FIRMS TO CORRECT SITUATION

In sharply censuring the refusal of Seattle, Wash., produce merchants to deal in produce grown by Japanese Americans as "unjustified discrimination," Clinton Anderson, recently appointed Secretary of Agriculture, called on the Northwest Produce association at Seattle to correct the situation.

Anderson last week sent the following telegram to Mr. Adwin, secretary of the produce association:

"This department is receiving numerous protests against refusal of Seattle produce firms to handle produce grown by Japanese Americans. In view of present food situation, we believe such discrimination cannot be justified and urge your cooperation in

correcting situation."

The Department of Agriculture has sent copies of above wire to all its offices on the West Coast, advising them that its action is to be regarded as a policy statement from the cabinet head.

Pending settlement of the present Seattle marketing difficulties, the WRA is aiding evacuee growers who have returned to the Seattle area to market their produce through other channels.

WOMAN GIVEN 90-DAYS FOR ABUSING RETURNEES

A woman known as Mrs. Wilma Insigne was given a 90-day sentence in the county jail last Monday on a peace disturbance charge involving two returnee families at Walnut Grove, Calif. Justice of Peace Milo Dye, who heard the case, stipulated that the last 60 days of the sentence would be suspended if the defendant leaves the county for one year.

The returnee families involved are the Harry Matsuokas and the K. Sasaki, all former residents of Amache, Colo.

According to a telegraphic report received here yesterday from Russell T. Robinson, district relocation officer at Sacramento, shortly after the returnees' arrival at Walnut Grove on Friday night, July 13, Mrs. Insigne in an intoxicated condition entered the grounds of Matsuoka home and verbally abused the members of both families. She was taken into custody by the sheriff's

URGES EARLY RELOCATION

TO THE RESIDENTS OF AMACHE:

I hope all of you have read and digested National Director Dillon S. Myer's message. This schedule of center closings was arrived at after careful thought as to the possibilities of giving you the most assistance. You have been asked to advise us of your relocation plans by Sept. 1 at the latest. Congress has set up only sufficient funds to liquidate the centers in an orderly manner. There are no funds to continue them.

The director also pointed out that those who advise you to delay, or who tell you that your problems cannot be solved, or that you cannot relocate, are not your friends. They are giving you bad advice—they are working against your welfare.

Make no mistake. The thousands who have relocated are happy; they wonder why they put up with a subnormal existence in a relocation center as long as they did. I have received hundreds of personal letters from people who have successfully relocated. You can do the same. And you have this advantage--you will be the first to go. There are 40,000 people to relocate; there are only 4,000 of you in this center. Don't put off going until October, go now; not next month, not next week, not tomorrow; today! You will benefit by every day you save, and a day out of the center is day saved.

TANGLEFOOT

RETICENCE has long been one of the chief drawbacks to the progress of nisei--both individually and as a group. This trait--perhaps commendable in its place--has been to the Japanese Americans like "tanglefoot" to a fly. And the nisei's feeling of inferiority complex may be traced directly to reticence.

Disadvantages of being reticent are many. Reticence, has made many of us side-step issues rather than meet them. All because facing the issue brought unpleasantness; whereas, by doing so and thrashing it out, a friendly understanding may have been reached in many cases.

Often we have hurt ourselves and suffered pain silently simply because it was much easier to shrug our shoulders and say: what's the use.

People have misunderstood us because we have failed to speak up even when in the right. And we have taken "extra" punishment because we have tried to console ourselves with an attitude of defeatism when we found ourselves in the wrong. We do not realize how much better it is to express "our side" and make our stand clear--make amends, if possible.

This reticence and its evil cohort, inferiority complex, is deplorable when practiced in centers. And it is a social and financial suicide when practiced outside the centers.

From now on and until we are firmly resettled, we must assert ourselves strongly but with propriety. We must also cooperate and stick together to present a common nisei front.

Boswell revealed 1000 persons have signed a petition to Congressmen B. W. Gearhart of Fresno and A. J. Elliott of Tulare asking legislation against unrestricted return of Japanese to their former communities.

The Japanese Americans (Nisei) are just as loyal Americans as we have anywhere in the United States.

I am ashamed of my fellow citizens in California for their racial intolerance.

Many of the people back home seem to think they would be letting the boys down on the fighting front if they let these Japanese come back to California. This is not true. There is a world of difference between the Japanese we are fighting in the Pacific and the Japanese who was your and my neighbor in California until December, 1941.

The Japanese units in North Africa, Sicily, Italy and Germany have fought longer and harder than any other outfits. There are none which have had such a high percentage of wounded, not because they were poor fighters but because they were so anxious to prove themselves true Americans.

They loved Democracy the same as you. They wanted to come back to enjoy that Democracy. They despised the Axis powers and their methods. They wanted to show you whose side they were on. They didn't just wave flags and stand on the sidelines. They went out and did for their country.

Let's give them the hand of friendship for what they have been and welcome them back into our communities and never again lift our voice against innocent people.

—continued from page 1— office and held in lieu of bail at \$500 cash or \$1000 bond.

On the following day Pvt. Yoshio Matsuoka signed a complaint against the woman. The complaint charged "willfully and unlawfully disturbing peace by loud and unusual noise by offensive conduct using vulgar, profane, and indecent language within presence of woman and children."

At the hearing held last Monday afternoon Mrs. Insigne pleaded guilty as charged. Judge Dye subsequently read a prepared statement to her. She then wished to change her plea to one of not guilty. The judge refused.

Mrs. Insigne's previous record is said to show 14 years of law violations, including one on narcotics and seven for vagrancy and prostitution.

Private Matsuoka, who is on a furlough from his station at Ft. Logan, Colo., accompanied his family home. He was liberated from a German prison camp when the US armed forces marched into Germany and returned to this country.

The returnees are well pleased with the speedy and efficient handling of the case by the law enforcement agencies.

Ration books will be issued at the center leave office to all evacuees leaving here on both short term passes and terminal departures (indefinite leaves), according to Wal-

ter J. Knodel, relocation program officer.

The new procedure is intended to eliminate difficulties some relocatees have experienced in new localities, particularly those who have converted from short term to terminal.

If a ration book is not issued at the center, the district relocation officer in the new locality will ask the local OPA office to honor and accept the resettler's request. Where there is no relocation office, the relocatee may write or wire his former center of residence. The project will then advise the ration board that one be issued.

REWARD FOR CONVICTION

SACRAMENTO-- Attorney General Robert W. Kenny last week announced a reward of \$1000 for the arrest and felony conviction of any person attacking a Japanese in California.

The new plan to curbe anti-Japanese demonstrations was disclosed by Kenny during an address at a convention of the California Council of Civic Unity.

The attorney general said the reward will be paid by the American Civil Liberties Union for each case resulting in a felony conviction.

TERROR VICTIM INDUCTED

AUBURN, Calif.--Sumio Doi, formerly of Amache, Colo., and the first Japanese American to return here after the lifting of the West Coast exclusion orders, was inducted last Tuesday into the US Army. Doi is the first nisei to be inducted from Placer county since February, 1942.

He was the central figure in the trial of four Caucasians accused of arson

and attempting to dynamite a building on his ranch. The four men, two of whom were AWOL soldiers, were subsequently acquitted.

George Masato Yamakawa, who has relocated to Chicago, was also listed on the induction call.
