Average block relocation is 39.42, a rise of 5 per cent during the last two weeks in July. There are 11 blocks equal to or above this figure and 18 blocks below average.

Blocks 10E and 8E have the lowest percentages --24.3 and 25.2 respectively.

LOS ANGELES -- Sixty-four per cent of the 15,907 Japanese Americans relocated from eight WRA centers during the first half of this year went east rather than return to the West Coast, disclosed Faul G. Robertson, regional WRA supervisor, recently.

Less than 11 per cent came to Southern California, he stated.

WELFARE AGENCIES WILL AID

Aug. 4, 1945

To Center Residents:

The Welfare section is getting excellent cooperation from the California welfare agencies in regard to families who are expected to need help over a long period of time. In a majority of these cases presented to the West Coast agencies, we received replies that "residence is verified, the family is eligible for aid in this county if found to be in need after they return." This means that the county is officially acknowledging its responsibility for helping with the needs of the dependent family. Very often the agency will add in its reply "the references indicated that they have very high regard for this family and will be glad to have them return to the neighborhood." . .

Housing is, of course, a difficult problem everywhere, but satisfactory arrangements have been made for every family who has returned to date. However, we strongly urge that families, who expect to receive help after they return, decide to go back as soon as possible because as time goes on more and more people will be involved and services will be less adequate in the outside agencies as well as in the center.

As yet, we are still able to give fair consideration to requests for help. . But to avoid the confusion of the last few weeks or days before closing the center and the inadequate, make-shift, temporary arrangements, which surely will have to be resorted to in many cases at any late date, we emphatically urge that families who fall in the above classifieation come to us immediately for consultation about definite departure date, if they have not already done so. Departure dates for special coaches are Aug. 6, 10 and 15. Come early and avoid the rush.
